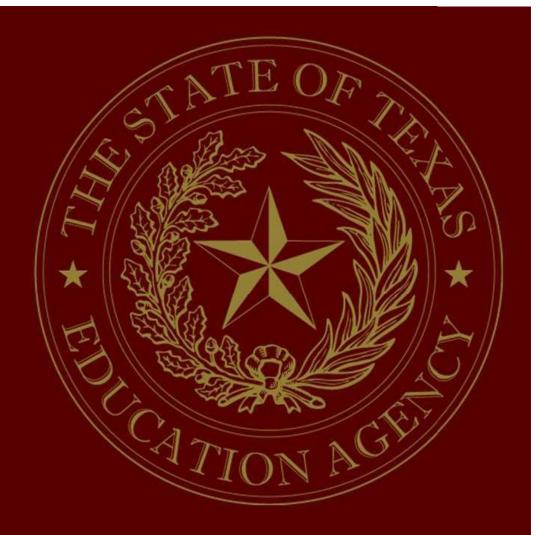

School Overview

Executive Summary

Proposed Community: The Red Brick Academy team is passionate about educational equity and seeks to create an exceptional school in a community that has few high-quality schooling options. Our target neighborhoods, Greenspoint, Acres Homes, and South Spring, are full of vitality and a strong sense of community with outstanding artists, parks, and beautiful mix of urban and rural living. However, options for high-quality primary and secondary schools are sparce. In our target zip code, three in four middle school aged students are attending schools rated C, D, or F, equating to over 10,000 students attending average to failing schools. ¹ We seek to enroll students attending these schools living in a five-mile radius of the 77060 zip code. Students in the Aldine ISD, Houston ISD, Spring ISD, and Klein ISD will be able to attend our school.

Mission and Vision: Red Brick Academy will provide all students with equitable educational experience in an inclusive environment that prepares them for success in college and the career of their choosing. When students graduate from Red Brick Academy in 8th grade, they will be prepared for academic and social success at the most competitive high schools preparing them to thrive in college and the life of their choosing.

Key Design Elements: Red Brick Academy has five key design elements that will allow us to achieve our mission and vision. They include: 1 rigorous inquiry-based questioning that promotes critical thinking and problem solving skills, 2 programs that intentionally build inclusivity through social and emotional learning, 3 strong family engagement programs that create two-way communication and information sharing between staff and families, 4 Data-driven decisions, and 5 Attract, retain, and develop transformational teachers and instructional leaders. Each key design element is implemented through research-based programs that have led to exceptional student outcomes and is designed to meet the specific needs of our expected student demographics.

Providing an equitable education is central to our mission. For us, equity means that every child, no matter their current academic skill level, socioeconomic status, or disability, engages in academics that prepares them for college and receives the individual supports that they need to be successful. We use data and relationships to identify the needs of individual students and use meeting structures and data tracking systems to implement targeted student supports. Key programming that ensures equity includes the following: building time in the day to intentionally teach and reinforce positive social and emotional skills for all students, counseling opportunities for all students who exhibit a need for more individualized and targeted socioemotional development, tiered academic and socioemotional interventions individualized to student need, and gifted and talented

programs built into the daily schedule for high performers. Our college readiness programs include: two periods of English Language Arts and mathematics daily to ensure a strong foundation of literacy and problem solving, inquiry based learning structures that promote critical thinkers and problem solvers, annual college visits to set a vision for the possibilities of life on college campuses, field trips to connect learning in the classroom to applicable professions, and 7th and 8th grade college readiness seminar and family workshops that teach families and students about competitive high school placement and college application processes.

Capacity of the Proposed Board and Superintendent: We have seven proposed board members that have a wealth of experience in academics, finance, law, fundraising, operations, and community engagement and a strong commitment to educational equity. All Directors are Houston residents; three Directors were born and raised in Houston and deeply understand the educational and community landscape which was critical when developing our school design and connecting Red Brick Academy with community members who will help serve our families and students.

The proposed Superintendent, Brittney Jean-Louis, is a Texas native with over 10 years of experience in K-12 education. She began her career as a math teacher leading her students to over 90% proficiency rates on math state exams in all five years as a teacher. She transitioned to leadership where she has led teams to reach similar educational outcomes for students. Most recently, she was the Principal of a growing middle school in New York where her students outperformed the state on the ELA and math state exams in the first year of operations.

Serving our Community: With a commitment to meeting the needs of our community, we will provide a high-quality middle school option for students within their neighborhood and ensure that the voices of all stakeholders continue to be heard when implementing our school initiatives. Additionally, we will partner with community members to integrate community efforts with school programming. Every key design element of our school matches the anticipated needs of the projected student demographics of our school. For example, 89% of our students will be economically disadvantaged and studies show that students living in low-income neighborhoods experience higher levels of trauma that has been exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic.² Given this information, we will implement counseling for all students in need and dedicate a daily advisory class that will teach socioemotional skills that will provide students with positive coping strategies. Furthermore, our restorative discipline system will teach students prosocial skills instead of punishing them for socioemotional skill deficits. We have similar targeted programming for the anticipated 38% of English Learners, 8% of students with disabilities, and 67% of students that will not have grade level reading, writing, and mathematics skills.

Rationale for Proposed Geographic Location

The city of Houston is the most populated county in the Houston Metropolitan Area and the state of Texas. In 2019, the city of Houston recorded a population of about 2.1 million and is expected to continue to grow its residents at a comparatively fast rate.³ The economy is highly industrialized and is a corporate management center. As of 2019, there were 22 Fortune 500 companies headquartered in the Houston region ranking Houston fourth among metro areas in Fortune 500 headquarter locations.⁴ Houston is also a hub for higher education with 28 colleges and universities within the city lines.⁵ Houston is racially diverse with a large Hispanic population. In 2019, 29% of residents were white, 20% were black, 43% were Hispanic, 7% were Asian, 1% identified as other, and 2% had two or more races. In 2018 dollars, the median household income amount was \$51,140 and the poverty rate was 21%.⁶

The proposed neighborhood for Red Brick Academy is the North Houston area. We are targeting enrollment of students living in a five-mile radius of the 77060 zip code including the Greenspoint, Acres Homes, and South Spring neighborhoods. We chose these neighborhoods because, while there are rich cultures and strong community pride, there are few high-quality schooling options for primary and secondary school aged children. More than 3 out of 4 middle school students in these neighborhoods are attending schools rated C, D, or F, equating to over 10,000 students attending average or failing schools, according to the 2019 school performance ratings. We will recruit this group of students in our enrollment strategy and ensure that they receive the high quality schooling option that they deserve.

Across school districts in Texas, there is a negative correlation between socioeconomically disadvantaged students and school performance – school ratings drop as poverty increases. The negative correlation between economically disadvantaged groups and academic performance remains consistent at the school level. All nine traditional public schools within a 5-miles of our proposed school location that received an F rating for the 2018-19 school year served 80% or more economically disadvantaged students. Furthermore, these schools serve the highest percentages of African American students in their districts. Table 1 shows the academic performance of the demographic groups in each independent school district in our proposed attendance zones. Our work is deeply centered around educational equity. We believe that all students deserve access to excellent schools in their neighborhoods and that no demographic marker should be a determination of the quality of education that a student receives.

Connection to the Community

The proposed Superintendent and Academic Board Chair are Texas natives with over 25 years of combined experience teaching and leading in high-poverty communities serving majority students of color. They know that students from high-poverty communities can achieve at the highest levels because they both have a strong record of producing exceptional academic outcomes for at-risk populations. Three out of the 7 board members were born and raised in Houston. They attended district and charter schools in the city and experienced firsthand the wide range of educational offerings and quality within the city. All board members and the proposed Superintendent are people of color 5 Black and 3 Latinx which strongly represents the students and families in Red Brick Academy's proposed school attendance zones.

<u>Innovative School Design to Serve Target Population</u>

Our school design is centered around research-based programming aligned to the needs of our students and intensive supports for teachers that will develop the skills that they

need to provide a high quality, equitable educational experience for all students. We especially focus our programming around supporting students who are economically disadvantaged, have disabilities, are several grade levels behind academically, and are English learners, because they are more likely to experience adverse academic and social outcomes. Similarly to how we support our students, we ensure that our staff have the resources, training, and differentiated supports that allow them to implement our programs successfully and best serve our students. Our innovations are listed below with the specific descriptions for the student population s they are designed to support.

1) Social and emotional learning (SEL): Similar to the demographics of students in the independent school districts in our attendance zones, we anticipate that about 89% of our students will be economically disadvantaged. As trauma is more prevalent in low-income communities, we anticipate that a number of students will have experienced trauma, which can make it more challenging to pay attention in class, relate to others, and/or successfully manage their emotions. Oftentimes, adolescents are not taught the necessary coping mechanism to manage the impacts of traumatic event s leading to low grades and higher drop-out rates, suspensions, and expulsions. EL programs can combat the negative impacts of trauma and result in positive socioemotional growth for all students. Durlak and Mahoney's research found that 27% of students improved their academic performance and 24% showed improved social behaviors and lower levels of distress in one school year with the implementation of programs that incorporated social and emotional learning SEL. Additionally, with the implementation of school-wide social and emotional learning SEL programs, the number of bullying incidents decrease significantly.

At Red Brick Academy, we will implement social and emotional learning SEL programs SEL curriculum taught in daily advisory and reinforced throughout the day by SEL trained staff, counseling support for all students in need, weekly community meetings, and a non-punitive Responsive Classroom disciple system) that help students develop skills in self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision making. These programs will teach and reinforce the prosocial skills that students need to combat the effects of trauma and positively interact with members of their communities. In addition to training staff to reinforce SEL skills throughout the day, we will also implement structures to support teachers and leaders' emotional wellbeing as they may be negatively impacted by being a caregiver to students who exhibit stressors due to trauma. Ensuring that our teachers and leaders are cared for emotionally will help them to model, teach, and reinforce the prosocial skills that we want to see in students leading to a positive and safe school climate for all members of our community. outline our social and emotional learning programs in more detail in the "Key Design Elements" section of this application.

Aldine ISD and Houston ISD have published SEL programs, but they do not have a designated period built into the daily schedule to teach all students the SEL strategies. Furthermore, Red Brick Academy teachers will receive about 3 times as much coaching and training time that will ensure SEL strategies and skills are successfully taught and reinforced during advisory and throughout the school day. The SEL system requires sufficient staffing to be implemented with fidelity. Our designated SEL staff to student ratio at full enrollment of 1 to 108 is significantly higher than neighboring school districts allowing for more targeted SEL support for teachers and students.

- 2) Inquiry-Based Learning with a Deep Focus on Literacy and Math: Our unwavering focus on building key literacy and math skills will ensure our students have a strong set of critical thinking and problem-solving abilities that will prepare them to thrive in college and the career of their choosing. We will ensure that all of our students are performing at or above grade level by implementing rigorous inquiry-based curricula that reinforces deep learning, daily English Language Arts ELA and math intervention and enrichment blocks, daily double class periods of ELA and math, literacy training for all content teachers, and family workshops that help families support their children academically at home. The double periods of ELA and math classes, combined with the daily intervention period, add up to over 2.5 times more literacy and math supports throughout the school year when compared to neighboring school districts.
- **3) Intensive Supports for Teachers:** We provide intensive coaching models e.g., live coaching, weekly differentiated one-on-one coaching meetings, twice weekly content team meetings, full-day professional development [PD] sessions, and weekly Friday afternoon PD) for all teachers because we believe that teacher quality is at the heart of any high-quality school. We schedule over 320 hours or 40 workdays of professional development for teachers annually so they have the skills, mindsets, and knowledge to implement all school programs in excellence. The amount of training that our staff receives is more than three times as much as a teacher would receive in neighboring traditional independent school districts. Additionally, each teacher will have a content-specific instructional leader to guide their differentiated development.
- **4) Multi-tiered System of Support (MTSS:** Red Brick Academy will utilize a multi-tiered system of support MTSS) to identify, track, and provide support for all students. Although this system is designed to support all students, students with disabilities and students with significant academic and behavioral gaps will especially benefit from the structures because of the data-driven approach that becomes more individualized as a student

needs more support.¹⁸ MTSS also promotes collaboration between school and families, which strengthens the individualized support plans for students with disabilities and struggling students. Some neighboring school districts utilize MTSS, however, our common planning time with content teachers and designated intervention block that equates to over 140 additional hours of academic support, provides designated time in the daily schedule to meet regularly to discuss and implement MTSS interventions. The additional professional development that our staff receives will also lead to stronger implementation.

Target Zip Codes and Impacted School Districts

We will welcome students from Aldine ISD, Houston ISD, Spring ISD, and Klein ISD to attend our school. We chose Aldine ISD, Houston ISD, and Spring ISD because they are the districts in our target attendance zone that serve a higher than state percentage of economically disadvantaged students i.e., a third or more students who are living in poverty and are performing below the state average on state exams. ¹⁹ Klein ISD is a neighboring school district with relatively strong academic data; all of their schools are rated either A, B, or C. However, we included them in our attendance zone because African Americans, Hispanics, and students with disabilities are performing below district averages. Families in Klein ISD with students in these demographic groups may want another schooling option that produces stronger outcomes for their children. As such, we included Klein ISD in our attendance zone. Table 2 shows the demographic data of our target zip codes.

Number of Campuses

Our goal is to build excellent schools in communities of need. We understand that building excellent schools requires a relentless focus on the pursuit of our goals while

remaining aligned to our school values. We have a robust plan to build one high-performing school serving as many students as our resources and community demand will allow. We will focus all of our efforts on making our first school exemplary before replicating our model. After we have a solid foundation with one campus, we may apply for additional campuses.

Student Enrollment and Growth Plan

We will start with 5th and 6th grade in year 1 and add one grade per year until we reach full growth in our third year of operations. Slow and steady growth will allow our team to effectively prepare our academic, operational, cultural, and financial programming to best serve our students.²⁰ Our target enrollment per grade is 108 students with 27 students per class which allows for classroom sizes conducive for learning and layering of staff to ensure financial sustainability and the capacity to recruit and hire the very best teachers and administrators.

Community Engagement

Community engagement was our first priority when working to build Red Brick Academy, because our goal is to design a school to meet the needs and desires of the community that we would serve. We ensured outreach to students, families, business owners, elected officials, educators, and community leaders to get their input and gain support. COVID-19 presented challenges to typical community outreach programs i.e., door-to-door canvassing, tabling events, and in-person informational sessions. However, despite these challenges, we were able to engage the community to solicit feedback and gather valuable input. Red Brick Academy board members and the proposed Superintendent held four virtual informational sessions and input meetings; connected with elected officials and community business owners over the phone, email, and via Zoom videoconferencing; partnered with organizations such as Families Empowered to hold a Facebook Live question and answer session; leveraged our social media platforms to spread the word about the school; and distributed student surveys to give feedback on our school design. Each community event included an option to translate in Spanish to make it accessible to Spanish speaking participants.

The information that we gathered from Houston stakeholders were incorporated into our school design including the following: adding additional time in the school day and school calendar, robust academic and socioemotional interventions for struggling students, intensive teacher development structures, regular joy events, a challenging curriculum, and strategic community partners to support our families and students.

We have engaged with over 350 Houston stakeholders including organizational/business leaders, students, families, and educators to gain an understanding of the educational, political, and social dynamics in the North Houston community. From conversations with organizational leaders, we gathered that many children of color attend low-performing schools by design. Strategic zoning has left them with neighborhood schools that do not successfully prepare them for academic success. There are a few schools sprinkled throughout the neighborhood that are highly sought after, but there are not enough openings for every child whose family wants them to attend these schools. They also spoke about the need for schools to use resources in the community to help students and families. The families whom we connected with are most excited about a school that prepares their children to go to college. The majority were also in favor of key design elements such as: longer school days and school calendar, uniforms, and firm yet supportive discipline structures. Educators in our input meetings highlighted the

importance of having intervention structures, especially given the challenges of COVID-19, for struggling learners, opportunities for students to build relationships across lines of difference, a supporting school administration, and strong professional development supports that ensure staff members have the skills to implement the school programs in high quality. We collected over 60 surveys from middle school students. The surveys highlighted that they think good teachers, a respectful community, and fun events make a great school. Sixty percent of students reported that they strongly believe that they learn more when their work is challenging. Surprisingly, more than half of the students were in favor of longer school days and school calendar because it gave them more time with their friends and opportunities for tutoring and clubs after school. However, the majority 61% was strongly against uniforms even though parents/guardians where highly in favor of uniforms.

Attachment 4 shows evidence of outreach and support through advertisements, letters of support, and over 1,000 community members reached during our input meetings.

We have reached out to impacted school districts and State Board of Education members and Elected Officials to create positive relationships that will result in all parties better serving our students and families. We will continue our outreach efforts of impacted school districts and elected officials after submitting the charter application but will adhere to the no contact period for TEA staff and SBOE members. **Attachment 5** includes the certified mail receipt cards for the letters of impact.

We held four virtual input meetings and one official public hearing in January. During these meetings, we reached over 200 live participants. The video of the input meeting with Families Empowered has 959 unique viewers as of Jan. 12, 2021. **Attachment 6** includes the published notice of our January public meeting.

<u>Mission:</u> Red Brick Academy provides an equitable educational experience in an inclusive environment that prepares all scholars to succeed in college and the future of their choosing.

<u>Vision:</u> All Red Brick Academy students have mastered the grade level academic and socioemotional skills to compete at the most competitive high schools in preparation for college matriculation.

<u>Equity Statement:</u> Red Brick Academy is a community that understands that being inclusive of all members means consistently evaluating and strengthening our relationships, systems, policies, and individual mindsets to ensure all members have equitable access to resources, opportunities, dignity, and respect.

School Design Process and Stakeholder Input: The proposed Superintendent and Red Brick Academy board members arrived at the mission and key design elements by researching the landscape in Harris County to identify the educational needs; soliciting feedback on our school design from community members businesses, families, students, and educators; and researching best practices of high performing schools across the country by connecting with school leaders of high performing schools and studying high performing school designs. The information that we gathered from Houston stakeholders through our community engagement were incorporated into our school design including the following: adding additional time in the school day and school calendar, robust academic and socioemotional interventions for struggling students, intensive teacher development structures, regular joy events, a challenging curriculum, robust family engagement strategies, and strategic community partners to support our families and students. We believe that centering our programming around the following key design elements will allow us to realize our ambitious mission.

