This is a letter of request from Allen D. Beck and the board of Eagle Advantage, Inc., a 501(c)3 non-profit entity in the state of Texas, to consider our application to Texas Education Agency and The State Board of Education. This application is for an open-enrollment charter school for the Sarah Zumwalt Middle School area in the Oak Cliff section of Dallas, to begin in the fall of 1998.

After 14 months of research and consultation with educators, parents, business and community leaders, we selected School Reform, Inc. and Donald H. Howard, Ph.D. Dr. Howard has helped to start 7,000 schools in 110 nations, to serve as our consulting and management guide for developing a new high-tech, individualized, learning system for our children.

As far as my credentials are concerned, I am an experienced educator and educational administrator with 30 plus years of experience. Documentation of my certification as a teacher from the 1st through the 12th grades is included in the application.

We shared our plan with interested parents, educators, business and community leaders throughout the southern Dallas area and received 160 signatures of support, letters of endorsement. An Advisory Board was also created of leaders from a cross-section of business, political, and church leaders. Enclosed is a sampling to demonstrate the level of interest for developing an open-enrollment charter school with satellite links, as The Eagle Project unfolds.

Our board members are active participants in "The Eagle Project", with Dr. Howard providing alternatives in public education for our children. After consulting with numerous parents and leaders, we selected a location in the Zumwalt area, where there is a base of active interest. We have a contract to utilize a large, open-spaced facility in a church where the Senior Pastor and his congregation have whole-heartedly endorsed our plan. This church has had a summer tutorial program for at-risk, inner-city children for the last three years.

We would treasure a decision by the State Board of Education to grant an open-enrollment charter school to serve the educational and social needs of the children in our area.

I. EAGLE ADVANTAGE, INC.: PURPOSE AND VISION

A. PURPOSE STATEMENT

"TO ESTABLISH MODELS FOR EDUCATION REFORM IN MAJOR SCHOOL DISTRICTS IN THE U.S.A., TO IMPLEMENT HIGH-TECH LEARNING CENTERS FUNCTIONING WITH DIAGNOSTICALLY PRESCRIBED INDIVIDUALIZED LEARNING TOOLS AND TECHNIQUES, TO RETURN TRADITIONAL HISTORIC WESTERN VALUES TO THE AMERICAN CLASSROOM AND TO INSPIRE AND IMPLEMENT MEASURABLE EDUCATIONAL REFORM FOR THE 21ST CENTURY.

Eagle Advantage, Inc., a Texas based 501(c)3 organization, was established in 1979 and reorganized for educational purposed in 1997, by a group of successful educational administrators committed to introducing educational reform such as has been successful in the private sector since 1970 in 7,000 schools in 110 nations globally for millions of children. One of many objectives for 1998 is to open a Texas Charter School for purposes of demonstrating 21st Century Education under the authorization of the T.E.C. chapter 12.

B. VISION STATEMENT: GOALS

- To open a high-tech learning center in August 1998 for 50-100 of the least advantaged Dallas school
 children, to give them a dream of success, to diagnose their learning gaps, to prescribe an individualized
 learning course of study unique to each child's particular needs, to provide a quality learning environment,
 to teach each one how to set learning objectives—daily goals—and to motivate them towards a learning and
 living of achievement and success.
- 2. To demonstrate how all students can pre-test and post-test on National Achievement Tests and average in excess of a year of achievement the first year.
- 3. To provide for the special needs of at-risk children, adjudicated teens and drop outs in a comfortable non-threatening learning environment, as well as "Normal" students.
- 4. To provide for the comfortable restoration of each child back to mainstream classrooms, or should the child and parent chose, to provide an individualized on going general course of study on to graduation, or a college bound course to equip the child for the University of their choice.
- 5. To provide any needed remediation in the skills of reading, math and/or language arts and bring each child to his grade level by the end of the first year or for severe cases, no longer than 3 years.
- To provide the city with a model of high-tech individualized mastery learning integrated with character development and traditional values for educational reform.
- 7. To demonstrate the program in the Charter School and reduplicate similar Eagle Advantage, Inc. high-tech learning centers for students inside the public schools.

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- 8. To provide each student with high-tech keyboard mastery through Typemaster I and II, and a course in Computerized Speed Reading and Comprehension so that one-third of the class can be reading at 1200 wpm by the end of the first year and two-thirds of the class by the end of the second year with one-fifth reading up to 1800 wpm, etc.
- 9. To provide a high-tech English as a second language program for youth with English language deficits.
- 10. To demonstrate how to bring reading and all skill levels up to an acceptable standard of achievement.
- 11. To demonstrate how the "7 laws of learning" integrate a system of mastery based, high tech individualized curriculum and learning proceeding for the 21st century.
- 12. To demonstrate how to introduce traditional values that will increase personal responsibility, character development and positive citizenship.
- 13. To demonstrate how to motivate hard-core underachievers and at-risk youth to desire to work towards their highest possible level of performance and achievement.
- 14. To demonstrate how to reduce the rate of dropouts and grade level repeats and eliminate social promotions through measurable learning, academic safety nets and "Quality Control."
- 15. To demonstrate how to incorporate into the learning process individualized high technology for the 21st century through computer-enhanced curriculum and multimedia learning.
- 16. To expand the eagle advantage project to other communities in the Dallas inner city by opening these same High-tech learning centers throughout the inner city as satellites.
- 17. To demonstrate how to increase social awareness of educational reform.
- 18. To increase economic opportunities through individualized educational programs, vocational courses and school-to-work co-op programs will be provided to help single parents, and other mature students who qualify.