What makes us different?

Inquiry based learning, intensive supports for teachers, SEL programs, and college readiness programs and their unique implementation makes our program offerings at Red Brick Academy unique. We outline the details of these unique elements below, in our key design elements, and throughout this charter application.

- **1. Inquiry Based Learning:** Red Brick Academy incorporates a rigorous, college readiness academic program that is aligned to Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills TEKS). We are different in the way that we implement this curriculum through an inquiry-based approach that promotes critical thinking and problem-solving. Rather than relying on the traditional methods of rote memorization and recall that is inherent in many traditional direct instruction models, and which do not promote deeper understanding of content and skills, teachers will use inquiry-based questioning that ignites students' curiosity, requires students to think critically e.g., analyze, justify, debate, problem-solve through interactive learning structures, and take ownership of their own learning.
- **2. Intensive Supports for Teachers:** Red Brick Academy will provide intensive coaching models for all teachers because we believe that teacher quality is at the heart of any high-quality school. We will schedule over 320 hours or 40 workdays of professional development for teachers, about three times as much as impacted school districts, so they have the skills, mindsets, and knowledge to implement all school programs in excellence.
- 3. Social and Emotional Learning SEL) Programs for all Students: Studies have shown that SEL programs can improve academic performance, lower distress, and improve social behaviors.²⁵ We prioritize students' social and emotional development as much as we prioritize their academic development because we aim to support all student with developing prosocial skills that will prepare them to engage positively with those in their current and college communities as well as combat the negative effects of traumas our students may face due to poverty, abuse, witnessing violence, and incarceration.²⁶ A study conducted by the American Psychological Association found that more than two thirds of children reported experiencing a traumatic event by the age of 16.27 We understand that this will not be the reality of all of our students, but because we want to provide an equitable experience for all students, including those who have experienced traumas, we will implement programs that help all students to develop positive coping strategies and positive ways of relating to themselves and others. Unlike neighboring school districts, all scholars will be taught prosocial skills during a daily advisory period and counselors will be available for any student in need. Additionally, we have a designated leadership position to oversee the social and emotional programs at our school.
- **4. College Readiness Programs**: We prioritize college preparation because a college degree can lead to more economic mobility, opportunities to engage with diverse groups on college campuses, a wider range of career options, and greater job security.²⁸ All Red Brick Academy students will have the skills to thrive in college even if they ultimately decide in a different path. We do not define success for our students and families. Most families that we engaged with during community outreach activities shared that college

readiness was something that they would want in their school. However, some families will decide that there are other post-high school options that better serve their life goals like being in the military or choosing a technical training program. Our goal is to give our students and families the option to choose what is best for them while preparing all students for the option to succeed in college. Our college readiness programs include: double periods of English Language Arts and math to ensure a strong foundation of literacy and problem solving, inquiry based learning structures that promote critical thinkers and problem solvers, annual college visits to set a vision for the possibilities of life on college campuses, field trips to connect learning in the classroom to applicable professions, and 7th and 8th grade college readiness seminar and family workshops that teach families and students about competitive high school placement and college application processes.

Key Design Elements

Key design element #1: Rigorous inquiry-based questioning that promotes critical thinking and problem-solving skills

To prepare our students to succeed in college and compete in their future careers, we must intentionally reinforce and cultivate problem-solving and critical thinking skills that will allow them to solve the problems of the future.²⁹ In the 20th century, 95% of jobs required the ability to follow straightforward directions in factory settings. Today, these jobs only make up about 10% of the U.S. economy.³⁰ As such, it is insufficient for instruction to require only rote memorization of disconnected facts and recall of information. In addition to building foundational fluency skills, we must give students opportunities to build problem-solving and critical thinking skills, as these prepare students for high-skilled jobs.³¹

At Red Brick Academy, all core content classes math, ELA, science, and social studies will use inquiry-based questioning that promotes independent thought and action and encourages students to take ownership of their learning.³² The approach includes starting each lesson with an essential question that will drive the learning for the class period and is connected to an overarching global concept for the unit. Students work in groups or independently to tackle the problem before any direct instruction or facilitation from the teacher takes place. Afterwards, the teacher asks questions that spark background knowledge about the objective for the day. This step is important because research suggests that real-world connections to learning in the classroom increases students' curiosity about the topic and activates sensory experiences that promote deep learning.³³ The teacher then asks a series of "herding questions" until students successfully master

the objective. Herding questions are transferable, higher order thinking questions at the highest levels of Bloom's Taxonomy³⁴ e.g., analyze, compare, explain, justify, create. Students will have the opportunity to answer these questions independently and in groups, in writing and verbally, practicing the necessary skills to achieve the objective.

Many students living in high poverty communities have little exposure to grade-level appropriate learning, including learning that engages higher-order thinking skills, resulting in their significant underperformance on state exams and lack of post-high school options. This oftentimes occurs because students are given a "watered down" curriculum that is not on grade level with the assumption that more rigorous programming may be too challenging for them to grasp.³⁵ At Red Brick Academy, we believe that all students can achieve at the highest levels with high-quality teaching and the appropriate supports that promote equity. Given the academic data of neighboring school districts, we anticipate that only about one in every three students will enter the school on grade level.³⁶ Still, we will maintain our high bar of inquiry-based questioning and grade level instruction while including time in the day for additional ELA and math skill development and interventions. Our schedule includes double blocks of math and ELA instruction, Mondays through Thursdays. There is an additional 45-minute intervention block on these days during which teachers will hold small group targeted instruction for students who are struggling academically. This will also be the period when gifted and talented students receive accelerated academic programming. To give students more time to develop grade level skills, we included more instructional time in the calendar by extending our school day and school calendar resulting in over 30 additional days of school each calendar year. Additionally, the Family Engagement and External Partnerships Coordinator will incorporate literacy and math strategies training workshops for families, so they have the tools to support their child's development at home.

Key design element #2: Programs that intentionally build inclusivity through social and emotional learning

Based on significant research around the traumas many students experienced due to the compounding effects of COVID-19 and poverty on students, we anticipate that at least two-thirds of our students will require mental health supports.³⁷ Furthermore, the number of bullying incidents peak during middle school grades as students try to assert dominance in a new social environment when they transition from elementary school.³⁸

Red Brick Academy SEL Programs include: 1) a research-based SEL curriculum, Second Step³⁹, aligned to Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning CASEL SEL standards taught in advisory daily and reinforced by teachers and administrators throughout the school day; 2) counseling supports for all students in need; 3) weekly community meetings; and 4) a non-punitive Responsive Classroom discipline system.

During advisory, students will have 30 minutes daily to engage in the research-based SEL curriculum and community building activities. Students who need more intensive social and emotional support may receive tier 2 or tier 3 supports including, but not limited to, individual or small group counseling targeting specific SEL gaps, check-in/check-out with a trusted adult, family conferences, student mentoring, and/or a Functional Behavior Assessment FBA. At full capacity, we will staff one counselor for every two grades that we serve. Additionally, the entire Red Brick Community will engage in weekly community meetings to celebrate academic excellence, build school pride, and participate in cultural events, student performances, and community revitalization projects. We will also implement a non-punitive Responsive Classroom approach to discipline that teachers rather than punishes students while they are on their socioemotional development journey. More details about these structures can be found in the "School Culture and Safety" section of this application.

Opportunities for social and emotional learning occur throughout the entire school day and prevention is key to building an inclusive learning environment.⁴² As such, our teachers will engage in regular SEL professional development and coaching sessions to teach best practices in building positive relationships with students and modeling, reinforcing, and expanding SEL prosocial behaviors.⁴³

Educators who teach students who exhibit stress due to the effects of trauma may take on similar stressors.⁴⁴ To aid teachers in decreasing their stress levels, we will cultivate a trusting work environment through community building activities, affinity group meetings, and inclusivity and bias training for all staff. ⁴⁵ Additionally, we will partner with external trainers to provide monthly wellness events such as physical and mental health exercise, anxiety-decreasing strategies, and mindfulness meditation. Key design element #3: Strong family engagement programs that create two-way communication and information sharing between the school and families

Red Brick Academy staff views families as partners. Staff will work alongside families to provide an equitable learning experience for their children. There are many benefits to scholars when schools build positive relationships with families; several studies have identified that strong family engagement can lead to improved student achievement, decreased disciplinary infractions, and stronger relationships between family and teacher resulting and a stronger relationship between teacher and student.⁴⁶

We have cultivated strong engagement with families since the very beginning of our school founding by holding input sessions and collecting surveys to garner feedback about Red Brick Academy's design. Their input has highlighted a need for regular communication with families about their child's academic and social progress, community building cultural events, a robust family association, family-teacher conferences, and monthly family workshops that include topics such as: advocating for their child's needs; making the most of a child's summer; time management at home; family book clubs; foundational literacy and math skills classes; and techniques for encouraging positive behaviors in adolescents.⁴⁷ Through bi-annual feedback surveys, family-teacher conferences, weekly communication with teachers, and a suggestion box located in the front office, families will have a critical voice regarding the direction of the school.

Finally, when a student joins Red Brick Academy, we will schedule an in-person meeting for families to meet key personnel at the school and begin to build a relationship of trust and collaboration in a locale that is most comfortable for them. When possible, and with the permission of families, school personnel will conduct home visits so that teachers and leaders can get a glimpse into the lives of the children that we support creating a foundation of cultural competency.

Key design element #4: Data-driven decisions

Red Brick Academy is committed to using data to inform decisions and track progress on school goals. Every key design element and critical initiative for the school will have corresponding goals that are measured and tracked regularly to allow for continuous improvement and clarity about our school's performance.

<u>Data-driven instruction in the classroom:</u> Student's academic performance is the most critical data that Red Brick Academy staff members, families, and board members will collect, analyze, and create action plans around. Doing so will allow us to assess the efficacy of our academic programming while also serving to identify students who may

need remediation or enrichment opportunities. The four pillars of effective data-driven instruction include assessment, analysis, action, and a data-driven culture.⁴⁸

- Assessments: Teachers and instructional leaders will use formative assessments in the form of daily exit tickets, weekly quizzes, and checks for understanding during class. Teachers will use summative assessments in the form of unit tests, quarterly interim assessments, annual State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness STAAR) testing, and triannual Northwest Evaluation Association Measures NWEA Measures of Progress MAP.
- **Analysis:** During biweekly content team meetings, full data-dive days, Friday afternoon PD, and personal planning time, teachers and instructional leaders will analyze student work and assessment data to identify trends and create remediation plans for full class groups and individual students.
- Action: Teachers and instructional leaders will use their analysis from checks for understandings during class and daily exit tickets to do full group remediation during class discussions. They will take every moment of independent work time during class to coach individual scholars who have not shown mastery. Additionally, they will hold small group remediation sessions during the daily intervention block for students who did not show proficiency on the most recent exams. Students who are significantly below grade level two or more grades will be strongly encouraged to stay for afterschool tutoring. We will work with families to eliminate barriers for this additional support.
- Data-driven culture: All stakeholders will use data to drive decision-making and track progress on goals. Student data will be posted throughout the halls and in classrooms to celebrate academic excellence and reinforce scholars who are achieving at the highest levels and/or showing the most growth. Families will receive progress reports every two weeks. Teachers and instructional leaders will use student data to drive their coaching meetings. Leaders and board members will use data in monthly board meetings from student assessments, family surveys, observations, and staff evaluations to create multi-year strategic goals and track progress on near- and long-term goals. All Red Brick Academy staff will have access to and utilize a school dashboard that includes academic data for the children they teach, as well as attendance, discipline, and SEL data. 49 The dashboard will give teachers and administrators a wholistic view of each child to ensure all students receive appropriate supports. This data will also be used in grade level team meetings to help develop robust support plans for low performing scholars and will be shared with our Academic Achievement Committee and full board each month. We will utilize SchoolRunner for this data tracking system. See line 104 in the budget section of the financial workbook for details about the allocation of funds for this programming.

Key design element #5: Attract, retain, and develop transformational teachers and instructional leaders

Teacher quality is the most important factor that drives student achievement.⁵⁰ As such, we invest deeply in attracting and retaining top talent and developing all teachers. In the same way that we ensure our students have what they need to be successful, we ensure that our teachers have the resources, training, and supports necessary for them to effectively carry out our ambitious mission. See lines 110, 111, and 118 in the budget section of the financial workbook for details about the allocation of funds for this programming.

The first step to ensuring that every child has an effective teacher is attracting top talent through promoting a positive work environment of respect and care, offering competitive salaries, and providing professional support.⁵¹ To identify highly skilled, mission-aligned staff, we will implement an equitable hiring process that includes multiple vetting activities to assess core competencies for the role, cultural competency, professionalism, and growth mindset. In addition to attracting and identifying top talent, we will intentionally incorporate retention strategies that encourage our top talent to stay with us long term. These include retention bonuses, monthly wellness events, and the cultivation of a respectful and collaborative working environment.⁵²

We understand that all teachers are continuously improving and will need professional development. We will implement a variety of professional development opportunities at Red Brick Academy, allowing all teachers to engage in differentiated supports that promote their growth. Teachers will engage in over 320 hours or 40 workdays) of professional development each year. Before the school year begins, teachers will participate in a three-week orientation during which they will be immersed in the mission, vision, and school policies; work with their content teams to norm on content specific and instructional best practices tied to academic achievement; gain a deep understand of students' developmental needs by age level; learn differentiation strategies and specific supports for English learners and students with disabilities; practice successfully implementing our behavior management systems through live practices and scenario discussions; and begin to build trusting relationships with colleagues through teambuilding activities. Throughout the year, instructional leaders will give regular feedback and coaching to teachers through classroom observations, full day professional development sessions data dive days, content team meetings, Friday afternoon PDs, and one-on-one coaching. Additional details about our support for teachers is outlined in the "Professional Development and Evaluation" section of this application.

Curriculum and Instruction

At the core of our curriculum and instruction approach is educational equity. At Red Brick Academy, we will use grade-level TEKS aligned curriculum taught by highly effective teachers skilled at inquiry-based questioning, differentiation strategies, and academic interventions to ensure that we realize our mission of providing an equitable educational experience for all learners.

Overview of Course Offerings

Our course offerings are fully in compliance with state statutes.⁵³ Students will take a combination of foundational and extracurricular courses that will build their college readiness essential skills and knowledge. The foundational course offerings for grades 5 through 8 will include two class periods of English Language Arts ELA, two class periods of mathematics, one period of science and one period of social studies daily.

Research has shown that extracurricular activities can increase student engagement in school, promote physical and mental health, and make students less likely to drop out of school and disengage in their core classes. As such, in addition to the foundational courses, students at Red Brick Academy will participate in daily extracurricular classes. Students will take two enrichment classes per year that will rotate on a Monday/Wednesday and Tuesday/Thursday schedule. One rotation will include health/physical education and the other will be largely based on student choice, when possible, and include: art, dance, theatre, computer fluency, civic engagement, and debate. Core enrichment classes that must be taken in grades 7 and 8 include computer fluency, civic engagement, and college readiness. In addition to enrichment classes, students will have the option to participate in afterschool clubs and sports.

Overview of Foundational Course Curricula

The curriculum at Red Brick Academy promotes problem-solving and critical thinking skills through inquiry-based learning structures aligned to the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills TEKS standards. The inquiry-based approach to instruction will prepare students with the critical thinking and problem-solving skills needed for college success. The curricula for our foundational courses were chosen because of the strong alignment to TEKS, the options for scaffolding to make learning accessible to struggling learners, the year-long scope and sequences, vertical alignment from grade level to grade level, rigorous objectives aligned with daily lessons, inquiry-based activities, and evidence of

successful implementation that results in positive student academic outcomes. See line 100 in the budget section of the financial workbook for details about the allocation of funds for curriculum purchases.

Eureka Math⁵⁵ This mathematics curriculum promotes conceptual understanding and requires students to build math fluency skills, tackle real world problems, and explain how and why math works. Effective math problems are open ended and allow for multiple strategies of problem solving.⁵⁶ A sample scope and sequence for 5th grade math can be found in **Attachment 7.**

Expeditionary Learning⁵⁷ This English Language Arts ELA) curriculum is a blended model of reading and writing. Reading curriculum requires students to use text evidence and the author's purpose and literary devices to understand the deepest meaning of the text.⁵⁸ The writing curriculum engages students in constructing claims that are clear, well-organized, uses text evidence, and grammatically sound. Students receive regular feedback on their writing and engage fully in the iterative process.⁵⁹

Amplify Science⁶⁰ This science curriculum emphasizes a hands-on approach of collecting and analyzing evidence from multiple sources to reason about how the natural world works.⁶¹

The Choice Program⁶² This social studies curriculum requires students to analyze primary and secondary sources from diverse perspectives to connect historical events to present day happenings.⁶³

Extracurricular curricula builds students' physical strength and endurance; reinforces learnings in foundational course; and teaches teamwork, personal and group responsibility, and leadership.⁶⁴ The curriculum will be created by extracurricular teachers and aligned to TEKS and Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning CASEL standards.

SEL Curriculum

We will use the Second Step program, a research-based SEL curriculum aligned to CASEL standards to teach SEL skills during advisory each morning. The Second Step lessons

include a variety of instructional tools including videos, direct instruction, group and partner discussion, interactive homework, and behavioral skill practice. The program is aligned to the developmental needs of each grade level and builds on previous years' concepts year after year. The units in the middle school programs include the following: mindsets and goals; bullying and harassment; thoughts, emotions, and decisions; managing relationships and social conflict⁶⁵

Evaluation of the Curriculum

Data-driven decision-making is central to our programming and one of our key design elements. All stakeholders will apply the theories of data-driven decision-making to assess, analyze, and create action plans at regular intervals throughout the year in order to continuously improve all core programming, including curriculum. The primary method of accessing the efficacy of the curriculum is by analyzing students' academic and behavioral outcomes as measured by classroom observations, student surveys, discipline data, unit assessments, interim assessments, academic growth assessments, STAAR exam results, and academic progress of special populations. Our data dashboard will allow us to answer key questions about the efficacy of our curriculum such as: did students meet academic goals? Are all special populations and demographic groups achieving at the same levels? Is there evidence of inclusivity and positive classroom climates? The data will show areas of strengths and weakness that instructional leaders and teachers will use to iterate curriculum during weekly content and coaching meetings. Annually in the spring, the Instructional Leadership Team will meet to review the academic data from the year and make any necessary adjustments to the curriculum for the following year. More details about our data-driven approach can be found in the "Strategies for Assessment of Learning and Data-Driven Instruction" section of this application.