II. GOVERNING BOARD, ADMINISTRATION, AND SCHOOL REFORM, INC. CONTRACT

A. GOVERNING BOARD

The Governing Board is composed of a combination of credentialed experienced educators from the public and private sector, the Pastor of the local church facility, representation from the church board, local business persons and parents. For this period of application and beginning development of the project the three credentialed experienced educators listed below under #8 and #9 will serve in the official capacity as the "Eligible Entity" Founders and Directors of Eagle Advantage, Inc. They will direct S.R.I. to perform the initial application functions and will further appoint additional qualifying personnel up to a seven or nine member board during the winter and spring of 1998. The responsibilities of the Board are to:

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- 1. Approve and submit this Charter application.
- 2. Set general policies for the operation of the school.
- Approve the academic program to be used.
- 4. Approve the budget and maintain fiscal responsibility.
- 5. Select the administrator and approve the contract with S.R.I.
- 6. Monitor and Support the Administrative Operation of the school.
- 7. Meet from time to time for reporting and accountability of the Administration.
- 8. The Board will serve as a Governmental body for purposes of maintenance of the responsibilities served in Chapter 551 and 552 of the government code.
- 9. The following board members serve as the initial founding committee and eligible entity in making this Open-Enrollment Charter Application:
 - a. Dr. Allen D. Beck, Ph.D., former Superintendent of private schools. See letters of endorsement in Appendix IV.
 - b. Dr. Donald R. Howard, Ph.D., President of School Reform, Inc. Resume and biography under II. B. (Consultant).
 - c. Donald R. Cramer, Business Owner and Educator in the Dallas area. Letter of endorsement attached.
 - d. Gary O'Neal, longtime educator in the Dallas area.
- 10. The committee will continue the organization and development of the final Governing Board, of seven to nine members, during the winter and spring of 1998. The final board will then select a name for the school and become more definitive in review of points 1-6 above. The final board will better reflect the ethnic composition of the community.
- 11. A criminal background check will be made on all new members appointed to the board by the Founding Committee and will be permanent school board policy for the life of the school.
- 12. Each board meeting will consist of time spent in orientation of school objectives and goals with administrative sessions for purposes of training in how to meet these goals, conducted by S.R.I.
- 13. Teacher certification will not be a standard for hiring and appointing staff--however professional level of training equal to responsibility level, character, love for children, background resume and recommendations will be a standard part of the selection process. A one week training course will be provided by S.R.I. with hands on interactive training and ongoing in-service training throughout the year conducted by S.R.I. (See sub section II.B and C.)
- 14. Though the school will utilize a church facility Board policy will prohibit the use of any educational time or release time for "religious" teaching sponsored by the school of church, such as planned chapel or devotionals, etc.

- 1. Board members will exercise their authority as a board member and have one vote equally as will the Chairman of the Board. Members will exercise their authority through meaningful discussion and voting at board meetings but will have no individual authority out side of the meetings to make authorizations or commitments in behalf of the school. Board members will speak as a body in all decision making. The board sets policy and delegates all authority in the administration of the school to the Chief Administrator who acts in behalf of the board and school and makes application of policy upholding the rules of the school from day to day.
- 2. The Superintendent will have the oversight of the school in applying board policy integrated with the high-tech academic program of S.R.I. The superintendent will provide selection of teachers with the approval of the board, and will provide initial training and in-service training throughout the school year.
- 3. The Parent Advisory Meetings will be conducted from time to time as needed to discuss problems and policies and secure input from families. Parent interviews are conducted initially one on one by the principal and again at beginning of second semester in January. Parents will individually provide input to the Administration and have an opportunity to enter opinions at Q and A sessions at the Board Meeting at such a time when parents are permitted to attend or at special meeting called for the purpose of a Parent Board Meeting.
 - a. Parents will not have any authority in the operation or administration of the school but can provide input to the Principal, P.A.M., or on invitation to a special session of the board.
 - b. Parents may serve as para-professionals; teacher aids in the learning center, will be trained in school and program policy and will be expected to serve a minimum of 36 hours a year in behalf of the school as the principal shall designate.
- 4. Student Council will be authorized for students to participate in self-government under the authority of school policy and school administration. Any student can make an appeal at any time but is under disciplinary control of the school, must be in attendance and on time daily and in obedience to school rules at all times.

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C. SCHOOL REFORM, INC. CONTRACT

Eagle Advantage, Inc. has contracted S.R.I., School Reform, Inc. consulting services to assist in the establishing of the Charter school through filing the application, securing and preparing the facilities, conducting the community meetings, meeting with local school principals, organization of the board, setting up the academic programs, enrolling students, etc. under the authorization and control of the Governing Board, for a period of 3 years.

Under Dr. Howard's leadership the S.O.T. has grown from one school in 1970 to 7,000 schools in 110 countries. The corporate staff has grown from 3 employees to 350. The facility grew from one small school to a 4 acre plant on a 300 acre campus 10 minutes north of DFW. The curriculum has developed from a cut and staple of pac materials; has gone through 3 editions of new curriculum development for all subjects and all grade levels at a cost of \$50 million in 27 years. Under his leadership the first high-tech Computer Video interactive high school math and science was developed. In the last 5 years, Dr. Howard has met with 32 Ministers of Education and signed 14 contracts to involve the School of Tomorrow as National Educational Reform Programs in 150 government schools world-wide. In 1997 Dr. Howard retired from the School of Tomorrow to become a consultant to bring Education Reform to the United States public schools and to establish model schools for Educational Reform.

Dr. Howard is the Founder and President of School Reform, Inc. He will serve as Consultant to and a member of the Initial Founding Board of Eagle Advantage, Inc. Open-Enrollment Charter School and will serve as Superintendent of the school for the first 3 years of its development and operation.

PURPOSE STATEMENT

School Reform, Inc. was founded in 1996 by Donald R. Howard, Ph.D. for the purpose of implementing Educational Reform in the U.S. Pubic Schools through the use of High Tech individualized diagnostically prescribed curriculum and programs. S.R.I. will produce, market, sell and distribute supplemental and core academic learning tools through retail bookstores and bookstore learning centers, through Public School contract projects, experimental programs and High Tech learning centers in Public Schools under the control of local school districts and State Boards of Education, and by establishing Model Charter Schools under state laws. S.R.I.'s partnership programs bring together private and public education: integrating the best of traditional basics, mastery learning, high technology, and traditional historic western values within the contemporary system to provide Educational reform for the 21st century.

III. THE ACADEMIC PROGRAM

Here in lies the greatest contrast between Eagle Advantage, Inc. and the conventional schools from which the students come. The program is different but not to the extent that it does not get results. To the contrary the program has been used in thousands of schools over the last 25 years by millions of children with above average results. With thousands of children tested at random in schools in many states, the average child scored in the 67%. On C.A.T. and also on the British Richmond data testing in Common wealth countries the average child increased in IQ between 12 and 15 points after 3 years on the program. The average 9th grader scored 12.9 in reading and language and 12.5 in math. The average child, on both the C.A.T. and Richmond tests scored an average of more than one year above the public school children in mental maturity. This is the program being introduced by S.R.I.

A. THE DIFFERENCE IN THE ACADEMIC PROGRAM

The difference in the academic program is first the difference between the modern conventional lock-stepped chronologically graded classroom and the traditional one room school which functioned as an individualized learning center. The conventional class room came to the US from Prussia in the late 1800s. But this type methodology cannot take education into the information age. Technology prohibits teaching in a lock-stepped environment. One child operates a computer alone, advances at his own rate of speed and learns to complete his project. A class or a team cannot operate a computer; only an individual. 21st century education must be individualized.

Benson's book, SEVEN LAWS OF TEACHING was a masterpiece two generations ago which shaped teacher education, teaching methodology, and the modern classroom. In the University Education Department, the focus of courses is on TEACHING: teaching English, teaching math, psychology of teaching, methods of teaching, but we have learned that you can have teaching with out learning.

Educational Reform will focus on LEARNING. How does a child LEARN? How can we help a child to LEARN? Nineteenth Century Education focuses on input; Educational Reform will focus on RESULTS. The five majors of modern accreditation measures input; teaching credentials, curriculum offering, facilities library holdings, and endowment. Educational Reform will be results orientated. This is the methodology of Eagle Advantage, Inc. using a program developed in the private sector for 27 years and polished in thousands of private school rooms on every continent and now being used by nations abroad in government and public school rooms.

How does a child LEARN? How can we help a child LEARN? Eagle Advantage will begin with the SEVEN LAWS OF LEARNING:

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- 1. The child must be on his own real diagnosed level of learning.
- 2. All learning gaps in the child past must be filled in.
- 3. The curriculum must be self instructional learning tool in a continuous progress scope and sequence with out seam, from learning to read to graduation.
- 4. The child must set reasonable goals which he can achieve in a prescribed period of time.
- The child learning must be controlled and motivated.
- 6. The child's learning must be measurable to the child.
- 7. The child's learning must be rewarded and rewarding based on these SEVEN LAWS OF LEARNING.

Let's walk a child in Eagle Advantage through a scenario of a day of learning. It is an 8th grade of 13 failing in school. Eagle Advantage, and takes a series of pretests and diagnostic tests that reveal real levels of learning. It tests out at a math level of 4th grade with some severe learning gaps in subtraction and division without an understanding of decimals or percents. It language level is 5th grade with gaps in types of sentences and parts of speech at lower levels. Social studies and science are affected because reads at a 3rd grade level lacking understanding of many phonetic sounds. There are many questions about the sequence of events what each means, "but what if?", etc.. But all of them have been answered in 25 years of development where this individually prescribed program based on the 5 laws of learning have been polished to a science and is ready for mainstream America. All subjects, skills and knowledge from learning to read through to graduation, including Texas history and all of the essentials in the T.E.K.'s are covered from T.E.C. 28.002 for Texas high school graduation.

Extra Curricular activities like music and sports are less feasible during the first year, depending on the size and severity of learning of the student body. The most essential skills and child development of 60 ideal character traits are integrated into the curriculum so that mastery learning, self-confidence and character are emphasized.

At the end of each school year, all students will take the C.A.T. Knowledge and Basic Skills for a post-test to measure each individual students and the schools academic progress annually. Even low performing students would be expected to advance one grade level. A brochure is being prepared to provide parents with a prospectus of the Eagle Advantage Charter which will include enrollment criteria, facilities, the academic program, staff qualifications, discipline, etc.

IV. PRE-TEST, POST-TEST, RESULTS AND ACCOUNTABILITY

Every child enrolled will be pretested on C.A.T. and diagnostically tested for curriculum level prescriptions as described under III. At the end of the year the C.A.T. will be given again and all results made public by year end. Since the main objective of enrollment is to ready At Risk, Adjudicated Youth and Dropouts, the preeminent value and testing is not where the student is, but how much real learning progress he makes and how soon he can be raised to grade level. It would be therefore difficult to presume to establish the T.A.A.S Achievement goals under T.E.C. chapter 39-B as a standard grade level according to chronological age for all students. As stated under III a minimum of one grade level and achievement would be the achievement objective for Eagle Advantage, Inc.

- --- Daily Achievement will be posted in each child's office.
- --- Congratulations slips will be sent to parents on each pac completed.
- --- Test scores have each pac completed will be posted on each child's permanent record and quarterly progress report sent home to parents.
- ---Parent Teacher meetings will be conducted in January to specifically discuss each child's progress, deficiencies, etc.
- --- Pre and Post test C.A.T. results will be posted on the permanent record card.
- ---Post testing will be given on C.A.T. at end of year.
- --- T.A.A.S. tests will be given to all students working in curriculum from the 3rd to 8th level.
- ---C.A.T. and T.A.A.S. results will be reported to the T.E.A and S.B.O.E. with in 2 weeks of testing or within 2 days of return of all tests graded out of house.
- ---Each child's final results will be discussed with each parent who requests a meeting with the school principal.
- ---All school results in skills of reading including speed and comprehensive reading results in the Readmaster.

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V. GEOGRAPHIC AREA AND STATEMENT OF IMPACT

The Geographic Area to be served by Eagle Advantage is covered under the designation of Inner City Dallas: The D.I.S.D., the Dallas Independent School District.