Effective Instructional Strategies

Teachers will utilize the inquiry-based, TEKS-aligned curricula and effectively implement our key instructional priorities that promote problem-solving and critical thinking skills that are essential for success in college and career. Our core instructional practices include backwards planning, data-driven instruction, inquiry-based questioning structures, differentiation and targeted intervention strategies that reach all learners, and a safe and inclusive learning environment through cultural proficiency as well as explicit teaching of routines and procedures.

Backwards Planning from TEKS and SEL Standards: Our teachers will use the curriculum outlined above for our foundational courses, but they will need to supplement the curriculum to reflect our specific student population and respond to student data effectively. As such, all teachers will be trained during staff orientation at the beginning of the year in the steps of backwards planning: 1) identify desired results big ideas and skills; 2 determine acceptable evidence assessments; and, 3) plan learning experiences

and instruction.⁶⁶ At Red Brick Academy, the ultimate goal is for all students to master the TEKS standards and CASEL SEL core competencies.⁶⁷ Teachers will have a clear vision of the end goals and use the backwards design approach to break down standards and plan lessons that build to the successful mastery of the standards.

Data-Driven Instruction: At Red Brick Academy, we measure our effectiveness as educators by what students have learned and not what we taught. The best way to understand what students have learned is by using formative and summative assessments that give students an opportunity to demonstrate their understanding of concepts that were taught.⁶⁸ Our teachers will use the data from these assessments to identify common misconceptions and struggling students and formulate a plan for how and when they will fill these gaps. A more detailed plan for our data-driven approach can be found in the "Strategies for Assessment of Learning and Data-Driven Instruction" section of this application.

Inquiry-based questioning and interactive learning structures: Inquiry-based questioning promotes independent thought and action and encourages students to take ownership of their learning.⁶⁹ The approach includes starting each lesson with an essential question that will drive the learning for the class period and is connected to an overarching global concept for the unit. Students will work in groups or independently to tackle the problem before any direct instruction or facilitation happens from the teacher. Afterwards, the teacher will ask questions that spark background knowledge about the objective for the day. This step is important because research suggests that real-world connections to learning in the classroom increases students' curiosity about the topic and activates sensory experiences that promote deep learning.⁷⁰ The teacher will then ask a series of "herding questions" until students successfully master the objective. Herding questions are transferable, higher-order thinking questions at the top of Bloom's Taxonomy e.g., analyze, compare, explain, justify, create. Students will answer these questions independently and in groups, in writing and verbally, practicing the necessary skills to achieve the objective.

At Red Brick Academy, teachers will implement interactive learning structures that are designed to gain and hold the attention of learners for long periods of time. Teachers will include strong lesson openers that connect the *why* of the lesson and activates prior knowledge. All lessons will include opportunities for full-class discussions, independent work, and group work. Teachers will center lessons around activities that require students to take a stand and justify their positions using evidence. For example, lessons will incorporate debates, presentations, mathematical proofs, or Socratic seminars. Teachers

will also give students opportunities to regularly reflect and share their conclusions verbally and in writing.⁷¹

Differentiation and Intervention Strategies to Reach All Learners: We are dedicated to educational equity which means that we will ensure that each learner has what they need to be successful. All teachers will be trained to differentiate their instruction and curriculum to meet the needs of all students including students with disabilities, English language learners, and students identified as gifted and talented. Teachers will implement differentiation strategies such as stations, visual aids, tiered lessons, strategic groupings, and the Sheltered Instruction Observation Protocol SIOP).⁷² In addition to providing individualized supports for students with disabilities, the school will also implement a multi-tiered system of supports MTSS for all students as explained above. A detailed description of these programs can be found in the "Support for Special Populations" section of this application.

Promoting a Safe and Inclusive Learning Environment: A safe and positive learning environment will allow students to take academic risks and fully focus on their academics. The building of such an environment takes intentional planning and expertise. In addition to the culture training outlined in the "Culture and Safety" sections of this application, teachers will also implement cultural proficiency techniques and classroom routines and procedures that optimize learning time and creates an emotional and physically safe environment.⁷³

According to Jon Saphier, cultural proficiency is the ability to understand and value the culture of students and use this information to remove barriers to accessing academic and social success at school. Cultural proficiency is an important skill for teachers because, oftentimes, there are differences in home and school culture that can impact the way students engage with the curriculum and members of the school community. Teachers must be ready to adjust their approach to ensure student success. All educators at Red Brick Academy will learn about the culture of our students through identity shares during advisory, home visits, and family workshops. They will also engage in personal identity and mindset reflections as well as inclusivity trainings about implicit biases, microaggressions, and stereotypes taught by trained facilitators. See line 110 in the budget section of the financial workbook for the allocation of funds for this programming.

Classroom procedures and routines create predictability for reoccurring activities resulting in lessening anxieties and misbehaviors.⁷⁶ They also automate low thinking activities to give students more brain space and instructional time for deep academic,

socioemotional learning. Our teachers will teach routines and procedures through the Responsive Classroom Interactive Modeling approach. The approach gives students a clear rationale for why a routine or procedure is in place and a visual for the successful execution of the routine or procedure. Classroom routines and procedures will include how to pass in and out papers, collect necessary materials, enter and exit the classroom, and gain permission to leave the classroom independently.

Teacher Supports

We understand that our school programming is ambitious and requires all teachers and leaders to be highly skilled professionals. We will hold high expectations for meeting our goals while also offering high levels of support and development. Our teachers are our greatest asset, and we will invest in them accordingly with targeted professional development, competitive salaries, and clear promotional pathways.

Each teacher will have a coach with content expertise to support their development. The Assistant Principal of Humanities will support the development of ELA and social studies teachers. The Assistant Principal of Math and Science will support the development of math and science teachers. The SEL Coordinator will support extracurricular teachers. All leaders will conduct observations, live coach teachers, and lead individual and group professional development sessions in the departments that they lead. They will use instructional tools to drive teacher effectiveness included in manuals such as *The Get Better Faster Scope and Sequence, Leverage Leadership*, and *The Skillful Teacher*.⁷⁸

Instructional leaders will report to the Superintendent who will facilitate their leadership development. Instructional leaders will engage in a four-week leadership course during the month of July that will build their skill in developing an effective leader schedule, classroom observations, one-one-one coaching meetings, building a positive classroom climate through the Responsive Classroom approach, leading with equity, effective feedback structures, and leading during all-hands activities e.g., arrival, lunch, dismissal, community meetings. They will also have a weekly meeting with the Superintendent for differentiated training throughout the year.

Strategies for Assessment of Learning and Data-Driven Instruction

Assessments are an essential component of our data-driven instruction see Key Design Elements because they provide insight into what students have mastered and have yet to master. We will analyze assessment data to create action plans that fill academic gaps for struggling students and provide enrichment opportunities to push high performers even further. We use a combination of baseline, formative, interim, and summative assessments to track students' academic progress. We also implement TEA-required annual state assessments and special populations screenings such as the State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness STAAR) exams, the Texas English Language Proficiency Assessment System TELPAS) exams, dyslexia screening, gifted and talented screening, and evaluations for students with disabilities or suspected disabilities. 80

TEA-Required Assessments

STAAR: All students in grades 5 through 8 will take a combination of the STAAR end-of-year assessments. 5th grade students will take math, reading, and science. 6th grade students will take math and reading. 7th grade students will take math, reading, and writing. 8th grade students will take math, reading, social studies, and science.⁸¹

TELPAS testing: In accordance with state statutes, middle school aged English learners will take the TELPAS to assess their proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing in English.⁸²

Dyslexia screening: In accordance with Tex. Educ. Code § 28.006(c-1), any student who did not demonstrate reading proficiency on the sixth grade STAAR assessment will be tested for dyslexia at the beginning of the seventh grade. We will utilize the free mCLASS Texas tool for this testing. Students who are diagnosed with dyslexia will be referred to receive an Individual Education Plan IEP) or 504 services.

Gifted and Talented: In accordance with TAC §89.1 2), we will collect data from multiple sources for each area of giftedness and use the appropriate modifications and accommodations to ensure that students with disabilities are genuinely considered for gifted and talented services. Students who are identified as gifted and talented will participate in the Texas Performance Standards Project TPSP) during the daily

intervention block to engage in TEKS-based performance tasks and assessments for gifted and talented students.⁸³

Baseline, Formative, and Summative Assessments and How We Plan to Use the Data

The baseline, formative, and summative assessments will be tracked in our data systems and used by staff to assess the efficacy of our programming and ensure all students have the supports that they need to be academically and socioemotionally successful. The assessments were chosen because of their practical uses for interventions and grade level proficiency diagnostics.

Baseline Assessments: The Northwest Evaluation Association Measures of Progress NWEA MAP is an assessment aligned to TEKS standards that curates detailed reports about the growth of students over time.⁸⁴ During student orientation at the beginning of the school year, all students will take the NWEA MAP assessment so that we have baseline data about their academic strengths and weaknesses. We will use this information to ensure struggling learners receive interventions and students achieving above average levels receive enrichment opportunities. Students will take the MAP growth assessment again in the winter and in the spring to track student growth throughout the year. We will use the growth data to assess, monitor, and augment our curriculum, instruction, and intervention programs at regular intervals during the year, including during grade level team meetings, leadership team meetings, board meetings, report card conferences with families, and individual coaching meetings with students.

Formative Assessments: We will use formative assessments to gather data from students while they are in the process of learning the standards to swiftly take action to fill any academic gaps. Oftentimes, daily objectives build on each other. As such, quickly catching students up who fall behind is critical. Every moment of instruction is an opportunity for teachers to collect information about what students know and do not know. Our teachers will not wait until after the class period is over to take action, instead, teachers will use formative assessments such as check for understanding, questions/activities e.g., thumbs up/thumbs down, flash white boards, quick writes, student self-assessment of mastery, etc., and monitoring student work during group and independent practice to do in-themoment remediation through class discussions and individual coaching. Additionally, all teachers will utilize daily exit tickets and weekly quizzes to identify common misconceptions that need to be retaught or reinforced as well as students who need to be coached individually or in small groups during the Entrance Ticket a quick 5-minute activity at the start of class that reviews previous concepts or introduces the lesson of the day, independent practice, or the daily intervention block.

Summative and Interim Assessments

Summative assessments give us key data about students' academic performance during points in the year when they should be able to show mastery of the content. Summative assessments identify whether or not our students are on track to end the year with mastery of the grade level content and prepared to enter the next grade.

At the end of each unit, teachers will administer unit assessments included in the TEKS aligned curriculum. With the support of Assistant Principals of Instruction and content team members, teachers will analyze student work and reflect on the teaching practices that led to student outcomes to create full group and small group remediation plans. Additionally, interim assessments will be given at the end of quarter 1, 2, and 3. The first two interim assessments will be created by Assistant Principals of Instruction and reflect the pacing of the curriculum. For the final interim assessments, we will use the STAAR Interim Assessment one month before the STAAR exam to give students practice with using the online platform and provide teachers with comprehensive data about what to prioritize for the weeks leading up to the exam.⁸⁵ Summative assessments are listed on our annual calendar in **Attachment 25**.

Students will complete SEL assessments in advisory after each major unit in the Second Step curriculum. Teachers and administrators will use this information during grade level team meetings to assess the efficacy of the curriculum and identify students who may need to be referred to tier 2 or tier 3 services.

<u>Academic Intervention Structure for Corrective Action</u>

The multi-tiered system of support MTSS) provides a data-driven, collaborative approach to ensuring all students receive the interventions and evaluations that they need to be successful. More details about the MTSS system can be found in "Support for Special Populations". Additionally, we have a daily intervention block during which teachers will coach students who are struggling to master reading, writing, and math skills. ELA and math teachers will meet with small groups of students who have shown, through formative and/or summative assessments, that they need targeted support. Teachers will use remediation strategies such as think-aloud, error analysis, and visual aids to fill mastery gaps. We prioritize English Language Arts ELA) and math during the intervention block because literacy and mathematical reasoning are the foundational skills needed for success in all other disciplines.

<u>Teacher Development Structures</u>

Data analysis is a foundational skill for teachers and instructional leaders and at the core of many of our professional development structures outlined in "Professional Development and Evaluation". We invest in this development for our teachers and

instructional leaders so that we can use student assessment data in a way that promotes exceptional academic outcomes for all students.

Sharing Student Data

Specific student data will only be shared with grade level staff, administrators, and the family of each student. Doing so will ensure students' privacy is protected. General data about how groups of students are performing will be available to the public during academic reviews during monthly board meetings and annual school performance reports.

Supports for Special Populations

A central part of our mission is to provide an equitable education experience for all learners. We believe that special populations and at-risk designations should not be a determination of students' outcomes. Part of providing an equitable education means that we must ensure that our special populations are reaching the same academic outcomes as our students in general education.

Based on averaging the percentages of each special population of impacted school districts, we anticipate that 36% of our students will be English Language Learners, 9% will receive special education services, and 7% will be identified as gifted and talented. Special education and English language learners are performing below the district averages in all of the neighboring school districts of our proposed school location. Furthermore, COVID-19 has exacerbated the academic outcomes of high-risk groups due to intermittent schooling and the challenges of virtual learning. To ensure the success of all students, including special populations, we will implement data-driven and adaptive programs that will support the diverse needs of our students enabling them to thrive academically, socially, and emotionally. Additionally, teachers will be trained and differentiation strategies that support all learners.

Supporting All Learners

A core part of our differentiation and supports for all learners is our data-driven, multitiered system of support MTSS that screens and monitors all students to ensure they receive the appropriate interventions to aid in their academic, social, and emotional development and all students with disabilities are identified according to Child Find mandates.⁸⁹ The system ensures that any student demonstrating an academic or social-emotional need receives interventions as soon as the need is identified. MTSS also supports educators with a plan for how to support struggling learners and encourages collaboration between teachers and families.⁹⁰ Our MTSS is overseen by the Director of Special Education and includes three tiers of support that increase in intensity and individualization: the first tier includes programming for low-risk scholars; the second tier includes programing for medium risk scholars; the third tier includes programming for high-risk scholars.

All students will receive tier 1 programing that gives them access to inquiry-based, grade-level, and TEKS-aligned curriculum taught by highly effective teachers. They will also engage in the safety and inclusion initiatives outlined in the culture and safety section of this application. Additional tier 2 and tier 3 interventions will be implemented according to student need.

Our goal is to support 80 - 90% of our scholars through tier 1 supports, 5 - 10% of our scholars through tier 2 supports, and 1 - 5% of our scholars through tier 3 supports. ⁹¹ The different tiers are not meant to water down expectations or act as opportunities to lower the bar. Instead, the different tiers are structured to meet students where they are and help them to reach the same heights through needs assessments, targeted interventions and appropriate scaffolds, close monitoring, and school and family collaboration.

MTSS Process

To support all learners, we will closely monitor assessment and behavior data to track student progress and have multiple avenues for students to receive the support they need. Using data, teachers can recommend a student at any time who is not reaching their full academic or social-emotional potential to receive additional supports. The Students Supports Team instructional leaders, Director of Special Education, grade-level teachers, counselors, and families will meet to review the academic and behavioral data for that particular student and create an intervention plan during semi-monthly Response to Intervention RTI) and Response to Behavior RTB) meetings led by instructional and grade level team leaders. When the plan is developed, grade level teachers will track data and monitor the intervention plan for six weeks. At the end of the six-week period, the Student Supports Team will analyze the data and determine next steps:

- If a student is meeting their goals based on interventions outlined in the tier 2 intervention plan, they will continue to receive the tier 2 interventions and continue to be monitored for an additional six weeks. If the student continues to show progress, interventions will slowly decrease in intensity as long as the student continues to make progress each six-week evaluation cycle with the goal of the student returning to tier 1 supports.
- If a student in tier 2 **is not** meeting the goals outlined in the intervention plan at the end of the six weeks, the student supports team (which includes the student's family may include additional tier 2 supports or may reconvene with the team to determine whether a tier 3 intervention is needed. The grade level teachers will track the tier 3 intervention data for six weeks. The student supports team will meet at the end of this six-week period to evaluate student progress and determine next steps.
- If a student is meeting their goals based on interventions outlined in the tier 3 intervention plan, they will continue to receive the tier 3 interventions and continue to be monitored for an additional six weeks. If the student continues to show

- progress, the student will move back down to tier 2 and slowly decrease the intensity of the interventions each six-week evaluation cycle with the ultimate goal of the student returning to tier 1.
- If a student in tier 3 **is not** meeting the goals outlined in the intervention plan at the end of the six weeks, the Student Supports Team may decide to evaluate the student for a disability or add additional tier 3 interventions.

Table 3 includes examples of interventions that a student might receive in each tier.

<u>Process for Special Education Identification</u>

All students with disabilities will be identified according to Child Find mandates.⁹³ In accordance with Child Find requirements included in the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act IDEA, Red Brick Academy will identify, locate, and evaluate all children in need of special education services through obtaining prior school records, our MTSS system, and parent referral. The Special Education Director, hired in year 1, will ensure that all students receive the required screening, individual supports, and assessments.

There are multiple ways that a student could receive an evaluation for a disability:

- Students who move through MTSS and reach tier 3 without substantial progress on their goals may be evaluated for a disability;
- A guardian who believes their child has a disability can request an evaluation by submitting a written letter addressed to the Superintendent;
- If a student shows significant challenges, we will not wait to move the student through MTSS and will evaluate the student as soon as possible if we suspect their challenges are due to a disability. We will use data from multiple sources to ensure that we find all students with a disability while also not overidentifying our students.