Statement of Impact letter was sent out on Dec. 20, 1997, (see Appendix X) to the Dallas Independent School District stating that Eagle Advantage is open-enrollment for 50 to 100 students. The letter we've mailed, certified copy, return receipt requested. Also included with each letter was a copy of this Charter school application. See map in Appendix VII.

VI. ENROLLMENT CRITERIA

The enrollment policy for Eagle Advantage is decidedly "OPEN-ENROLLMENT" as has been stated on interdependent principles stated above. All grades, At Risk, Adjudicated, Dropouts, Special Ed., L.E.P., Dyslexia, etc. No student will be discriminated against on the basis of sex, national origin, ethnically, religion, disability, (The individualized Eagle Advantage is especially superior for visually and hearing impaired children and even some Downs syndrome graduate with an 8th level of learning) academic or athlete ability, of the district the child would otherwise attend. A child will not be refused admission for having a criminal offense or a juvenile court adjudication, or discipline problems under Sub Chapter A, Chapter 37. These students will be handled in a different category administratively and will be counseled and enrolled on probation with the understanding that violation of school rules means expulsion. Students will be required to attend the 180 days of school with out missing—or make up the day in the Learning Center on Saturday or an extra hour each day for a week for any day missed. Tardiness is made up for by sacrificing breaks, or loss of Learning Center privileges. Students will participate in rule making and sign a pledge to support them.

VII. STAFF QUALIFICATIONS AND TRAINING

All staff will be selected on the basis of professional training; College or University Degrees, personal character, reputation, example in attitude and development, experience at working with age levels of student enrollment. Elementary level certification will be preferred and high school subject majors will be given preference but certification is not required. A one week training course in the S.R.I. Academic Program will be provided the week before school opens in Au gust. Staff, including one paraprofessional for each teacher, will be trained in every detail of "Controlled Progress Motivated Learning," the Seven Laws of Learning, Diagnosis and Prescription for each child and step by step through all learning center procedures with hands on instruction.

In-service training will be provided by S.R.I. on a regular day to day basis as staff achieve proficiency in working with students on an individual establishing and maintaining learning progress for each student.

VIII. FINANCIAL PLAN: BUDGET PROJECTIONS

Budget accuracy can best be achieved over a period of time in a particular facility with a known program and an experienced staff. These following figures represent a projection based on figures used to operate this particular program in various locations and under varying circumstances. The following figures represent upfront costs in preparation of the facility, purchase of equipment ordering of curriculum and materials day to day S.R.I. administrative costs -some of which must be amortized over the 3 year period.

It is noticeable that this budget is not necessarily the style requested in the charter application GUIDELINES. It should be noted that this budget reflects the difference in the program: the single classroom, the different type curriculum, etc.

These figures will vary radically for an actual count of 40 to 60 students. A final accurate budget will only be achievable after the students have been enrolled and the final count is in. No gift monies are anticipated at this time because of the marginal incomes of the families in the inner-city.

By the end of the first year of operation the board will convene with the realism of one year of financial activity and begin preparation of a more accurate annual budget for the ensuing school year.

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In like manner, each year thereafter, budget preparation will follow this procedure. Business office activity will be provided the first year by School Reform, Inc. C.P.A. services will be provided by Don Davidson and Associates and an audit for the first school year will be forth coming by Oct. 15, 1999.

IX. EAGLE ADVANTAGE and P.E.I.M.S.

Eagle Advantage will operate in compliance with the PUBLIC EDUCATION INFORMATION MANAGEMENT SYSTEM as spelled out in Federal laws, the Texas constitution, State statutes, etc. This CHARTER represents, not a private, but a state sponsored, state financed entity, and must represent the state standard of purpose, community objectives, domestic services, culture, democracy, etc., while at the same time offering differences in the educational arena that will make a contribution to educational improvement and reform. This is the objective of Eagle Advantage while maintaining the standards of the PEIMS to the same extent as the current Public Schools.

- A. According to TEC Subchapter C 22.081, Eagle Advantage will run a criminal check on any staff applicant who does not have a long history and reputation commonly known in the community and will report any offenses to the commissioner.
- B. All graduation requirements according to TEC chapter 28.025 will be met. According to TEC 29.060 summer school will be offered for half day for 8 weeks so long as there is sufficient interest.
- C. Special Ed. according to Chapter 29 A, 29.001-.014 will not be necessary because of the very nature of the individualized diagnostically prescribed program. It fits each child by tailoring the curriculum to fill in his individual needs. Experience in thousands of schools with over a million children in 27 years tells us that Most children in the special ed category are brought to a normal level with in 3 years. All children will be retained from 3-21 years and even Adult Education will be offered evenings by the second or third year.
- D. Bi-lingual education, according to 29.051-.064 is a necessity in all third world countries where English is not the first language. English has become the international business language and in the last 20 years it has become an international standard for academics. I have personally assisted in the opening of schools in 50-60 countries, dealt with educational officials and have set up schools in English in all Latin countries. I must say out of experience that Chapter 29 is out of date. Mastery of English is in Global demand and should be a priority for all citizens. Latins who are citizens of the U. S. A. often have a disadvantage of coming from a home where English is a second language. The only way to correct this situation is for them to have extra help and spend extra time in the mastery of English, not to waste precious academic time pandering to their parental preferences and their academic conveniences. This would pass them through their ancestral preferences happily but leave them ill equipped for their present and future. Thus "Bi-Lingual" education so called does not provide Latin children with an "Equal Educational Opportunity:" it reinforces a second language deficiency, bypasses first language mastery and commits the child to a second rate citizenship from which he will never emerge. When I signed a contract with Dr Jose Duarte, Minister of Education in Paraguay, to put the top 40 state schools in key cities on this predominantly English mastery program he was more interested in the success of the children in a global economy than in their parents or grandparents cultural preferences. Eagle Advantage will provide each child with an "Equal Opportunity Education" by leveling the playing field, determining what each child needs, working with each child individually and bringing each child to mastery in the English language. If however the law requires a specific amount of Spanish instruction and the requirement cannot be waived, Eagle Advantage will reluctantly comply and I will even speak Spanish to the children.
- E. Immunization records will be maintained as under Chapter 38 including diphtheria, rubedo, rubella, mumps, tetanus, and poliomyelitis and available to the TEC upon request.

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- F. Alcohol, tobacco, and drug prohibitions will be maintained according to 38.006, .007, and .008.
- G. "Essential Skills and Knowledge" testing according to 39.021 was dealt with in section IV. All students will be pre tested and post tested according to 39.021 and 39.072. Eagle Advantage will measure for real learning progress and report it to parents and the S. B. O. E.: The same or higher standards than are used by area schools.
- H. The Charter will provide for an ANNUAL REPORT to the S.B.O.E. concerning student enrollment, attendance, grades, discipline problems, socioeconomic data, parental satisfaction, student satisfaction, real cost of administration, learning center operation on a per pupil basis, and the real effects of the Charter School on the child, the family, the community, and on D.I.S.D.

X. FACILITIES AND SERVICES

There are an endless number of church buildings and facilities and empty buildings in the inner city large enough to house a high tech learning center for 50 to 100 students; there are enough of these scattered throughout the city to provide for the growth of a satellite system for Eagle Advantage vision of future expansion. During the summer of 1995 our staff visited with more than 50 inner city area pastors to discuss opening schools. The majority were not only interested, they had a distinct burden to help with the community educational problems. However most felt they did not have the financial capability to get involved. This month we approached 2 of these churches in the area of Sarah Zumwalt Middle School and both were willing to submit a lease proposal to the church for approval.

- A. EAGLE ADVANTAGE, INC. selected Fountain of the Living Word Church at 2543 East Ledbetter, Dallas, Texas facility for the open-enrollment charter school because:
 - The church plant has a unique size and capacity that fits the exact need of a high-tech learning center for 50-100 students.
 - 2. The church auditorium will can easily be adapted for a high-tech learning center, student assemblies, parent teacher orientation and parent advisory meetings.
 - 3. The kitchen facility and dining room for lunch and indoor recreational needs are adequate.
 - Boys and girls restrooms, are more than adequate to service over 100 children.
 - Includes two offices for Principal and for teaching staff.
 - Includes lock up for curriculum and storage files.
 - 7. Includes large outdoor playground area.
 - 8. Security and insurance to protect from fire, theft, vandalism, water damage, etc. (so much as is insurable) for all school property is in place for the facility to protect:
 - a. All students, staff / faculty, etc.,
 - b. Computers and all high-tech equipment,
 - c. Student files and curriculum,
 - Furniture and all Eagle Advantage, Inc. property.
 - 9. Includes room for perimeter layout of student offices and learning tools for a minimum of 100 students at 30 sq. ft. per pupil. Office space is also available in the immediate area.

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- 10. Four acres of outside recreational area adjoins the church. Parking area is available near by.
- 11. The church has a vision and plans to build more community service facilities in the immediate future and welcomes a school in their Community.
- 12. The pastor has been recognized for his achievement in the community. He has received an honorary doctorate and has a history of more than thirty years of community service in the Dallas area. He served as superintendent of a pre-school, and a full-service educational program for at risk inner city children. The pastor's wife has twenty plus years of business administration experience, and has worked closely with the pastor in his community service endeavors.
- 13. The proposed staff are prepared to administer the school as a high tech academic institution in behalf of the state board of Educators without any confessional religious activity. They are committed to traditional values and individualized high tech learning and the program offered by School Reform, Inc.
- B. Food service will not be provided by the school.

C. Transportation will not be provide by the charter. Sarah Zumwalt Middle School buses, just one block away, bring students to the vicinity and could serve the charter well.

FACILITY USE AGREEMENT

- I. Purpose: This contract is to provide a facility for an open-enrollment charter school for any school age child in the Dallas area, for a period of three (3) years from August 1, 1998 through July 31, 2001.
 - To set up an EAGLE ADVANTAGE high-tech learning center as a model for educational reform for Dallas for the 21st century.
 - For all students, but especially at-risk, adjudicated, dropouts, and college prep.
 - From pre-school and learning to read, to high school graduation and two years of college, as well as adult education.
- II. FOUNTAIN OF THE LIVING WORD CHURCH OF DALLAS, INC. will provide:
 - A. The use of most of what is known as church property and facilities to include:
 - 1. The auditorium for a high-tech learning center, student assemblies, parent teacher orientation and parent advisory meetings;
 - 2. The kitchen facility and dining room for lunch and in-door recreational needs;
 - 3. Boys and girls restrooms;
 - 4. Two offices for Principal and teaching staff;
 - 5. Lock up curriculum and storage files; and
 - 6. Outdoor playground area.

- VI. The extent of this contract will be for a period of three (3) school years with the following considerations:
 - A. Either party may choose to cancel this contract on a thirty (30) day written notice, prior to July 1, 1998.
 - B. This contract is in force for the following school year, through July 1 of any ensuing year.
 - C. This contract may be automatically reinstated after the initial three (3) year period, upon approval of both parties and amended as such.







After review of the open-enrollment charter school application submitted by your organization, staff at the Texas Education Agency has determined that your application is incomplete or proposes a policy or practice that is inconsistent with State or Federal laws. Your application is not eligible for consideration by the State Board of Education until the following items (indicated by a check mark) are supplied to the Agency. Except as provided below, the items must be addressed in writing and submitted to the Agency no later than 5:00 p.m., Tuesday, February 24, 1998. Assurance that the proposed charter school will provide a curriculum designed to address the requirements of Section 28.002, including Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills.

Assurance that the applicant has the ability to compile baseline performance data for students served by the proposed open-enrollment charter school on the assessment instruments adopted under Chapter 39, Subchapter B, including the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills.



2. Assurance that the Applicant has the ability to compile baseline performance data for students served by the proposed open-enrollment charter school on the assessment instruments adopted under Chapter 39, Subchapter B, including the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills.