Once a student with disabilities is identified, the special education programming will be implemented in accordance with all state and federal mandates including, TAC §19.89, TEC Chapter 29, Subchapter A, Americans with Disabilities Act ADA), Individuals with Disabilities Education Act IDEA), and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act. Red Brick academy will hire a Director of Special Education in the first year of operations who, along with the Superintendent, will ensure that all students with disabilities receive a free appropriate public education FAPE in a least restrictive environment LRE. We will have a ratio of one special education teacher for every 18 students with disabilities to help provide academic interventions and ensure students are meeting their IEP and 504 goals. Additionally, we will use contracted services for speech, occupational therapy, and physical therapy.⁹⁴ If out of class supports are needed, we will schedule them so that students with disabilities are still able to participate in extracurricular classes and engage in culture building activities like advisory and community meeting. Additionally, all general education teachers will be trained in differentiation strategies such as stations, visual aids, tiered lesson structures, and strategic groupings. They will meet with the Director of Special Education and the Special Education Teachers at the beginning of the school year to review IEPs/504 plans and IEP goals to ensure the appropriate accommodation and modifications are implemented and join grade level teams quarterly to track students' progress on IEP goals.

Support for English Learners

Previously identified and current English learners ELs and students whose primary language at home is not English will take the Texas English Language Proficiency Assessment System TELPAS) exams in the beginning of the year to determine if they qualify for language services and the extend of the language services they need. The certified ESL coordinator will review the TELPAS data and meet with families to create individual learning plans for all identified English learners. The intensity and frequency of language support will correspond to TELPAS scores and Limited English Proficient LEP)

status. English learners will take the TELPAS for a second time in the spring to track their growth and plan language interventions for the following year.

In accordance with TAC §89.1210⁹⁵, we will implement a dual immersion/one-way program and an ESL/pull-out program for qualifying English learners to individualize language support while maintaining high academic rigor. We will hire a certified ESL teacher/coordinator in year one of operations and partner with external programs such as the Assessment Intervention Management AIM ⁹⁶ to provide bilingual services. We will use interactive research-based language acquisition and literacy programs for ESL instruction such as Reading Plus, LEXIA core, and Think Cerca. ⁹⁷ If out of class supports are needed, we will schedule them so that English language learners are still able to participate in extracurricular classes and engage in culture building activities like advisory and community meeting.

The goal of the bilingual and ESL programming is to implement high-quality, targeted language supports so that students can develop English language proficiency and ultimately exit the language programs. Teachers, administrators and the ESL coordinator will meet biweekly to analyze ELs' academic progress on the Texas English Language Proficiency Standards ELPS standards through classroom observations, evaluations, and assessments. They will create action plans that will ensure continuous academic growth and achievement of all ELs. The ESL coordinator will also facilitate an annual review of language programs and use feedback from educators, students, and families to implement necessary changes to the language programs for the following school year.

We anticipate that over a third of our students will be English learners. As such, all Red Brick Academy instructional staff will collaborate with the ESL coordinator during common planning time to ensure regular general education instruction and curriculum meets the need of ELs. We will train all teachers in effective ESL practices as outlined by the research based Sheltered Instruction Observation Protocol SIOP) so that their entire practice incorporates the needs of English Learners. The SIOP model supports teachers with incorporating effective lesson preparation, building background knowledge, comprehensive input, strategies, interaction, practice/application, lesson delivering, and review/assessment.⁹⁸

<u>Gifted and Talented Programs</u>

In accordance with TAC §89.1(2), we will collect data from multiple sources for each area of giftedness and ensure students with disabilities have appropriate accommodations and modifications to be genuinely considered for gifted and talented services. Students who are identified as gifted and talented will participate in the Texas Performance Standards

Project TPSP) during the daily intervention block to engage in TEKS-based performance tasks and assessments for gifted and talented students.⁹⁹ The Director of Special Education will oversee and ensure the successful implementation of the gifted and talented program.

Program Evaluation

The Director of Special Education, in partnership with the Superintendent, will evaluate special education and EL programs during weekly check-in and data meetings to determine what portions of the program need to be continued, added, eliminated, or altered. In May of each year, we will take a wholistic view of the entire year's data academic data, SEL data, family surveys, student surveys, and staff surveys to determine the necessary changes that need to be made to our programming.

School Culture and Safety

Punitive discipline systems are stifling academic progress for students of color. In 2018, black students in the city of Houston made up 39% of referrals in schools but only make up 20% of the 10 – 17 year old population in public schools. This trend is in large part due to a lack of restorative structures and the implementation of punitive discipline systems in schools serving a larger percentage of low-income students. Students who are suspended or expelled lose valuable learning time and can become disengaged in schools making them less likely to enroll in a four-year college and more likely to enter the juvenile detention system. Punitive discipline systems are not working, and many school districts are moving towards more responsive approaches to discipline that aim to teach instead of punish. 102

At Red Brick Academy, we will implement a predictable, consistent, and supportive non-punitive approach to behavior that will support all learners, especially special population groups who have traumatic pasts and or difficulty regulating their emotions. Strong relationships, clear expectations, and a deep commitment to our community values will cultivate a safe and inclusive environment that optimizes learning.

Building a Positive School Climate

We believe that a positive school culture and climate can be built through predictable, consistent, and supportive behavior management systems. We expect and will support all students to fully engage in their academics and positively interact with other members of the community. Our community values listed in Table 4 are a set of agreed upon behaviors that clearly outline how each member of the community will engage with themselves and others. They provide educators with a guide for the behaviors that they should model, reinforce, or correct.

Building relationships and setting the foundation of clarity around expectations:

Strong relationships are at the core of an inclusive school community: teacher to student, student to student, school staff to families. ¹⁰⁴ At the beginning of the school year, students will participate in a week-long student orientation to set a strong foundation of positive relationship with their peers and teachers and immerse themselves in our community values. The orientation sessions will be centered around building an inclusive environment and promoting deep academic learning. During the opening sessions, teachers will share their stories and identities to model transparency and vulnerability. Students will also share their stories and identities to begin to build connections with other students in their cohort. Community building will continue throughout the year primarily within the daily advisory period and community meetings. Throughout scholar orientation, teachers will also facilitate rigorous lessons that require student to think deeply about our community values, academic procedures group work, debates, independent work, and presentations, and schoolwide procedures arrival/dismissal, lunch, hallway, bathroom.

Positive Reinforcement: A study in the impacts of positive reinforcement showed that it can significantly improve and have a lasting impact on social skills for school aged students. We will implement positive reinforcement structures that consistently praise and positively reinforce students when they exhibit our community values through private and public acknowledgements. Students will receive special shout outs from classmates and teachers during class and community meetings, spotlight family letters written by teachers and administrators, honor roll luncheons, bulletin board acknowledgements, and opportunities to take on leadership within the school.

Routines and Procedures: Classroom procedures and routines create predictability for recurring activities resulting in lessening anxieties and misbehaviors. ¹⁰⁶ They also automate low thinking activities to give students more brain space and instructional time for deep academic, social, and emotional learning. Classroom routines and procedures will include how to pass in and out papers, collect necessary materials, enter and exit the

classroom, and gain permission to leave the classroom independently. Teachers will learn how to teach classroom procedures and routines through interactive modeling, a 7-step approach that ensures students have a clear understanding and mental image for what is expected of them. The 7-step approach is as follows: 1 teacher states what they are going to model and why; 2 teacher models the behavior exactly how students should perform the actions; 3 teacher asks students what they noticed; 4 teacher invites one or more students to model the same way that they did previously; 5 teacher asks the students again what they noticed; 6 teacher invites all students to model as the teacher observes and coaches them; 7 teacher provides feedback about what students did correctly and where they should improve.¹⁰⁷ This approach is used when introducing a procedure or when a teacher notices that may students are not implementing the procedure effectively and can benefit from a reminder interactive model.

School Joy Events: The student survey data that we collected during our community engagement events highlighted that school joy events should be a top priority for any high-quality school. We want our students to experience joy throughout the entire school day in their classes with engaging lessons and during non-instructional time when they fellowship with their peers and teachers. The SEL Coordinator will organize school culture events e.g., popcorn and movie during lunch, dress down days, music during lunch each week on Fridays. The SEL Coordinator will also organize monthly joy events that build school pride and give students and staff an opportunity to build relationships in less formal structures. These events include, but are not limited to, school dances, college visits, and field trips.

Engaging Lessons: Strong academic programming is intrinsically aligned to a positive school culture. Students are less likely to misbehave if lessons are engaging and they have the tools that they need to be academically successful. ¹⁰⁸ At Red Brick Academy, teachers will implement interactive learning structures that are designed to gain and hold the attention of learners for long periods of time. Teachers will include strong lesson openers that connect the why of the lesson and activate prior knowledge. Teachers will center lessons around activities that require students to take a stand and justify through evidence such as debates, presentations, mathematical proofs, and Socratic seminars. Teachers will also give students opportunities to regularly reflect and share their conclusions verbally and in writing. ¹⁰⁹

Experiences Beyond School: We will implement opportunities for scholars to interact with resources in their communities and experience real world connections to what they are learning at school. Students will go on six trips annually to visit colleges, museums, theaters, or sites that connect to the learnings in the curriculum to corresponding career opportunities and real-world applications. These type of primary, in-person experiences,

combined with reflection, critical analysis, and synthesis, can lead to deeper understanding of the curriculum and stronger connections to the community.¹¹⁰

Additionally, students will be required to complete at least one community service project per semester to hone their leadership and social skills, promote feelings of self-confidence and self-worth, as well as reinforce the habit of positively giving back to one's community. Students will work in groups of their choosing to plan or attend a community service event with the guidance of an adult advisor. After completing the community engagement experience, students will reflect on their experiences and give a presentation during advisory about what they learned and how they were able to positively impact the members of their community.

Social and Emotional Learning Programs

A safe and inclusive environment requires students to successfully manage their emotions and interact positively with others. We believe that these skills must be taught and reinforced through intentional social and emotional learning SEL programming to realize our mission of building an inclusive environment where every child feels safe to be their authentic self. Our social and emotional learning programs will teach students self-awareness, self-management, responsible decision-making, relationship skills, and social awareness. Red Brick Academy SEL Programs include a research-based SEL curriculum taught in advisory and reinforced by teachers and administrators throughout the school day, relationship building, community meetings, and a non-punitive Responsive Classroom approach to misbehaviors.

Advisory: At the beginning of each day, students will go to their advisory room with a consistent group of students and a trusted adult for a 30-minute advisory period. Each advisory lesson will include four components: arrival welcome, announcements, acknowledgements, and an SEL activity. The **arrival welcome** message is written by the teacher and posted on the board. It is the first thing that students read for the day and includes a warm message to start the day with positivity, **announcements** for upcoming events and important dates, and celebrations of academic and/or social achievement. The **acknowledgements** portion of advisory is an opportunity for student-to-student and student-to-teacher relationship building during which students and teachers share information about their identities or a topic related to the news or their interests. The **activity** portion of advisory is dedicated to a lesson that introduces an SEL concept. We will use the *Second Step* program, a research based SEL curriculum, for the activity portion of our daily advisory. The Second Step lessons incorporate a variety of instructional tools including videos, direct instruction, group and partner discussion, interactive homework, and behavioral skill practice to teach SEL standards. The program

is aligned to the developmental needs of the grade level and builds on previous years' concepts year after year.¹¹⁴

Counseling for all: Students who need more intensive social and emotional support will receive counseling. At full enrollment, we will have one counselor for every two grades that we serve. Counselors will provide mandated counseling and at-risk counseling for general education students.

SEL reinforcement: We believe that there are SEL teachable moments throughout the school day and will not isolate social and emotional learning to advisory only. There will be an SEL focus area for the week that is introduced and discussed in advisory but also incorporated into the academic lessons throughout the day. Teachers will give students an opportunity to practice the SEL skill of the week during lessons and will acknowledge and celebrate students for implementing them successfully and respond to students when they are not meeting expectations using our non-punitive Responsive Classroom approach to misbehavior. Additionally, students will receive acknowledgments of achievement during community meetings to reinforce the SEL skill of the week.

Community meetings: Community Meetings are an integral part of our SEL programming as they provide an opportunity to reinforce SEL skills and build school pride. Each grade level will meet weekly for a grade level community meeting. During this time, students and teachers will highlight academic and SEL achievement, give public acknowledgment for exhibiting our community values, and share important school announcements.

SEL and discipline data tracking: SEL programs is one of our key design elements which means that we will use data to measure the effectiveness of our SEL programs and track progress. We will utilize data tracking platforms, such as SchoolRunner¹¹⁵, to integrate student data information systems and allow teachers and leaders to track academic, SEL, and disciplinary data. During weekly check-ins, the Superintendent and SEL Coordinator will analyze SEL and discipline data and create action plans to reinforce strengths and remedy areas of weaknesses.

Restorative Non-Punitive Approach to Address Misbehaviors: We understand that each student will be on a unique journey of developing the prosocial skills that we expect from all of our scholars. Misbehaviors will occur even after implementing the most effective proactive systems. As such, we will utilize a predictable, non-punitive, responsive discipline system that will build positive relationships with adults, teach scholars

appropriate replacement behaviors, and hold them accountable for demonstrating our community values.¹¹⁷

Teachers will use the public impact behavior management cycle to help students exhibit our community values. We believe that 90% of classroom management is proactive. As such, the first two steps of the cycle help to proactively set up students for success. The first step of the cycle is to set and reinforce expectations so students know clearly what is expected of them. The second step is to use positive narration e.g., "I see several students using their notebook as a reference as they work through the problem set."). The positive narration is an important opportunity for teachers to verbalize the positive things that are happening in the room that are aligned to the expectations that they have set previously. Doing so can serve as a reminder for students who may have missed the original direction or need a model for what the expectation should look like when it is successfully implemented. The third step is to take corrective action if a student is still not meeting expectations after they have clearly been stated and reinforced by the teacher to hold the student accountable and maintain a focused classroom environment. 19

When students misbehave, they will receive logical consequences for their actions that are aligned to the misbehaviors and give students an opportunity to repair the relationships that were impacted as a result of the misbehavior. We will implement Responsive Classroom¹²⁰ logical consequences which include: 1) "you break it, you fix it", an approach that gives students the opportunity to solve a problem that they have caused; 2) loss of privilege, when students do not meet the behavior expectations, they lose the privilege for a brief time that is associated with the misbehavior e.g., if a student unsafely uses a tool during a science lab, the student may be given an alternative assignment that does not include using the tool); and 3) positive time-out, a space in the classroom where a student can go for a brief moment to calm down and recover self-control.¹²¹ The corrective action should always be given neutrally and maintain the dignity of the child. The exception to the neutrality rule is if there is an emergency or an egregious misbehavior e.g., fighting or any activity that brings harm to students or adults that requires the teacher or administrator to use an elevated tone to signal a breach of safety.

<u>Uniform Policy</u>

Several research studies have shown that uniforms have been connected to higher safety ratings, lower incidents of bullying, and improved student learning in schools. ¹²² Families that we engaged during the pre-authorization period also shared that uniforms would be

a positive addition to our culture because families do not have to buy the latest fashion trends, uniforms require less laundry because students tend to wear them more than once without peers noticing, and uniforms make the morning routine less stressful because students do not have to plan for what they are going to wear each day.

We will implement a uniform policy that includes a standard set of uniform options. The options will be gender neutral to be inclusive of the full spectrum of gender identities. Students will wear a maroon or white polo with the Red Brick Academy emblem in the upper right corner of the shirt; a black belt; khaki or black pants or knee length skirts; and all black shoes. All students are expected to arrive in full uniform each day. The school will provide uniforms for students to borrow for the day if they proactively reach out to the Assistant Principal during arrival. Students not in uniform at the end if arrival will receive a uniform infraction and families will be required to bring them a uniform to school. Consistent uniform infractions will result in loss of privileges to dress down days and other incentives that require students to have proven a consistent level of responsibility.

Family Workshops

One of our key design elements is strong family partnerships, and we believe that we must engage families in the education of their child for students to reach their full academic and social potential. It is an integral part of our school safety and culture programming. One way that we will engage with families is by holding regular family workshops at least twice per quarter. During these workshops, families will gain a deep understanding of our school design and behavior management system as well as be given tools for how they can best support their child at home to be successful at school. Workshop topics include advocating for your child's needs, making the most of your child's summer, time management at home, family book clubs, and techniques for encouraging positive behaviors in adolescents.¹²⁴ Families of 7th and 8th grade students will also attend a workshop in the end of the year to discuss high school options and learn the high school placement process.

School culture and discipline policies will be included in family handbooks printed for families and students at the beginning of each academic year. We request that families sign a form confirming receipt of the handbook. During family orientation at the beginning of the year, we will highlight key policies in the family handbook to help families work prepare their child for a successful year.

<u>Teacher Development and Support</u>

We will support teachers with successfully upholding our school climate programs beginning with a three-week staff orientation prior to the beginning of the academic year. During orientation, teachers will be immersed in the mission, vision, and school policies;

work with their content teams to norm on the vision for academic excellence and instructional best practices; gain a deep understand of students' developmental needs by age level; and practice successfully implementing our behavior management systems through live practices and scenario discussions. Throughout the year, we will continue to reinforce and develop teachers' instructional and behavior management skills by giving regular feedback and coaching through weekly one-on-one coaching meetings, classroom observations, full staff professional development sessions, and external professional development trainings and texts.

Referrals, Suspensions, Expulsions, and Due Process

Policies and procedures for referrals, suspensions, and expulsions along with the discipline procedures for students with disabilities are outlined in our discipline system in **Attachment 8**.

Safety and Security Policy Adopted from the Texas School Safety Center 125

In accordance with Texas Education Code section 37.109, Red Brick Academy will have a safety and security committee and operate in accordance with the Texas School Safety Center TxSSC).