We assure the S. B.O.E. that our school has the ability to compile baseline performance data for students served by the proposed open-enrollment charter school on the assessment, instruments adopted under Chapter 39, Subchapter B, including the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills by working with School Reformed Inc., and Dr. Donald Howard who will provide the professional diagnosticians and expertise required. For further evidence that S.R.I. can provide this quality of service, see the application references to S.R.I. and Dr. Howard's considerable experience working with over 7,000 schools in over 100 nations.

This is my response letter to your "emergency memo" stating that our application lucked six items:

 Assurance that the proposed charter school will provide a curriculum designed to address the requirements of Section 28,002, including Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills.

Please refer to the Academic Program and related sections on pages 9-11 in the application.

We assure S.B.O.E. that the curriculum meets the requirements of Section 28.002, including Texas Essential Knowledge and skills.

2. Assurance that the Applicant has the ability to compile baseline performance data for students served by the proposed open-enrollment charter school on the assessment instruments adopted under Chapter 39, Subchapter B, including the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills.

We assure the S. B.O.E. that our school has the ability to compile baseline performance data for students served by the proposed open-enrollment charter school on the assessment, instruments adopted under Chapter 39. Subchapter B, including the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills by working with School Reformed Inc., and Dr. Donald Howard who will provide the professional diagnosticians and expertise required. For further evidence that S.R.I. can provide this quality of service, see the application references to S.R.I. and Dr. Howard's considerable experience working with over 7,000 schools in over 100 nations.

3. Evidence that the sponsoring entity of the proposed charter is an organization that is exempt from taxation under Section 501 (c) (3), Internal Revenue Code or has applied for such status. If granted a Charter School, EAGLE ADVANTAGE SCHOOL will provide transportation to a disabled student when required by the student's individual education plan.

I assure the S.B.O.E. that we are seeking to open a high-tech learning center in the Fall of 1998 for 50 to 100 of the least advantaged school children, to give them a dream of success, to diagnose their learning gaps, and to prescribe an individualized learning course of study unique to each child's need. We assure the S.B.O.E. that at least 75% of the students will be economically disadvantaged and/or at risk in one of the lowest performing areas of Dallas, Please refer to the photographs of the Fountain of the Living Word Church Facilities on page 67 through page 70, the map on page 66, and the letter of intent and the Facility Use Agreement on page 61 through page 65.

We would treasure a decision by the State Board of Education to grant an open-enrollment charter school to serve the educational needs of the children in the Sarah Zumwalt Middle School area in the Oak Cliff section of Dallas, to begin in the fall of 1998.

This acknowledges receipt of your application for an exemption from the Limited Sales, Excise and Use Tax as an organization exempted under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Upon examining the information provided, this office has determined that the Harvest Fields, Inc. meets the requirements for exemption as a 501(c)(3) organization. 





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CONTRACT FOR CHARTER

This contract is executed the 26 day of May 1998 between the Texas State Board of Education (the "Board) and Eagle Advantage School ("Charterholder") for an open-enrollment charter to operate a Texas public school.

General

1. Definitions. As used in this contract:

"Charter" means the open-enrollment charter, as provided by Subchapter D, Chapter 12, Texas Education Code (TEC), granted by this contract.

"Charter school" means the open-enrollment charter school. Charterholder agrees to operate as provided in this contract. The charter school is a Texas public school.

"Agency" means the Texas Education Agency.

- 2. The Charter. This contract grants to Charterholder an open-enrollment charter under Subchapter D, Chapter 12, TEC. The terms of the charter include: (a) this contract; (b) applicable law; (c) Request for Application #701-97-028; (d) any condition, amendment, modification, revision or other change to the charter adopted or ratified by the Board and (e) all statements, assurances, commitments and representations made by Charterholder in its application for charter, attachments or related documents, to the extent consistent with (a) through (d).
- Authority Granted by Charter. The charter authorizes Charterholder to operate a charter school subject to the terms of the charter. Action inconsistent with the terms of the charter shall constitute a material violation of the charter.
- 4. Alienation of Charter. The charter may not be assigned, encumbered, pledged or in any way alienated for the benefit of creditors or otherwise. Charterholder may not delegate, assign, subcontract or otherwise alienate any of its rights or responsibilities under the charter. Any attempt to do so shall be null and void and of no force or effect; provided, however, that Charterholder may contract at fair market value for services necessary to carry out policies adopted by Charterholder or the governing body of the charter school.
- 5. <u>Term of Charter</u>. The charter shall be in effect from August 1, 1998 through July 31, 2003, unless renewed or terminated.
- 6. Renewal of Charter. On timely application by Charterholder in a manner prescribed by the Board, the charter may be renewed for an additional period determined by the Board. The charter may be renewed only by

- written amendment approved by vote of the Board and properly executed by its chair.
- 7. Revision by Agreement. The terms of the charter may be revised with the consent of Charterholder by written amendment approved by vote of the Board. The commissioner of education ("the commissioner") may revise the charter on a provisional basis during an interim between Board meetings; however, such action shall expire unless ratified by the Board at its next regular meeting. Nothing in this paragraph limits the authority of the Board or the commissioner to act in accordance with other provisions of this contract.

Students

- 8. Open Enrollment. Admission and enrollment of students shall be open to any person who resides within the geographic boundaries stated in the charter and who is eligible for admission based on lawful criteria identified in the charter. Total enrollment shall not exceed 200 students. The charter school's admission policy shall prohibit discrimination on the basis of sex, national origin, ethnicity, religion, disability, academic or athletic ability, or the district the student would otherwise attend. Students who reside outside the geographic boundaries stated in the charter shall not be admitted to the charter school until all eligible applicants who reside within the boundaries have been enrolled.
- 9. <u>Public Education Grant Students</u>. Charterholder shall adopt an express policy providing for the admission of, and shall admit under such policy, students eligible for a public education grant under Subchapter G, Chapter 29, TEC.
- Non-discrimination. The educational program of the charter school shall be nonsectarian, and shall not discriminate against any student or employee on the basis of race, creed, sex, national origin, religion, disability or need for special education services.
- 11. Children with Disabilities. The charter school is a "local educational agency" as defined by federal law. Charterholder must comply with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), 20 U.S.C. §1401, et seq., and implementing regulations; Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 ("Section 504"), 29 U.S.C.§794, and implementing regulations; Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act, 42 U.S.C. §12131-12165, and implementing regulations; Chapter 29, TEC, and implementing rules; and the many court cases applying these laws. For example:
- (a) Child Find. Charterholder must adopt and implement policies and practices that affirmatively seek out, identify, locate, and evaluate children with disabilities enrolled in the charter school or contacting the charter school regarding enrollment, and must develop and implement a practical

method to determine which children with disabilities are currently receiving needed special education and related services. For each eligible child, Charterholder must develop and offer an individualized education plan appropriate to the needs of that student.

- (b) Free Appropriate Public Education. Charterholder must provide a free appropriate public education to all children with disabilities otherwise eligible to enroll in the charter school. If the program, staff or facilities of the charter school are not capable of meeting the needs of a particular child, Charterholder must implement changes necessary to accommodate the child at the charter school. If reasonable accommodations would be insufficient to enable the child to benefit from the charter school's program, Charterholder must, at its own expense, place the child at an appropriate school.
- (c) <u>Services to Expelled Students</u>. Charterholder must continue to provide a free appropriate public education to a child with disabilities even after expelling or suspending the child for valid disciplinary reasons. This obligation to serve the child continues until the end of the school year.
- (d) Monitoring. The charter school's implementation of the laws governing education of children with disabilities will be monitored for compliance by the United States Department of Education, Office of Special Education Programs; the United States Department of Education, Office of Civil Rights; the Texas Education Agency; and others. This monitoring activity includes responding to complaints, random on-site inspections and other investigations by the enforcing agencies, and will result in corrective actions imposed on Charterholder by these agencies for all discrepancies found.
- (e) <u>Due Process Hearings</u>. The charter school's implementation of the laws governing education of children with disabilities will, in addition, be subject to court supervision via litigation against Charterholder brought by individuals affected by the actions of the charter school. The cost of this litigation can be substantial.

Notice: These are only a few of the charter school's legal responsibilities in this area, included here for illustrative purposes only.

- 12. Student Performance and Accountability. Charterholder shall satisfy Subchapters B, C, D, and G of Chapter 39 of the TEC, and related agency rules, as well as the student performance accountability criteria stated in its application for charter. Charterholder shall annually provide in a manner and form defined by the commissioner a written evaluation of the charter school's compliance with the statements, assurances, commitments and representations made by Charterholder in its application for a charter, attachments, and related documents.
- 13. <u>Criminal History</u>. Charterholder shall take prompt and appropriate measures if Charterholder or the charter school, or any of their employees or agents, obtains information that an employee or volunteer

- of the charter school has a reported criminal history that bears directly on the duties and responsibilities of the employee or volunteer at the school. Charterholder further represents that the Board and the agency shall be notified immediately of such information and the measures taken.
- 14. Reporting Child Abuse or Neglect. Charterholder shall adopt and disseminate to all charter school staff and volunteers a policy governing child abuse reports required by Chapter 261, Texas Family Code. The policy shall state that no employee, volunteer or agent of Charterholder or the charter school can be required to report child abuse or neglect to Charterholder or the charter school. Rather, such reports must be made directly by the person suspecting child abuse or neglect to an appropriate entity listed in Chapter 261, Texas Family Code.
- Notice to District. Charterholder shall notify the school district in which
 the student resides within three business days of any action expelling or
 withdrawing a student from the charter school.
- 16. <u>School Year</u>. Charterholder shall adopt a school year with fixed beginning and ending dates.

Financial Managment

- 17. <u>Fiscal Year</u>. Charterholder shall adopt a fiscal year beginning September 1 and ending August 31.
- 18. <u>Financial Accounting</u>. Charterholder shall comply fully with generally accepted accounting principles ("GAAP") and the Financial Accountability System Resource Guide, Bulletin 679 or its successor ("Bulletin 679") published by the agency in the management and operation of the charter school.
- 19. Annual Audit. Charterholder shall at its own expense have the financial and programmatic operations of the charter school audited annually by a certified public accountant holding a permit from the Texas State Board of Public Accountancy. Charterholder shall file a copy of the annual audit report, approved by Charterholder, with the agency not later than the 120th day after the end of the fiscal year for which the audit was made. The audit must comply with Generally Accepted Auditing Standards and must include an audit of the accuracy of the fiscal information provided by the charter school through PEIMS. Financial statements in the audit must comply with Government Auditing Standards and the Office of Management and Budget Circular 133.
- 20. <u>Attendance Accounting</u>. To the extent required by the commissioner, Charterholder shall comply with the "Student Attendance Accounting Handbook" published by the Agency; provided, however, that

- Charterholder shall report attendance data to the agency at six-week intervals or as directed by the agency.
- 21. Foundation School Program. Funds distributed to the charter school under Section 12.106, TEC shall be calculated and distributed by the agency at six-week intervals. Distribution of funds to the charter school is contingent upon charterholder's compliance with the terms of the charter. Charterholder is ineligible to receive Foundation School Program funds prior to September 1, 1998. Within 30 days of receiving notice of overallocation and request for refund under Section 42.258, TEC, Charterholder shall transmit to the agency an amount equal to the requested refund. If Charterholder fails to make the requested refund, the agency may recover the overallocation by any means permitted by law, including but not limited to the process set forth in Section 42.258, TEC.
- 22. <u>Tuition and Fees</u>. Charterholder shall not charge tuition and shall not charge a fee except that it may charge a fee listed in Subsection 11.158(a), TEC.
- 23. <u>Assets of Charter</u>. Charterholder shall not apply, hold, credit, transfer or otherwise make use of funds, assets or resources of the charter school for any purpose other than operation of the charter school described in the charter.
- 24. <u>Indebtedness of Charter</u>. Charterholder shall not incur a debt, secure an obligation, extend credit, or otherwise make use of the credit or assets of the charter school for any purpose other than operation of the charter school described in the charter.
- 25. Interested Transactions. All financial transactions between the charter school and (a) Charterholder; (b) an officer, director, or employee of Charterholder or of the charter school; or (c) a person or entity having partial or complete control over Charterholder or the charter school shall be separately and clearly reflected in the accounting, auditing, budgeting, reporting, and record keeping systems of the charter school. Charterholder shall not transfer any asset of the charter or incur any debt except in return for goods or services provided for the benefit of the charter school at fair market value.
- 26. Non-Charter Activities. Charterholder shall keep separate and distinct accounting, auditing, budgeting, reporting, and record keeping systems for the management and operation of the charter school. Any business activities of Charterholder not directly related to the management and operation of the charter school shall be kept in separate and distinct accounting, auditing, budgeting, reporting, and record keeping systems from those reflecting activities under the charter. Any commingling of charter and non-charter business in these systems shall be a material violation of the charter.