Purpose: The purpose of the Committee is to: 1) participate on behalf of the district in developing and implementing emergency plans consistent with the district multi-hazard emergency operations plan EOP to ensure that the plans reflect specific campus, facility, or support services needs; 2) periodically provide recommendations to the district's board of trustees and district administers regarding updating the district multi-hazard EOP in accordance with best practices identified by TEA, the TxSSC, or a person included in the registry established by the TxSSC i.e., a safety consultant; 3) provide the district with any campus, facility, or support services information required in connection with the safety and security audit, a safety and security audit report, or other reports the district is required to submit to the TxSSC; 4) review each report the district is required to submit to the TxSSC; 4) review each report the district is required to submit to the TxSSC; and 5) consult with local law enforcement agencies on methods to increase law enforcement presence near district campuses.

Safety and Security Committee Formation: The safety and security committee will include the Superintendent, a representative of the local police department, the Red Brick Academy Board Chairperson, one classroom teacher, and two parents or guardians of students enrolled at Red Brick Academy.

Committee Meetings: The committee will meet at the end of each semesters and once during the summer following all Open Meeting Act requirements. 126

Committee Duties:

- The superintendent of the district shall ensure that the members appointed to each team have expertise in counseling, behavior management, mental health and substance use, classroom instruction, special education, school administration, school safety and security, emergency management, and law enforcement. [TEC 37.115(d]
- Each team must report required information regarding the team's activities to TEA.
 [TEC 37.115(k)]
- The superintendent of a school district may establish a committee or assign to an existing committee established by the district, the duty to oversee the operations of teams established for the district. A committee with oversight responsibility must include members with expertise in human resources, education, special education, counseling, behavior management, school administration, mental health and substance use, school safety and security, emergency management, and law enforcement. [TEC 37.115(e]
- Team members shall work collaboratively with each other, with other school staff, and as appropriate with community resources to support the purposes of the team and the safety of the school and its students and staff.
- All team members should be involved with the assessment and intervention of individuals whose behavior poses a threat to the safety of school staff or students.
- Team members shall actively, lawfully, and ethically communicate with each other; with school administrators; and with other school staff who have a need-to-know particular information to support the safety and well-being of the school, its students, and its staff.

Each team shall conduct a threat assessment that includes:

- 1. assessing and reporting individuals who make threats of violence or exhibit harmful, threating, or violent behavior; [TEC 37.115(f 1 a]
- 2. gathering/analyzing data to determine level of risk and appropriate intervention, including referring a student for mental health assessment and implementing an escalation procedure if appropriate [TEC 37.115(f 1) b].
- Each team shall:
 - 1. provide guidance to students and school employees on recognizing harmful, threatening, or violent behavior that may pose a threat to the community, school, or individual [TEC 37.115 f 2];
 - 2. support the district in implementing the district's multi-hazard EOP [TEC 37.115(f 3)];

- 3. report immediately to the superintendent a team's determination that a student or other individual poses a serious risk of violence to self or others [TEC 37.115(h];
- 4. act in accordance with the district's suicide prevention program upon identifying a student at risk of suicide [TEC 37.115(i)]; and
- 5. act in accordance with the district policies and procedures related to substance use prevention and intervention upon identifying a student using or possessing tobacco, drugs, or alcohol [TEC 37.115(j)].
- A team may not provide a mental health care service to a student who is under 18 without written consent from the family of or person standing in familial relation to the student [TEC 37.115(g].

Threat Assessment Program: We will implement an 8-step process to build a threat assessment program:

- Step 1: Create and promote safe school climates;
- Step 2: Establish a multidisciplinary team;
- Step 3: Define prohibited and concerning behaviors;
- Step 4: Create a central reporting mechanism;
- Step 5: Determine threshold for law enforcement intervention;
- Step 6: Establish threat assessment procedures;
- Step 7: Develop risk management options;
- Step 8: Conduct training for all stakeholders.

Threat Assessment Procedures

- Receive report about a person of concern and screen for the following: 1. imminence; and 2. to determine need for full threat assessment.
- If threat assessment team believes the report does present an imminent danger or safety concern:
 - immediately notify law enforcement
 - once the emergency has been contained, the threat assessment team should complete a full threat assessment inquiry
 - if report involves a student, TA team should notify superintendent, who will notify the family/guardian [TEC 37.115(h]
 - if report involves a student at risk of suicide, team shall conduct a full threat assessment inquiry in addition to actions taken in accordance with the district's suicide prevention program [TEC 37.115(i)]
 - make other notifications i.e., anyone that is/may be directly impacted OR

If threat assessment team does not believe the report presents an imminent danger or safety concern:

- determine if there is a need for a full threat assessment inquiry
- if no, document initial report and screening and add information to threat

assessment database

- if yes, proceed with a full inquiry using steps below:
 - If a report involves sexual harassment, sexual assault, dating violence, stalking, or a domestic violence assault notify the District's Title IX Coordinator immediately.
 - Gather information about the person and situation from various sources, including an internet search.
 - Organize and analyze information using 11 Investigative Questions from the U.S. Department of Education and Secret Service threat assessment guide.
 - Make assessment about whether the individual of concern poses a threat of violence or self-harm, or if they are otherwise in need of assistance/intervention.
 - Develop and implement a case management plan to reduce risk.
 - As needed, refer individual of concern to local mental health authority or health care provider for evaluation/treatment AND/OR refer for a full individual and initial evaluation FIE /treatment for special education services.
 - Monitor, re-evaluate, and modify plan to ensure intended outcome

Training: Team members will complete training provided by the TxSSC during the summer of the first year of membership and redo the training when policies or procedures change.

Grading

Course grades are determined by a combination of assessments, class participation, and homework. Table 5 gives a breakdown of the percentage of the guarterly grade for each. The school year is divided into four reporting periods or quarters. Each quarter is weighted equally and the average score for each quarter will determine the final year end grade. Students are required to earn a year-end grade of 70% or above in each core course math, ELA, science, and social studies to receive a passing score for the course. Each core course is aligned to the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills TEKS). A passing score signals that students are prepared to matriculate to the next grade.

Promotion Requirements

Students are expected to pass all core courses and attend school regularly. Students with more than 19 absences, excused or unexcused, or who fail either or both ELA and math courses may be retained. We view retention as an intervention that should be used in rare cases. We believe that if we are implementing the appropriate supports during the year, the vast majority of our students will have academic success and be prepared for promotion to the next grade. However, there are a few cases when retention is an effective strategy for a child's long-term academic success. In these situations, we will gather the input of families, use quantitative and qualitative data, and review the Lights Retention Scale¹²⁷ a survey with a rating scale for developmental and academic metrics survey

results to make retention determinations at the end of the school year. The Director of Special Education will be included in all conversations about retaining any student with disabilities.

Retention Decision Process

At the beginning of quarter 4, we will have a third family-teacher conference window for any student who is on track to repeat the grade. Families of students in this category will receive a formal letter stating that the student is in jeopardy of retention and, during the conference, the school will work with families to create an intervention plan to get the student back on track to pass the course s of concern.

Three weeks before the year ends, students who have made the necessary progress and are back on track to passing the grade will receive a letter stating that they are no longer in jeopardy of repeating. Students who have not made the necessary progress will be considered for retention. For this group of students, teachers will complete the Lights Retention Scale¹²⁸. The data from this survey will be collected, synthesized, and shared with families during the promotion meeting with the Superintendent, Assistant Principals, and Director of Special Education during the final weeks of school. During the promotion meeting, participants will review the students' quantitative and qualitative data from the year, the Lights Retention Scale data, and engage in a candid conversation about whether retention would be an effective intervention for the student. Final retention decisions will be made by the Superintendent in partnership with the Director of Special Education by the final week of school.

Supports for At-Risk Populations

We regularly analyze data which enables us to identify the students who are performing on grade level and proactively support those who are at risk of repeating the grade. Grade analysis, action planning, and monitoring happens during weekly data meetings, family-teacher conferences, grade level team meetings, MTSS meetings, and IEP meetings. Our data driven approach to monitoring students' progress and providing interventions is outlined in the "Supports for Special Populations" and "Professional Development and Evaluation" sections of this application. Additionally, our counselors and classroom advisors will work with families to offer support to students who may be experiencing extenuating circumstances e.g., homelessness, judicial occurrences, poor health that prohibit their child from regularly attending school.

Family Communication

We value family partnerships and believe that families must receive regular communication from the school about their child's academic and social-emotional progress. At the end of the quarter, grades for each course are recorded on report cards and shared with families. Progress reports are sent home on the first and third Friday of

each month. We will hold family-teacher conferences for all students after quarter 1 and quarter 2 so that families, teachers, administrators, and students can discuss each student's progress, share best practices and pertinent information, and reinforce a trusting school and family relationship. These conversations will be student led, which encourages students to take ownership of their academic performance and take an active role in improving grades that do not represent their best efforts.

Family and Community Engagement

At Red Brick Academy, we work alongside our families to provide a rich learning experience for our students that prepares them for college and the life of their choosing. We invest in this partnership because studies have shown that strong family engagement can improve student outcomes. We believe that when a school and families leverage their collective knowledge about the child, both parties are better equipped to meet the needs of the student.

Family Partnership Initiatives

When a student joins Red Brick Academy, we will schedule an in-person meeting for families to meet key personnel at the school and begin to build a relationship of trust and collaboration from day one. When possible and with the permission of families, school personnel will conduct home visits to meet families in a familiar place and help staff gain cultural competency of the students we serve.

We will hold family orientation at the beginning of each school year during which families can meet key staff members and learn about key school policies. In accordance with TEC §12.111 a 9), families will also receive staff qualifications and contact information in their welcome packets during the orientation.

We have cultivated strong engagement with families since the very beginning of our school founding by holding sessions to solicit their input and incorporate their feedback into our school design. Family input has highlighted a need for regular communication with families about their child's academic and social progress, community building cultural events, a robust family association, family-teacher conferences, and family workshops. They were most excited about a school that prepares their children to go to college, and the majority were also in favor of key design elements such as longer school days and school calendar, uniforms, and firm yet supportive discipline structures.

The Family Engagement and External Partnerships Coordinator will be hired in year 1 and plan each family engagement event in an effort to build strong relationships with families, share information that will help families support their child at home, and create two-way communication pathways between home and school. The Family Engagement and External Partnerships Coordinator will also partner with community organizations to create mutually beneficial offerings for our students and families.

Ongoing Feedback from Families

We will continue to implement family input into our school design each year by getting feedback from our Family Association members i.e. a group of Red Brick Academy staff members and families who meet once a month to discuss and plan school improvement initiatives, fundraising, and community partnership events), a suggestion box in the front office, and family surveys distributed during family-teacher conferences that asks families questions about their satisfaction with school programs and staff. School administrators and the Red Brick Academy board will review this data in the spring and winter to inform and strengthen our strategic plans.

Family Communication and Language Supports

Teachers and administrators will reach out to families regularly about their child's progress and share important announcements about upcoming major events e.g., testing, family workshops, etc. through SchoolRunner, an application that houses all student data in one platform and allows teachers and administrators to text and call families from the app in the users' preferred language. SchoolRunner also automatically logs communication between families and the school allowing school administrators to collect data about family communication.

All family events will have a school staff representative who will translate in Spanish to be responsive to our anticipated 69% of Spanish speak families. Our Front Office Manager will be English and Spanish speaking to allow most families to receive and give information to the school in their native language. Additionally, all documents that we send home will be in English and Spanish. For the handful of families that may speak other languages, we will provide additional translated versions in their preferred language and use translation applications like SchoolRunner¹³⁰ that allow us to text student updates and display students' academic and behavioral data in the family's preferred language.

At the end of the quarter, grades for each course are recorded on report cards and shared with families. Progress reports are sent home on the first and third Friday of each month. We will hold family-teacher conferences for all students after quarter 1 and quarter 2 so that families, teachers, administrators, and students can discuss each student's progress, share best practices and pertinent information, and reinforce a trusting school and family relationship. These conversations will be student led which encourages students to take ownership of their academic performance and take an active role in improving grades that do not represent their best efforts.

The Family Engagement and External Partnership Coordinator will continue our work to engage community members to build partnerships that will provide resources for our students and families. For example, we have engaged with the 100 Black Men of

Board Structure and Primary Responsibilities

There is a strong correlation between board performance and the success of a school.¹³³ As such, we intentionally invested significant time connecting with over 70 community members to identify skilled professionals who can help Red Brick Academy realize its mission. Each candidate went through a rigorous vetting process to identify their ability to invest time and resources to our cause, subject matter expertise, ability to hold the proposed superintendent accountable for meeting goals, work productively across lines

of difference, develop ambitious goals and strategic plans, and keep student impact at the center of all decision making.

Size and composition:

Currently we have seven board members who are experts in law, finance, community engagement, operations, academics, and fundraising. We will continue to grow our board to 11-13 members by the beginning of the founding year to ensure extra capacity in high needs areas such as academics, community engagement, real estate, and finance. It is important to us that students see leaders of our school that look like them as proof that they can hold leadership positions and achieve at the highest levels. As such, the board includes members with diverse skill sets and represents the demographics of the community that we will serve. The resumes and biographical affidavits for each board member are included in **Attachment 12**.

Roles and Responsibilities:

In accordance with statute §100.1101, the board's primary responsibility is to oversee the programming outlined in the charter and ensure students are performing in accordance with the Texas Education Code TEC). The board must be knowledgeable about basic school law, school finance, health and safety, the use of public funds, accountability to the public, open meeting requirements, and public records requirements. Additionally, the board must have a strong relationship with the Superintendent and self-manage the performance of the board. Clear roles and responsibilities on the board will help ensure that the board is operating optimally.

The Red Brick Academy board leadership team includes the Chair, Vice Chair, Treasurer and Secretary. The Chair is responsible for the management of board members, setting the agenda in partnership with the Superintendent, facilitating monthly board meetings, leading the governance committee, and reporting governance updates during monthly meetings. The Vice Chair will assist the Chair with implementing their responsibilities and will assume chair responsibilities in the event the Chair is not available. The Treasurer will oversee the financial operations of the school, lead monthly finance committee meetings, and report on the financial updates during monthly public meetings. The Secretary is responsible for ensuring all board compliance including open meeting laws and state mandated board trainings.

Board members will participate in monthly committee meetings for academics, finance, and governance aligned to their subject matter expertise. The academic committee will ensure progress of academic goals. The finance committee, led by the Treasurer, will track financials and ensure the fiscal health of Red Brick Academy. The governance committee, led by the Chair, will manage the membership and compliance of all board activities and will provide oversight of academic, financial, and operation activities of the school.

Relationship with and Management of the Superintendent:

The board's relationship with the school leader is paramount to the school's success. The board hires the Superintendent to lead all day-to-day operations of the school, provides support to the Superintendent, and holds that person accountable for delivering on the agreed upon expectations determined at the beginning of each school year. The Superintendent will report to the board on a monthly basis with data about key school metrics including academics, operations, finances, and any regulatory documentation for board review and approval. The Superintendent is also an active member of each committee providing the necessary information that the board needs to effectively govern. The chairs of each committee will give monthly reports to the board to ensure that all parties are knowledgeable about school happenings.

The board will utilize the Commissioner-Recommended Student Performance Domain/Superintendent Appraisal Worksheet outlined in **Attachment 14** to evaluate the Superintendent on an annual basis. In accordance with statute TEC §39.054, district performance is the primary consideration of the appraisal of superintendent performance. 136 The tool holds the Superintendent accountable for instructional management; personnel management; student management; management of fiscal, administrative, and facilities functions; organization morale; organization improvement; school-community relations; school board relations; and professional growth and development. 137 The formal evaluation will be conducted annually soon after accountability metrics have been released. The board will use internal metrics to check progress at the mid-point of each calendar year using interim assessment data; student, staff, family, and employee surveys; student behavior data; and financial reports. After each evaluation, the Superintendent is responsible for reporting to the board where the school met or exceeded expectations, where the school needs to improve, and an action plan for how the school plans to improve lowest performing metrics and sustain highest performing metrics.

<u>Self-management of the Board:</u> In addition to managing the Superintendent, the board must manage itself to ensure it is functioning optimally in service of the students and families of the school. The board will utilize a Long Star Governance LSG Coach to support the Red Brick Academy board in their self-evaluation process. The board will use the LSG Integrity Instrument to conduct a self-evaluation during the annual board retreat and use the findings to improve board structures for the following year. The tool ensures that the board adopts and monitors progress of student outcome goals, invests at least half of its time on improving student outcomes, evaluates but does not interfere with the progress of student outcome goals, operates in a way to allow the Superintendent to

accomplish the vision, promotes the vision, and works collaboratively with the Superintendent to lead toward the vision. 138

Training: All board members will participate in the 12-hour training course consistent with statute §100.1102 within one calendar year of joining the board and six instructional hours in the following years delivered by a course provider registered under §100.1107.¹³⁹ The additional semi-annual trainings will be outsourced by highly qualified board training organizations such as Board On Track¹⁴⁰ and Leadership ISD.¹⁴¹ The semi-annual trainings are divided into three phases: pre-authorization, founding year, and first year of operations and beyond. During phase 1 pre-authorization, training topics include deep knowledge and input into school design, fiscal and academic accountability and goal setting, effective community engagement strategies, open meeting laws, governance vs. management, and public figure training. During phase 2 founding year, training topics will include governing board member roles and responsibilities; expectations for academic, operations, finance, superintendent, and board effectiveness oversight; and multi-year strategic planning. During phase 3 1st year of operations and beyond, training topics will include effective board and superintendent evaluation processes and refreshers on training topics identified in phase 1 and 2.

Grievance Policy Adopted from The Ethical Community Charter School 142

Rationale: Red Brick Academy board members recognize the important roles that families and teachers play as partners in upholding the school mission and policies. Thus, to strengthen that partnership and foster an open and productive line of communication between not only families and teachers but also the school leader, administrative staff, and the Board of Trustees, the Board has instituted a fair and efficient process by which internal grievances can be resolved amicably and consistent with the law. If a Board employee, trustee, or parent/guardian has a complaint or dispute with any Board policy or the actions of a School Employee or Board Trustee "grievance", it should be resolved in accordance with the dispute resolution proceedings set forth in this Policy, or as otherwise mandated by law.

Procedure

Informal Grievances:

- Should a complaint or concern arise between a family and a teacher or staff member, families are encouraged to first attempt to resolve said complaint or concern directly with the teacher or staff member by scheduling a conference to discuss the issue. If after meeting in conference with the immediate source, the Family deems the initial response/course of action as insufficient, or in the event that a meeting with the immediate source is not practicable or reasonable because of the nature or subject matter of the grievance, an informal meeting with the Superintendent may be requested in an attempt to resolve the concern or complaint. The Superintendent reserves the right to redirect families to the involved teacher or staff member if that step has not been taken.
- Any person who has a grievance shall discuss it first with the Superintendent in an attempt to resolve the matter informally, within five 5 business days from the time when the person knew or would have known of its occurrence.
- If the complainant is satisfied with the response of the Superintendent, no further action will be required, and the grievance will be considered to be resolved. The Superintendent will follow-up in writing within 5 days the result of the meeting.
- If the complainant is not satisfied, the complainant can file a formal grievance with the Superintendent.

Formal Grievances:

- If the grievance is not resolved to the complainant's satisfaction through discussion with the Superintendent and through the board-led mediation option, the complainant may submit a formal written grievance to both the Superintendent and the Board Chairperson within five 5) business days after meeting with the Superintendent or his/her designee. The written grievance must detail in writing by email or letter the matter that was originally submitted informally to the Superintendent and must explain the basis for the complainant's dissatisfaction with the decision and/or course of action previously rendered. All formal grievances must redact student names.
- Upon receiving the written request, the chair shall request copies of all written communications from previous attempts at resolution from the Superintendent. The chair shall convene in a committee of the board no fewer than three people, which shall meet within 10 working days to discuss the issues. With the exception of the employee and his or her representative, the committee of the board shall decide who else shall be in attendance. The committee of the board shall decide on the matter by majority vote and shall issue its decision in writing to the employee and the chief executive within five working days of its meeting. Decisions of the committee of the board shall ordinarily be final. Failure of a party to cooperate with the committee of the board does not preclude the board from conducting a further proceeding.
- In the event that the committee of the board is unable to reach a decision and/or the grievance is of such a nature that it might interfere with the normal functions

of Red Brick Academy, then the committee shall bring this matter to the board for consideration. Upon referral by the committee, the employee shall have the right to be present, and be accompanied by a representative and by a person he or she would substantiate the grievance. The board of directors shall issue its decision in a written statement to the employee and Superintendent within five working days of its meeting. This decision shall be final.

Outsourced Services: Red Brick Academy utilizes a slow growth model to ensure that there is ample time to plan and execute all school programming efforts. While we are growing to full capacity, we will outsource services to help manage the budget. Over time, the reliance on external services will diminish as we reach our maximum enrollment. We will outsource transportation, janitorial services, food services, back-office services, legal, and specialized student services speech therapy, physical therapy, bilingual, and occupational therapy.

Proposed Superintendent Qualifications

<u>Proposed Superintendent Qualifications</u>

Brittney Jean-Louis is the proposed Superintendent for Red Brick Academy. Her personal mission is to help ensure that all students have high-quality educational opportunities in their home communities. She is a Texas native with a proven track record of success as both a school leader and mathematics teacher. She served as a math teacher for five years and transitioned to school leader for the next six years. Her entire career has been serving in schools with predominately students of color in low-income communities.

As an algebra and geometry teacher, over 90% of Mrs. Jean-Louis' students received proficient or advanced on the state assessment MCAS). Her effectiveness was further demonstrated when her Advanced Placement AP Calculus students achieved the highest pass rates in the twelve-year history of the school on the national AP Calculus AB exam with over 40% of her students receiving a 3, 4, or 5 on the exam. Mrs. Jean-Louis has extended her ability to deliver excellent educational outcomes for students as a school leader. Her greatest strengths are in instructional leadership and teacher development. Most recently, Mrs. Jean-Louis served as the Principal of a growing charter school in the Ascend Charter School network in New York City. She managed all aspects of academics, culture, and operations and understands the nuances of the founding years of a school. In the first year of operations, students outperformed the state average on both the ELA and math state assessments. The learnings from this experience would prove invaluable in leading the founding of Red Brick Academy.

Perhaps most importantly, the work is personal for Mrs. Jean-Louis. Growing up in a low-income neighborhood in Fort Worth, TX, she did not have high performing schools in her neighborhood, a typical characteristic of low-income communities. However, she was fortunate to receive a scholarship to a high-performing high school that prepared her to thrive at Dartmouth College. She returns to her native state to help students who live in low-income neighborhoods like her own to receive the high-quality education that all children deserve. Mrs. Jean-Louis' resume, qualifications, and professional biography of the can be found in **Attachment 15.**

<u>Education Level and Training:</u> Mrs. Jean-Louis holds a Bachelor of Arts in sociology from Dartmouth College, a Master's degree in effective teaching from the Charles Sposato Graduate School of Education, and a Master's degree in business administration from The Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania. She is also in the BES build. excel. sustain. Fellowship receiving training on school leadership, school start-up, board relations, budgeting, facilities procurement, and community engagement.

<u>Compensation</u>: In accordance with 19 TAC §100.1022 c 1) A i, the Superintendent will be compensated based on the individual's education, experience, prior salary history, job duties performed, and what a typical person with similar skills, experience, and job duties would earn.¹⁴³ The starting salary will be \$95,000. The amount-per-student is \$439.81.

<u>Superintendent Development and Support</u>

The Superintendent is accountable for instructional management; personnel management; student management; management of fiscal, administrative, and facilities functions; organization morale; organization improvement; school-community relations; school board relations; and professional growth and development. The Red Brick Academy board will conduct an annual formal evaluation soon after accountability metrics have been released. The board will use internal metrics to check the Superintendent's progress at the mid-point of each calendar year using interim assessment data; student, staff, family, and employee surveys; student behavior data; and financial reports. After each evaluation, the Superintendent is responsible for reporting to the board where the school met or exceeded expectations, where the school needs to improve, and an action plan for how the school plans to improve lowest performing metrics and sustain highest performing metrics. The board will ensure additional training is provided to the Superintendent based on performance of the annual evaluation.

Superintendent Succession Plan: Our proposed Superintendent has committed to at least ten years in this role in order to set a solid foundation for Red Brick Academy for the many years to follow. Even with this commitment, the Red Brick Academy board and the proposed Superintendent will develop a thorough succession plan to ensure a smooth transition and prepare for an unforeseen early departure. The succession plan will include three components: strong documentation of organizational structures; a robust Superintendent job description; and the ongoing assessment and development of a high achieving member of the Red Brick Academy leadership team who could step into the Superintendent role. Ideally, an internal candidate would assume the role after the proposed Superintendent departs because they will intimately understand the workings of the school. If there are no qualified internal candidates available, the board will conduct a robust external search for a Superintendent that can execute on the responsibilities of the role. The success of this succession plan requires daily implementation by the proposed Superintendent starting in year one of operations through her ultimate departure from the school.

Proposed Instructional Leadership Team

The instructional leadership team will include four members: the Superintendent, the Assistant Principal of Humanities, the Assistant Principal of Math and Science, and the Director of Special Education. Table 7 outlines the core responsibilities of each, the anticipated salary, and year the employee will be onboarded. Please note that the Assistant Principal of Math and Science will join the team in year 2. Due to our slow growth model, we prioritized funds in year 1 for teaching positions. During year 1, the proposed Superintendent, who has extensive experience in math instruction and coaching, will coach the math and science teachers while developing a high-performing math teacher to assume the role of Assistant Principal of Math and Science at the beginning of year 2.

General Instructional Leader Competencies:

The proposed Superintendent has taught math for 5 years, held middle and high school leadership positions for 6 years, and holds a Master's Degree in effective teaching and a Master's Degree in business administration. Her entire career has been serving in schools with 80+% of students who are socioeconomically disadvantaged and predominately children of color. All five years as a math teacher, her students outperformed the state average on math state exams. She has coached math and science teachers for three years as a school leader and is well-versed in data-driven instruction, responsive classroom approaches, standards aligned curriculum development, coaching instructional leaders, live coaching, professional development, culturally responsive pedagogy, and building positive relationships with staff, students, and families. During her two-year tenure as Principal at Ascend Charter School, all staff members completed semiannual surveys and each time 100% of staff rated her favorably when asked, "I trust my school leader at his or her word", "I feel respected by my school leader", and "My school leader is an effective manager who makes the school run smoothly". Moreover, over 80% of families completed

the family survey which showed 90% or more satisfaction on almost all questions asked around family satisfaction about the school.

We have not begun the search for the proposed Assistant Principals or Director of Special Education, but should our charter be approved, we will implement a robust hiring process to get the very best instructional leaders with a track record of producing exceptional academic outcomes in students with similar student populations. We will look to hire leaders who have expertise in their respective content areas, data-driven instruction, effective classroom management strategies, live coaching, culturally responsive classroom, supporting special populations, classroom observations, adult management, and professional development. A full job description for each Assistant Principal and Director of Special Education can be found in **Attachment 18.**

Hiring Process: timeline, criteria, recruitment, and selection

Starting in the fall of 2021, we will post the Assistant Principals and Director of Special Education roles and begin our recruiting efforts. The job description will be on our school website page, school social media pages, and other major job search sites such as LinkedIn, Indeed, and SchoolSpring. Additionally, we will utilize Facebook ads to highlight open roles and staff incentives of our school such as retention bonuses, robust professional development opportunities, and a respectful and collaborative working environment.

Candidates who pass the screening process because their resume and cover letter show evidence of demonstrated success aligned to the core competencies of the job description will be invited to a 30-minute phone interview with the Superintendent. During this interview, the Superintendent will ask questions to gauge mission alignment, cultural competency, leadership capacity, core competency skills, and additional inquiries based on information included in the resume and cover letter.

Candidates who successfully complete the phone screen will be given a set of performance tasks to be completed within two weeks. The performance tasks will gauge the candidate's ability to plan a coaching meeting with a teacher after a video observation, analyze student data and create a responsive action plan to fill student gaps, plan a TEKS aligned lesson, and plan a professional development session for a group of teachers.

Candidates who successfully complete the performance task will move on to an in-person interview with the Superintendent and a peer Principal of a neighborhood school we will continue to create relationships with neighboring school leaders and request that they allow us to host in-person interviews at their school site if our facility is not ready for occupation. During the on-site interview, the candidate will teach a 40-minute demo lesson, facilitate a mock coaching meeting with a teacher, observe classrooms and share

effective coaching strategies for teacher development, and facilitate a mock professional development session.

Candidates who successfully complete the in-person interview showing an aptitude and fit for the school will be offered the Assistant Principal position contingent on passing a background check.

Support, Development, and Evaluation Process:

The leadership team will participate in a 3-week summer training program in July facilitated by the Superintendent. Training topics will include effective leader schedules aligned to priorities, classroom observations, one-one-one coaching meetings, building a positive classroom climate, leading with equity, effective feedback structures, and leading during all-hands activities arrival, lunch, dismissal, and community meetings. During the year, Assistant Principals and the Director of Special Education will have weekly one-on-one meetings with the Superintendent to monitor progress, action plan around individual and department goals, co-observe classrooms, and analyze student and teacher performance data. Assistant Principals and the Director of Special Education will also engage in external PD options such as school visits of high-performing schools and content specific PDs. 145

The Superintendent will facilitate mid- and end-of-year evaluations for each Assistant Principal and the Director of Special Education. The evaluations are heavily based on student outcome data from interim assessments and the performance of the teachers whom they support. The evaluation tool that we will use for the Assistant Principals and the Director of Special Education is outlined in **Attachment 19.** The tool includes the process for evaluations and a 4-point rating scale of the core competencies of the role.

The Red Brick Academy board will lead fundraising efforts so that the school-based team can prioritize launching all programming around instruction, culture, and operations. The board will select a back-office provider¹⁴⁶ that is well-versed in charter school accounting and can support the finance and operations team with payroll, financial regulations, and financial statement creation. A back-office provider plays a critical role in ensuring that we have sound financial operations and will be selected by the board by the end of September 2021.

<u>Finance and Operations Team Qualifications:</u> The proposed Superintendent, Mrs. Jean-Louis, is a member of the school's finance and operations leadership team. She has a Master's degree in business administration from the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania where she completed coursework in accounting, operations, and finance. As a school Principal for three years, she has experience effectively managing school budgets and creating operational and school safety policies that are aligned to statutes and provide clear protocols for critical procedures. **Attachment 20** includes Mrs. Jean-Louis's resume and the job description for the Director of Operations.

We will begin the hiring process for a Director of Operations in the fall of 2021 with an anticipated start date of Jan. 1, 2022. The Director of Operations job description can be found in **Attachment 21.**

Hiring process: The hiring process for the Director of Operations will be similar to the Assistant Principals' but the tasks will be aligned to the core competencies in the Director of Operations job description. Starting in the fall of 2021, we will post the Director of Operations role and begin our recruiting efforts. The job description will be on our school website page, school social media pages, and other major job search sites such as LinkedIn, Indeed, and SchoolSpring. Additionally, we will utilize Facebook ads to highlight open roles and staff incentives of our school such as retention bonuses, robust professional development opportunities, and a respectful and collaborative working environment.

Candidates who pass the screening process because their resume and cover letter show evidence of demonstrate success aligned to the core competencies of the job description will be invited to a 30-minute phone interview with the Superintendent. During this interview, the Superintendent will ask questions to gauge mission alignment, cultural competency, leadership capacity, core competency skills, and additional inquiries based on information included in the resume and cover letter.

Candidates who successfully complete the phone screen will be given a set of performance tasks to be completed within two weeks. The performance tasks will gauge the candidate's ability to prioritize and manage multiple responsibilities, create and execute a student enrollment strategy, and implement and create sound operational and financial systems.

Candidates who successfully complete the performance task will move on to an in-person interview with the Superintendent and a peer Principal of a neighborhood school. The Red Brick Academy facility may not be ready at this point and it is preferable to see candidates in action with students and teachers during their interview. As such, we will create relationships with neighboring school leaders and request that they allow us to host in person interviews at their school site. During the on-site interview, the candidate will conduct a building walk through to identify facility strengths and areas for growth, role play scenarios to gauge adult management skills, and share their strategies around procurement and data reporting PEIMS).

The candidate who successfully complete the in-person interview and shows high aptitude and fit for the role will be offered the Director of Operations position after the Superintendent conducts a background check in accordance with TEC §12.129 and TEC §29.061 to verify that candidates criminal record and confirm that they meet the minimum requirements of a bachelor's degree and special education and bilingual education certification, if applicable.

PEIMS Responsibilities and Training: In accordance with TEC §12.104 b 2 A, we will have a designated staff member for PEIMS reporting. The Director of Operations will assume PEIMS responsibilities and will receive PEIMS specific training. 147

Goal setting and the use of data are central to our programming. The goals that we create set a vision for what we want to achieve, and data gives us insight into how we are progressing in meeting our goals. Student outcomes are at the center of all of goals because our primary mission is to prepare students to succeed in college and the life of their choosing. Teachers, administrators, and board members will collect, analyze, and utilize data from student and staff surveys, student assessments, SEL evaluations, staff evaluations, and classroom observations to monitor progress. Teachers and SEL staff will analyze student assessment results to identify the standards that need to be retaught or reinforced as well as the students who need targeted remediation plans. Administrators will complete similar analyses of student assessment data as well as conduct daily classroom observations and semiannual staff evaluations to determine promotions, incentives, and additional supports for staff members.

Board members and school leaders will use all the data sources mentioned above as well as monthly financial and operations reports and student, family, and staff surveys to monitor progress on goals and create multi-year strategic plans that ensure the academic outcomes of our students as well as financial and operational viability of the school.

Attracting and recruiting high-quality staff

COVID-19 has exacerbated teacher shortages across the country largely due to a significant number of educators deciding to retire early out of concern for their health. ¹⁵¹ A study conducted by the American Federation of Teachers shows that 33% of teachers over the age of 50 with more than 20 years of experience reported that the pandemic caused them to retire earlier than planned. ¹⁵² With a large number of workers leaving the industry, we can assume that we will continue to see these shortages for years to come. In response, we are planning a robust approach to recruiting that includes highlighting incentives, strategic partners, and the use of targeted advertising and social media. These efforts will occur throughout the entire school year to ensure a steady flow of high-quality applicants. The goal is to attract high-quality applicants, but we will also rely on our robust teacher development programs to train teachers who are approaching proficiency that show a strong growth mindset and ability to implement feedback quickly.

If for some reason we have open vacancies throughout the year, our instructional leadership team will share teaching responsibilities and use substitute teacher agencies to fill any additional gaps. We will utilize temporary placement agencies for all non-instructional roles until we find a suitable full-time replacement.

The Superintendent will lead recruiting and hiring efforts with the support of the other leadership team members Assistant Principals, Director of Operations, and Director of Special Education. The Superintendent will partner with teacher training programs at universities and colleges in Houston, and other major cities in Texas, and hold informational sessions and visits to Red Brick Academy for recent graduates of these programs. Additionally, Red Brick Academy staff will attend tabling events to spread the

word about our school and recruit diverse applicants at events such as Teach for America's School Leaders of Color Conference and NAIS People of Color Conferences. All open positions will be posted on our school website and job posting sites such as LinkedIn, Indeed, the Texas Charter School Association, and SchoolSpring. During the winter and spring, we will run recruitment ads on social media platforms Facebook, Instagram, Twitter to highlight our unique offerings of competitive salaries and incentives, professional development, clear promotion pathways, and a respectful/collaborative work environment.

Recruitment monitoring system: The Superintendent will update a recruitment and hiring dashboard monthly that includes metrics about outreach efforts, the number of applicants in the pipeline for each open position, and the ratio of filled to unfilled positions. This data will help identify where we need to strengthen our recruitment efforts. It will also be shared with board members so they can use their networks to support with finding high-quality candidates and hold the Superintendent accountable for meeting recruitment and hiring goals.