Governance and Operations

- 27. Non-Profit Status. Charterholder shall take and refrain from all acts necessary to be and remain in good standing as an organization exempt from taxation under Section 501(c)(3), Internal Revenue Code. If Charterholder is incorporated, it shall in addition comply with all applicable laws governing its corporate status. Failure to comply with this paragraph is a material violation of the charter, and the Board may act on the violation even if the Internal Revenue Service, Secretary of State, or other body with jurisdiction has failed to act.
- 28. Records Retention and Management. Charterholder shall implement a records management system that conforms to the system required of school districts under the Local Government Records Act, Section 201.001 et seq., Local Government Code, and rules adopted thereunder; provided, however, that records subject to audit shall be retained and available for audit for a period of not less than five (5) years from the latter of the date of termination or renewal of the charter.
- 29. <u>PEIMS Reporting</u>. Charterholder shall report timely and accurate information to the Public Education Information Management System (PEIMS), as required by the commissioner.
- 30. Conflict of Interest. Charterholder shall comply with any applicable prohibition, restriction or requirement relating to conflicts of interest. If an officer or board member of Charterholder or of the charter school has a substantial interest, within the meaning of Chapter 171, Local Government Code, in a transaction, such interest shall be disclosed in public session at a duly called meeting of the governing body prior to any action on the transaction.
- 31. <u>Disclosure of Campaign Contributions</u>. Charterholder shall adopt policies that will ensure compliance with the disclosure requirements of State Board of Education Operating Rule 4.3 or its successor.
- 32. <u>Indemnification</u>. Charterholder shall hold the Board and agency harmless from and shall indemnify the Board and agency against any and all claims, demands, and causes of action of whatever kind or nature asserted by any third party and occurring or in any way incident to, arising out of, or in connection with wrongful acts of Charterholder, its agents, employees, and subcontractors.
- 33. Failure to Operate. Charterholder shall operate the charter school for the full school term as described in the charter application in each year of the charter contract. Charterholder may not suspend operation for longer than 21 days without a revision to its charter, adopted by the Board, stating that the charter school is dormant and setting forth the date on which operations shall resume and any applicable conditions.

- Suspension of operations in violation of this paragraph shall constitute abandonment of this contract and of the charter.
- 34. Charter School Facility. Charterholder shall have and maintain throughout the term of the charter a lease agreement, title or other legal instrument granting to Charterholder the right to occupy and use one or more facilities suitable for use as the charter school facilities described by the charter. During any period of dormancy granted by the Board, this requirement may be waived by the Board.

Enforcement

- 35. Agency Investigations. The commissioner may in his sound discretion direct the agency to conduct investigations of the charter school to determine compliance with the terms of the charter or as authorized in Sections 39.074 and 39.075, Subchapter D, Chapter 39, TEC or other law. Charterholder, its employees and agents shall fully cooperate with such investigations. Failure to timely comply with reasonable requests for access to sites, personnel, documents or things is a material violation of the charter.
- 36. Commissioner Authority. The commissioner in his sole discretion may take any action authorized by Section 39.131, TEC or Chapter 29, TEC relating to the charter school. Such action is not "adverse action" as used in this contract. Charterholder, its employees and agents shall fully cooperate with such actions. Failure to timely comply with any action authorized by Section 39.131, TEC or Chapter 29, TEC is a material violation of the charter.
- 37. Adverse Action. The Board in its sole discretion may modify, place on probation, revoke or deny timely renewal of the charter for cause ("adverse action"). Each of the following shall be cause for adverse action on the charter: (a) any material violation of the terms of the charter listed in paragraph 2; (b) failure to satisfy generally accepted accounting standards of fiscal management; or (c) failure to comply with an applicable law or rule.

This Agreement

38. Entire Agreement. This contract, including all referenced attachments and terms incorporated by reference, contains the entire agreement of the parties. All prior representations, understandings and discussions are merged into, superseded by and canceled by this contract.

- 1. Conditions of Contract. Execution of this contract by the Board is conditioned on full and timely compliance by Charterholder with: (a) the terms, required assurances and conditions of Request for Application #701-97-028; (b) applicable law; and (c) all commitments and representations made in Charterholder's application and any supporting documents (to the extent such commitments and representations are consistent with the terms of this contract).
- 2. No Waiver of Breach. No assent, express or implied, to any breach of any of the covenants or agreements herein shall waive any succeeding or other breach.
- Venue. Any suit arising under this contract shall be brought in Travis 3. County, Texas.
- 4. Governing Law. In any suit arising under this contract, Texas law shall apply.
- 5. Authority. By executing this contract, Charterholder represents that it is an "eligible entity" within the meaning of Section 12.101 (a), TEC. Charterholder shall immediately notify the Board of any legal change in its status which would disqualify it from holding the charter, of any violation of the terms and conditions of this contract, or of any change in the chief operating officer of the charter school or Charterholder. Charterholder further represents that the person signing this contract has been properly delegated authority to do so.