Hiring high-quality staff

The hiring process for our leaders is outlined in the "Leadership and Governance" section of this application. The process for hiring teachers and non-leadership administrators is similar and includes five phases, each of which requires an invitation to the next phase:

- Phase 1: Initial Application: applicant submits a resume and cover letter and answers questions about mission-alignment and certifications
- Phase 2: Phone Screen: applicant completes a 30-minute phone interview with the Superintendent during which they will answer questions to gauge mission alignment, cultural competency, core competency skills, growth mindset and additional inquiries based on information included in the resume and cover letter
- Phase 3: On-site Interview: this in-person interview includes performance tasks based on their role. For example, teacher candidates will complete a sample lesson and analyze student work to determine steps to increase student proficiency rates. Students will complete a feedback survey about whether or not they think the teacher would be a good fit for our school.
- Phase 4: Background/Reference Checks: the Director of Operations will conduct background checks in accordance with TEC §12.129 and TEC §29.061 to verify that candidates criminal record and confirm that they meet the minimum requirements of a bachelor's degree and special education and bilingual education certification for the appropriate positions.
- Phase 5: Offer: The Superintendent will send an official offer to join the Red Brick Academy team. Current employers will be assigned to reach out to potential hires after they receive an offer letter to provide a warm welcome, answer share excitements about them potentially joining the team, and answer any lingering questions.

Placement and Staffing of high-quality staff

Our staffing plan is in response to the projected need and demographics of our students. The staffing organizational charts can be found in **Attachment 22** and the supplemental human resources forms in **Attachment 23**. We prioritize staffing for special populations so that we can implement the program structures that will ensure their success. In our target location, we expect 8% of students with disabilities, 36% of English Learners, 86% of students classified as economically disadvantaged, and anticipate about two-thirds of our students will not have grade level reading or mathematics skills. We believe that these categories are not determinants of success, but they do reveal particular vulnerabilities that we want to proactively support with sufficient staffing.

Special Education and English Learners: In year 1, we will have one certified Special Education teacher for the anticipated 17 students with disabilities. Beginning in year 2, we anticipate that the number of students with disabilities will increase to 26. We will add an additional certified special education teacher at this point ensuring a ratio of less than 18 students with disabilities to every special education teacher when we are fully enrolled. With such a large number of English learners, we encourage dual certification for generation teachers. We will also train all teachers in effective ESL practices as outlined by the research based Sheltered Instruction Observation Protocol SIOP). The protocol ensures that all instructional practice incorporates the language acquisition needs of English learners. Even though all teachers and instructional leaders will be trained in SIOP, we anticipate that there will be a small number of students who need more intensive language support. As such, we included a certified ESL Teacher/Coordinator beginning in year 1 to provide the direct language acquisition instruction. We will use an external contractor to provide bilingual services. Economically Disadvantaged Students: Almost all our students will be classified as economically disadvantaged and studies show that students living in poverty experience trauma at higher rates.¹⁵⁶ Additionally, COVID-19 has exacerbated the negative impact of mental health on adolescents living in poverty because of the public health crisis, social isolation, and economic recession.¹⁵⁷ We will implement robust social-emotional learning programs as outlined in the "School Culture and Safety" sections of this application. Additionally, we are staffing one counselor for every two grades to provide mandated counseling for students with IEPs and 504s as well as mental health supports to general education students in need.

Students not on grade level: Literacy and mathematics skills are the foundation to a student's academic success and most of our students will enter our school without grade-level reading and math skills. To catch students up quickly, we will have double instructional blocks for ELA and math, Monday through Thursday. This will require an additional ELA and math teacher per grade in addition to the core instructional programming outlined in the "Curriculum, and Instruction" section of this application.

Outsourced support: With a slow growth model, we are strategic about the costly full-time equivalents FTEs that we have on staff. We will contract roles that are not full-time positions and cannot be feasibly added to the responsibilities of an existing position. These services include the following: meal service, janitorial services, back-office supports, and other student services e.g., occupational therapy, speech, physical therapy, and bilingual).

Retention of High-Quality Staff

The retention of high-quality staff is key to the success of a school, especially in the founding years when there is a large number of staff to hire each year. To encourage our high-performing teachers to return each year, we will implement retention bonuses that staff can receive after 5 and 10 years of employment at Red Brick Academy. These years correspond to the times when teachers are likely to leave their teaching role. All teachers will receive targeted instructional support from a highly skilled instructional leadership team. Additionally, we will implement monthly wellness events that include partnering with external trainers to facilitate sessions such as physical and mental health exercises, anxiety decreasing strategies, and mindfulness training. Lastly, all members of the leadership team will be trained in effective adult management strategies so that they can effectively cultivate a respectful and collaborative working environment. Leaders will also implement Talent 9 retention strategies which includes a robust list of non-monetary activities that promote staff retention e.g., mentoring opportunities, participation in leadership meetings, and first choice of grade level placement

Dismissal of staff

We understand that even with the best hiring practices, there will be times that we need to dismiss members of our staff for under-performance or egregious acts that do not align to our agreed upon community values. We will implement a progressive discipline approach to address poor work performance or misconduct and encourage staff to become more productive workers and adapt their behavior to the organization's standards and expectations.

Progressive Discipline Approach (adopted from Ascend Charter Schools¹⁶²: While the school's leadership team will work to share, model, and reinforce its expectations around systems and policies, it is ultimately the duty and the responsibility of Red Brick Academy staff to be aware of and abide by existing policies and work rules. It is also the responsibility of staff to perform their duties to the best of their ability and to the standards set forth in their job descriptions or as otherwise established. Staff are encouraged to take advantage of all learning opportunities available and to request additional instruction when needed.

The employee's immediate supervisor, manager, or director will approach corrective measures in an objective and fair manner. If a staff member's performance of assigned tasks is of concern, the supervisor, manager, or director will confirm that the staff member has received proper instructions, appropriate orientation, and adequate training and that they are aware of job expectations. Patterns of poor performance are just as indicative of overall performance as single incidents.

If misconduct has occurred, the supervisor, manager or director will take steps to ensure that the staff member is aware of the policies and regulations regarding the infraction. If appropriate instruction or information was not communicated, a plan for such communication should be immediately developed and reviewed with the staff member.

An employee who disregards or deviates from assigned tasks or from Red Brick Academy policies or rules may be subject to disciplinary action. Disciplinary action may take any or all of the following forms: verbal warnings, written warnings, suspensions, probations, or immediate discharge. Disciplinary action will depend in part on the nature of the violation and on the employee's work record. A negative performance evaluation may count as a written warning. Red Brick Academy has the sole discretion to determine what type of discipline is appropriate. In certain circumstances, the employee's conduct may lead directly to unpaid suspension or immediate termination of employment. Disciplinary action is a part of the employee's record and may be taken into consideration when evaluating performance for purposes of promotion, future disciplinary action, and continued employment.

While not intended to be an all-inclusive list, the examples below represent behavior that is considered unacceptable in the workplace. Behaviors such as these, as well as other forms of misconduct, may result in disciplinary action, up to and including an unpaid suspension or termination of employment.

- Creating conflict with co-workers, supervisors, visitors, or volunteers
- Failing to follow practices as needed for the specific job assignment
- Contributing to unsafe conditions
- Smoking in nonsmoking areas

- Violating any safety rule
- Acting negligently
- Engaging in horseplay that results in personal injury or equipment damage
- Spreading malicious rumors
- Copying facility documents for personal use
- Using facility communication systems inappropriately
- Treating families or co-workers in a discourteous, inattentive, or unprofessional manner
- Leaving work early without notification or permission
- Not complying with personnel file maintenance
- Not following department guidelines concerning notification of absenteeism
- Being absent for three or more days without notification or permission also referred to as a voluntary quit or job abandonment
- Fighting through the use of physical force
- Demonstrating intentional insubordination, including
 - refusal to do an assigned job

Professional Development and Evaluation

Our professional development of our staff is a key component of achieving the mission of Red Brick Academy. We invest in hiring high-quality educators, but we understand that every educator has areas of strengths and opportunities for growth. All Red Brick Academy staff will need both uniform and differentiated training on the core components of our school design to be able to execute it consistently and effectively. As such, we will implement a robust staff orientation professional development PD) scope and sequence before the first day of school and PDs throughout the year will reinforce learning.

Staff Orientation

We will support teachers in upholding our school climate programs beginning with a 120-hour, three-week staff orientation at the beginning of each school year. During orientation, teachers will be immersed in the mission, vision, and school policies; work with their content teams to norm on the vision for academic excellence and instructional best practices e.g. inquiry-based questioning, SIOP, and data driven practices; gain a deep understanding of students' developmental needs by age level; learn differentiation strategies and specific mandated supports for students with IEPs and 504s; practice successfully implementing our SEL and behavior management systems through live practices and scenario discussions; and begin to build trusting relationships with colleagues through team building activities. Staff will be compensated for this development as part of their annualized salary and will have a start date in alignment with our dates for professional development. Our salaries are paid over a 12-month period, including staff orientation. Table 9 gives a breakdown of the approximate number of hours that will be spent on each of the following training topics.

Professional Development During the School Year

Throughout the year, we will continue to reinforce and develop teachers' skills by giving regular feedback and coaching through classroom observations, full-day professional development sessions data dive days, content team meetings, Friday afternoon PDs, and one-on-one coaching. Instructional leaders will use data from classroom observations and assessments to inform the topic and structure of these PD sessions. The table below describes the purpose, timing, and frequency of each professional development structure. PD throughout the year equates to over 320 hours or 40 workdays. Most PD sessions are led by internal instructional staff: Superintendent, Assistant Principals, SEL Coordinator, or Director of Special Education. Teachers who have shown mastery of professional development topics may also facilitate sessions. The instructional leaders must be models and daily reinforcers of best practices for teachers. As such, they will be trained on how to successfully implement our programs during their summer training and lead the PD sessions for teachers throughout the year.

Differentiating support: All teachers will receive a minimum of one classroom observation and one coaching meeting per week. As administrators analyze student

outcomes, the coaching support may increase or shift to meet the needs of the teacher and students. For example, a new teacher whose student data is unsatisfactory may receive daily live coaching through classroom observations and two one-on-one checks per week. A group of more senior teachers with stronger academic data may have a joint weekly check-in with an instructional leader. To aid in differentiated trainings for staff, we may include supports from external training to push their practice. See line 110 in the budget section of the financial workbook for details about the allocation of funds for this programming.

Teacher evaluation tool

Teachers will receive one mid-year and one end-of-year evaluation. The purpose of the evaluations is to give teachers and leaders an assessment of where they stand on all performance areas, provide promotion readiness indicators, and serve as a tool for continuous improvement. The evaluation process and tool can be found in **Attachment 24**. Unsatisfactory evaluation scores will signal that a teacher may need different or additional supports from their direct supervisor. If supports have been given and performance remains unsatisfactory, the teacher's responsibilities may lesson or shift to better align with his or her strengths. If there are no such opportunities to place the teacher in a position that serves the school and aligns to the teacher's strengths, their employment may be terminated. A full description of the escalating termination policy can be found in the "Talent Management" portion of this application.

Operational and Financial Plans

School Calendar and Schedule

Our annual calendar and daily and weekly schedules are in alignment with state statutes ¹⁶³ and the pillars of our school: deep academic learning through data-driven, inquiry-based instruction; an inclusive school community; and families as partners. We intentionally reflect our priorities in our calendar and schedules so that we can realize our important mission.

Annual Calendar Overview

Our annual calendar highlights important dates; holidays; four quarterly grading periods; and the total amount of instructional days, instructional minutes, and PD days. We optimize learning by extending the amount of instructional time we have with students, investing in intentionally developing our staff, scheduling family partnership development time, and highlighting key monthly happenings to build identity awareness and celebration.

Additional instructional time: We have a total of 187 school days and 89,430 instructional minutes see **Attachment 25** for our 2022-2023 draft calendar. We exceed the 75,600 instructional minutes minimum requirement to increase the amount of time that we have with students to develop and reinforce their academic, social, and emotional skills. We have an extended school day schedule: 7:30am – 4:00pm, Monday through Thursday, and 7:30am – 1:00pm on Fridays. We also included seven additional school days to the standard 180 school day calendar. The additional instructional time equates to over 30 additional full school days in the calendar year.

Investment in teacher development: Our calendar includes 21 full days of professional development beginning with a three-week orientation at the beginning of the school year. Additionally, every Friday, students will be dismissed at 1pm allowing teachers to engage in afternoon professional development with their content teams, grade level teams, school-wide staff community, and their individual coaches to refine their instructional/classroom environment/curricular practices and review, monitor, and create action plans based on student data that will fill gaps quickly and push high achieving learners even further. We have ambitious goals for student achievement and allocate ample time to develop our teachers so they provide the education that will lead to students' success. During the professional development time, staff will also engage in mental health and sustainability activities to support their mental and physical well-

being.¹⁶⁴ We are providing this support because educators who teach students who exhibit stress due to the effects of trauma may take on similar stressors.¹⁶⁵

<u>Data-driven decisions</u>: At the end of each quarter, we reserve three half-days for math, science, and ELA interim assessments followed by one full day PD ("Data Day") for staff. The purpose of the interim assessments is to identify student gaps and achievements so that the instructional team can build intentional action plans that will fill academic gaps and push high achievers even further. During Data Days, teachers will have the full day to work with their content teams to analyze the interim assessment student work and data and create robust action plans. We will also include time for the Superintendent to present schoolwide data to share and get feedback on the school's progress with meeting our annual and quarterly goals.

<u>Family engagement:</u> Families will be encouraged to join the Family Association, a group of families and Red Brick Academy staff led by the Family Engagement and External Partnerships Coordinator, that meets monthly to discuss and plan school improvement initiatives, fundraising, and community partnership events.

Per the advice of families and board members during community engagement events and the positive research around family partnerships, we have included 13 family engagement days to the calendar with the goal of creating deep relationships and two-way communication pathways between families and school staff. We believe that when we partner together, we are better able to learn from each other resulting in advancing both parties' ability to educate our students. The family engagement events include:

- Family/teacher conferences: scheduled time for families to meet teachers and administrators to discuss their child's academic, social, and emotional progress. These conferences will be largely led by scholars to build their self-advocacy skills and encourage them to take ownership of their own learning.
- Family workshops: Two to Three hour long sessions to support families with advocating for their child's needs, making the most of their child's summer, time management at home, family book clubs, and techniques for encouraging positive behaviors in adolescents.¹⁶⁶
- Student showcases: quarterly events where students showcase their academic and artistic abilities with the community
- Additional family engagement opportunities with external partners will be coordinated by our High School placement and Family Engagement Coordinator.

<u>Inclusive school community:</u> We celebrate our school community's heritage and culture daily, but we also include key cultural events to our school calendar to build awareness

and celebrate historically oppressed groups. During family orientation, families will complete a survey requesting additional cultural dates that are important to their family and heritage. We will use this information to inform our advisory lessons, monthly newsletters, and community meeting cultural awareness and celebrations events.

Daily and Weekly Schedules

Students will have designated time for meals, SEL development, enrichment, interventions, and core academic courses. Each of these classes correspond to staffing in teacher schedules that will ensure the academic, social, and emotional success of all members of the community in these spaces. We will utilize two schedules: a Monday-Thursday schedule with a rotation of enrichments and a Friday abbreviated schedule.

Monday-Thursday Schedule

The schedule includes a 30-minute advisory, 45-minute periods for core courses ELA, math, science, and social students, a second 45-minute period of ELA and math, a 45-minute intervention period, a 45-minute enrichment block, meal times, and recess. Students will take two enrichment classes per year that will rotate on a Monday/Wednesday and Tuesday/Thursday schedule. One rotation will include health/physical education. The second rotation will be largely based on student choice when possible and include: art, dance, theatre, computer fluency, civic engagement, and debate. Core enrichment classes that must be taken in grades 7 and 8 include computer fluency, civic engagement, and college readiness.

Mental and physical health are essential to academic, emotional, and social success. ¹⁶⁷ As such, all students will receive a total of 170 minutes of moderate to vigorous physical activity each week. This amounts to an additional 35 minutes of physical activity over what is required for 5th graders and more than 150 additional hours of physical activity required for 6th- 8th graders during this three-year period ¹⁶⁸. We achieve this additional physical activity time by adding a 20-minute recess block, Mon-Thurs, and scheduling physical education for two of the four enrichment periods each week.

Friday Schedule

The Friday Schedule abbreviated student day for professional development includes a 48-minute community meeting, 48-minute periods for core courses, a 30-minute block for arrival/breakfast and lunch, and an 18-minute block for closing advisory and dismissal. Table 11 includes the duration, name, and a description for each class offering. See **Attachment 26** for a sample daily schedule.

Student Recruitment and Enrollment

All students living within the allowable attendance zone are eligible to submit an application to be enrolled in Red Brick Academy. In accordance with TEC §12.111 a 5, Red Brick Academy will hold an annual application period and will not "discriminate in admission policy on the basis of sex, national origin, ethnicity, religion, disability, academic, artistic, or athletic ability" ¹⁶⁹.

Recruitment: Student recruitment efforts will be led by the Superintendent and the Director of Operations after they are onboarded halfway through the planning year. We will also partner with external contractors who will help to collect contact information and outreach of prospective families within a 5-mile radius of our target school location. 170 The enrollment window will be published on our website, broadcasted on social media sites, and the radio in both English and Spanish beginning in September. Families who reach out and are interested in applying before the window opens will be placed on an outreach list and receive a reminder to apply when the enrollment window officially opens. We will actively target students who have historically been underserved at low performing schools in our attendance zones. These students are largely students of color, students with disabilities, and/or English learners. We believe that our programming centered around equitable educational experiences for all students will serve this demographic well. The Red Brick Academy Board and staff will go to local community centers, churches, and prospective student homes to hold informational sessions and encourage enrollment applications. We will also partner with organizations such as Families Empowered and Good Reason Houston to hold events to reach families in our attendance zone.

The enrollment target for year 1 is 218 students and our goal is to reach at least 800 applications for an enrollment rate of about 27%. By building a positive reputation of exemplary student outcomes, we hope to improve the enrollment rate to at least 50% by year 3¹⁷¹. If enrollment numbers are lower than expected, we will analyze the potential contributing factors to create a strategy to address the issue. For example, if we are not reaching enough families, we will utilize the strategies that have been most effective, elicit feedback from families about what is working/not working, and adjust recruitment plan as necessary. In the months of September through March, our goal is to reach at least 500 families each month through outreach programs e.g., door-to-door canvassing, Robocalling, information sessions at community centers, Facebook ads, etc. and secure at least 120 applications. This will equate to over 800 applications by the time we hold

the lottery. With a 27% enrollment rate, we will successfully enroll 226 students, providing a small buffer for the budget based on 216 students in year 1. We will take a similar approach to enrollment in year 2 and year 3.

Lottery: The window for applications will be the first Monday of September and close the last Friday of the following March. On a Friday following the close of the application window there will be a lottery open to the public during which applications will be chosen at random by a disinterested third party. We will post the results of the lottery on our website and send notifications to families who applied with an invitation to enroll or a notice of their waitlist status. If more families apply than there are available seats, the remaining families who do not receive an enrollment seat will be placed on a waitlist. If there are less families that apply than there are available seats, all applicants will be invited to enroll, and the remaining spots will be given on a first come first served basis. After the lottery, applicants on the waitlist will be placed in order of when the application is received. All records of the lottery will be available to the public upon request. Each year, returning students and siblings of enrolled students will be exempt from the lottery and receive the first enrollment seats. Children of founders and staff will also be exempt from the lottery as long as the total number is not a larger proportion of enrollment per statute TEC) §12.111 and TEC §12.117. The description of the admissions and enrollment policy is included in Attachment 27.

Contingency Planning

Our primary funding source is student enrollment, and while we intend to meet all enrollment targets, we have a contingency plan if student enrollment is lower than expected. We have built a secondary budget that includes a 30% decrease in expected enrollment. The plan includes eliminating or combining roles and scaling down operational costs.¹⁷² We will also request feedback from applicants and community members about our enrollment strategies as well as allocating more resources to outreach efforts that have been most effective and fewer resources to less effective outreach strategies.

Our goal, at full scale, is to have a facility of about 80 sq ft per student. At max enrollment, that includes a facility that is about 35,000 sq ft. We will enroll 50% of our students in year 1 and grow to full capacity by year 3. As such, we are looking for a facility that will support our programming when we are at full capacity that will allow us to grow into the space, taking on the enrollment based square footage year by year. Doing so allows us to invest in a long-standing facility that will be utilized for several years that follow. The minimum and ideal facility requirements are as follows. The minimum requirements allow us to deliver our mission aligned programming.

Minimum Requirements

- at least 16 classrooms that can hold 30 students, 4 classrooms per grade,
- 6 8 smaller student breakout rooms for small group instruction and related services.
- a large multipurpose room for physical education classes and assemblies cafeteria if necessary
- a front office room with a neighboring nurse's office,
- storage rooms throughout for janitorial and curricular supplies,
- at least one large room for administrative offices to conduct coaching sessions and professional development

Ideal Requirements

- a separate cafeteria space,
- at least 5 separate offices for administrators to conduct coaching sessions and professional development,

- an outdoor space for recess, and
- close proximity to a bus stop.

Red Brick Academy is currently seeking a board member with expertise in facilities and real estate to lead the efforts of facility procurement. The member will be chosen by March 1, 2021 and lead, in partnership with the Superintendent, the facilities activities outlined in the start-up plan and report progress on goals to the full board during monthly board meetings. To date, we have sourced commercial real-estate agents to support us with the procurement of a facility. We have identified a strong realtor, Lesa Nickelson French, with extensive experience in securing facilities for founding charter schools. Ms. Nickelson French's bio is as follows:

As Corporate Managing Director in Savills Houston office, Lesa Nickelson French helps clients achieve their business goals through customized real estate solutions. She draws on her expertise from both her legal training and extensive experience in commercial real estate to serve tenants in lease transactions ranging from 2,500 to more than 500,000 square feet. Specializing in tenant representation, leasing, acquisitions, and dispositions, she works strategically with her clients to understand their unique needs, regardless of size. Lesa helps companies of all sizes achieve their business goals by synthesizing her negotiation and contract skills with in-depth market knowledge, skillfully representing clients in finding the right space to thrive. Lesa joined Savills in 2019, after eight years as Senior Vice President with JLL, where she was a top performer in office tenant representation. Before that, she worked at CBRE for six years, representing mid- to large-size tenants. Before entering commercial real estate, Lesa practiced law for ten years. She was a commercial litigator and then spent six years at Service Corporation International, successfully supervising the firm's U.S. and Canadian litigation.

As of December 4, 2020, a preliminary report conducted by Ms. Nickelson identified more than 20 potential facility locations in a 5-mile radius of our target zip code, 77060, that could meet our ideal square footage and building requirements. Neither the proposed Superintendent, nor any member of the board of directors, will be within the third degree of consanguinity or affinity to the lessor.

The target percentage of our expenses for rent is about 12 - 15% of total expenditures. Renovations will be conducted to ensure that the facility meets all federal, state, and local health and safety codes. We budgeted \$50,000 in renovations in year 0. Our goal is to finalize and execute a lease by January 1, 2022, complete construction and renovations by the end of April, and ensure a certificate of occupancy is issued to TEA at least 60 days before the first day of school.

Transportation

We anticipate 80 - 90% of enrollment will come from students living in a 5-mile radius of our target zip code as there were almost 10,000 middle school students attending C, D, or F rated schools as of 2019. ¹⁷³ Our goal is to attract students currently attending these low-performing schools who live very near to the target zip code and have short commutes. As such, we will not provide transportation for the general education population. Houston is largely a driving community; however, we are looking for facilities near bus stops to provide more commuting options for students and families.

Students will attend monthly field trip events that will connect the learning happening in the classroom to happenings within the community. Students will also attend annual college visits. See line 106 in the budget section of the financial workbook for details about the allocation of funds for this programming. Additionally, the family association will conduct fundraising events to supplement these costs.

In accordance with TEC, §12.106 b and §48.151, we will provide transportation for students who have transportation services I their IEPs or 504 plans.¹⁷⁴

Start-up Plan

Red Brick Academy has developed a robust start-up plan for each major activity in preparation for culture and academics, talent, enrollment, operations, finance, and governance. Each activity includes sub activities with specific tasks, timelines, individuals responsible for decision making and execution. We also included a contingency plan based on 70% student enrollment in the event that funding is lower than expected. The details of the start-up plan activities can be found in **Attachment 30**.

The proposed Superintendent will implement and monitor the start-up plan activities in partnership with the Board Chair. They will meet weekly to discuss progress and brainstorm ways to mitigate challenges. The Superintendent and Board Chair will report to the full board the progress of the start-up plan during monthly board meetings. The Treasurer of the board will lead committee meetings to review financials and report to the board our financial standing each month. Red Brick Academy is currently seeking a board member with expertise in facilities and real estate to lead the efforts of facility procurement. The member will be chosen by March 1, 2021 and lead, in partnership with the Superintendent, the facilities activities outlined in the start-up plan and report progress on goals to the full board during monthly board meetings.

Planning Year Expenses

We anticipate incurring the following personnel, contracted services, school operations, and facility operation and maintenance expenses during the planning year. We will use the \$75,000 of unrestricted funds from the Walton Family Foundation grant as capital to purchase items that will be reimbursed by CSP funds several weeks later. We will use the reimbursed funds to make additional purchases throughout the start-up year. We anticipate that the \$75,000 will be sufficient capital between reimbursement periods, however, we will utilize short term lines of credits for any delays in reimbursements throughout the planning year.

Personnel: To prepare for a strong launch to the school, we will hire administrative staff to support with academic, operations, school climate and financial readiness. Y0 administrative staff includes 1 Superintendent salary for the full fiscal year; 1 Director of Operations at 0.5 FTE with an expected start date of January 1, 2022; 1 Assistant Principal

of Humanities and 1 Director of Special Education for 2 months 0.167 FTE of work in the months of June and July;

Contracted Services: Allocated \$5000 for accounting and \$2000 for payroll services provided by our Back-office Provider.

School Operations: Allocated \$3,000 for board training and retreat; \$26,000 to purchase the furniture for 2 grade levels of classroom; \$44,044 for Chromebooks, projectors, document cameras, SchoolRunner a family communication and SEL tracking system, and staff laptops; \$540 for training the administrative staff; \$10,000 for staff recruitment, \$32,400 for student recruitment; and \$500 in banking fees.

Facility Operation and Maintenance: All allocations assume use of the facilities in the month of June and July in preparation for the upcoming school year. We allocated \$300 in janitorial services; \$31,680 in rent, \$50,000 for renovations and building code adjustments; \$180 in utilities; and \$1,000 for internet.

Roles and Responsibilities

The financial team includes the proposed Superintendent, the Treasurer of the Board, the Finance Committee, the Director of Operations, and the Back-Office Provider. The finance team has extensive financial experience regarding financial systems, policies, and processes that result in the successful management of an organization. The proposed Superintendent and Treasurer of the board will oversee all financial responsibilities and utilize a board approved Back-Office Provider such as Region 20 or Charter School Success to assist with preparing financial documents, payroll, and accounting. The Back-Office Provider. will be selected by Sept. 1, 2021 and will be vetted according to their history of successfully serving the financial needs of charter schools.

The proposed Superintendent has a master's in business administration from the Wharton School of The University of Pennsylvania and three years of successfully managing the budget for the charter schools that she led. Under her leadership, the school remained financial stable consistently having a surplus each year. The proposed Superintendent will implement strong accounting, payroll, and financial planning and ensure strong internal controls and financial compliance. We will hire a Director of Operations who will oversee purchasing and work with the Superintendent and Back-Office Provider to ensure estimated and actual costs are in alignment throughout the year and that we maintain a strong set of internal financial controls, including segregation of duties. The Treasurer of the Red Brick Academy board has over 15 years of financial experience and has worked with several fortune 500 companies and helped to complete the accreditation process through the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulations for a barber school in Houston. The Treasurer will be responsible for providing oversight of all financial systems, leading the monthly financial committee board meetings, and delivering financial reports to the board during monthly board meetings. The Finance Committee will be responsible

for initial review of the annual budget and monthly financials, prior to them being presented to the full board for review, discussion, iteration, and approval. The roles of governance and management for school finances are outlined in Table 12.

Systems, Policies, and Processes

The Red Brick Academy team will prepare all financial documents in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles GAAP. The Red Brick Academy team has prepared a balanced budget for year 0 through year 5 that will ensure the school is financially stable. The Financial Workbook is included in **Attachment 31** based on conservative assumptions explained in the budget narrative in **Attachment 32.** We will use the Enterprise Information System for Texas Schools TxEIS ¹⁷⁵ software for finance and human resource data that is compatible with PEIMS and fully compliant with state

and federal mandates to support in our efforts to remain in compliance with all financial reporting.

Financial Transparency

The Red Brick Academy team understands that successfully managing public funds is critical to the operations of our school. This responsibility also comes with the need to be financial transparent to TEA and the public. As such, our budgeting and financial records are available to the public and remain in compliance with TEA financial reporting. Budget discussions, review, and approval will take place during a board meeting which will comply with all open meeting law requirements, including being in a publicly accessible location. Our budget will be presented at minimally two board meetings each year for discussion prior to approval of the budget by board vote during a public meeting. We will also prepare AFR statements each year by ensuring that annual financial statements are audited by a licensed CPA firm, the audit is approved by the board, and the TEA requested audit documents are submitted through the AUDIT and Indirect Costs application in the Texas Education Agency Login TEAL and are submitted using the Charter School Data Template. ¹⁷⁶ Any audit findings will be addressed in a timely manner.

Funding and Fundraising

We have a firm commitment of donation from the Walton Family Foundation available through BES in the amount of \$75,000. The letter of assurance is included in **Attachment 33**. We anticipate funding from CSP and have incorporated the \$900,000 in startup funds into our Y0-Y5 budget. The board will set fundraising goals and oversee fundraising efforts seeking applicable grants and high net worth individuals to donate to our school. Fundraising activities including, but are not limited to, creating virtual fundraising events, time-bound donation campaigns, establish monthly giving programs, and incorporating donation drives for specific causes.

Contracted Services

We partner with external contractors for accounting/audit; legal; food service; payroll services; and speech, occupational therapy, physical therapy, and bilingual services.

Contingency Plans

The start-up plan is a robust guide to ensure that we meet all year 0 targets. However, we understand that there may be unforeseen challenges that we must proactively plan to mitigate. Our primary funding source is student enrollment. As such, we have built a contingency budget based on having 70% of the expected enrollment in Y1. To decrease

our expenses, we made the following changes to the budget resulting in \$1,828,568 in total expenses and \$1,965,328 in total revenue and a net operating budget of \$136,760.

- Eliminated SEL coordinator role; the Director of Special Education will take on this role for Y1
- Created three cohorts of classes per grade instead of the original four. Doing so eliminates 1 math and 1 ELA teacher per grade resulting in a decrease of 4 teacher positions in Y1
- Eliminated Family Engagement and External Partnership coordinator; the Counselor will take on this role in Y1
- Changed the Office Manager role from 1 FTE to 0.5 FTE. The Director of Operations will take on the other half of the role
- Changed Chromebook to student ratio from 1:1 to 1:2
- Changed all enrollment based operating expenses to reflect the 70% student enrollment.

BYLAWS OF RED BRICK ACADEMY, INC.

WHEREAS, the initial Board of Directors of Red Brick Academy, Inc. (the "Corporation") caused to be filed with the Texas Secretary of State a Certificate of Formation for the organization of the Corporation NOW, THEREFORE:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the Corporation, that these Bylaws will govern its affairs in pursuit of its declared purposes.

PREAMBLE CORPORATE PURPOSE, OBJECTIVES AND DEDICATION OF ASSETS

The Corporation shall enrich, strengthen, enhance, and support the advancement of education and school choice in Texas by engaging in fundraising as it deems appropriate in furtherance of the purposes as provided in the Certificate of Formation. The Corporation shall also seek to own and operate an Open-Enrollment Charter School (the "School") as provided under the Texas Education Code for the benefit of students in Texas, providing educational opportunities, programs and such other functions as it deems appropriate in furtherance of the purposes as provided in the Certificate of Formation. This Corporation is formed for charitable purposes, and it will be nonprofit and nonpartisan. No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation will consist of the publication or dissemination of materials or statements with the purpose of attempting to influence legislation, and the Corporation will not participate or intervene in any political campaign on behalf of or in opposition to any candidate of public office. The Corporation will not engage in any activities or exercise any powers that are not in furtherance of the charitable purposes described in the Certificate of Formation.

The properties and assets of the Corporation are irrevocably dedicated to charitable and educational purposes. No part of the net earnings, properties or assets of this corporation, on dissolution or otherwise shall inure to the benefit of any private person, or any director or officer of this Corporation. On liquidation or dissolution, all properties, assets and obligations will be distributed or paid over to an organization dedicated to charitable and educational purposes that is tax-exempt pursuant to Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c (3 as amended or as otherwise required by state and federal law.

The Corporation, in all its activities and programs, shall not discriminate on the basis of sex, national origin, ethnicity, religion, disability or any other prohibited manner.

ARTICLE ONE NAME, OFFICE AND SEAL

1.01 NAME: The name of the Corporation is "Red Brick Academy, Inc."

- 1.02 OFFICE: The principal office of the Corporation will be located at 5702 Arabelle Lake Str., Houston, Texas 77007.
- 1.03 SEAL: The corporate seal of the Corporation, if any, will be inscribed with the Corporation name and year and place of its incorporation.

ARTICLE TWO MEETINGS RECORDS

- 2.01 <u>Regular Meetings</u>, <u>Frequency and Place</u>. Regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held on at least a quarterly basis at such places and at such times as the Board may determine.
- 2.02 <u>Annual Meeting</u>. The Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors shall be held on the occasion of its First (1st) Quarterly meeting each and every fiscal year, or as otherwise determined by the Board.
- 2.03 <u>Special Meetings</u>. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called by the Chairman, Secretary, or by any one or more Board members with the consent of the Chairman or Secretary, which consent will not be unreasonably withheld, for any purpose not otherwise proscribed by law, grant or loan condition, or the Certificate of Formation, to transact any business described in the call for the special meetings.

MEETINGS RELATING TO CHARTER SCHOOLS

- 2.04 <u>Charter School Meetings</u>. When conducting business relating in any way to the operations or affairs of any of the Corporation's open-enrollment charter schools, meetings of the Board or any Board Committee shall be conducted in accordance with provisions of the Texas Education Code and Chapter 551 of the Texas Government Code, and the Board of Directors shall be subject to the requirements of the Texas Open Meetings Act, including the following provisions: At no time shall a quorum of the full Board meet to deliberate any issue or business of the Corporation without posting notice of a meeting as set forth below. Directors shall normally attend all meetings in person but may attend by alternate means only if circumstances warrant and expressly in accordance with the Texas Open Meetings Act.
 - a <u>Closed Meetings</u>: The Board may meet in a meeting closed to the public to deliberate on those matters specified in the Texas Open Meetings Act as proper for closed meetings, including but not limited to consultation with attorney, real estate, prospective gifts or donations, personnel matters, security personnel or devices, discipline of a student and complaints against an employee unless the student or employee respectively requests an open meeting.
 - b) <u>Emergency Meetings</u>: In the event of an emergency as defined in the Texas Open Meetings Act, a meeting may be conducted by telephone conference call. If a meeting

BYLAWS RED BRICK ACADEMY, INC. involves telephonic participation, the telephonic participation must be by conference call in which all persons participating can be heard by all other participants and the public.

- c <u>Video Conferencing</u>: Meetings may also be conducted by videoconference call if the presiding officer is present at one location open to the public and he notice of the meeting states the intent to have the presiding officer present. Audio and video must be simultaneously available to the public and the meeting shall be audio recorded. Each participant shall be clearly visible and audible to other participants and to members of the public in attendance. The meeting must meet all other prerequisites and requirements of the Texas Open Meetings Act.
- 2.05 <u>Notice for Charter School Meetings</u>. When conducting business related to the operations or affairs of the Corporation's open-enrollment charter schools, the following shall apply: Notice of all meetings of the Board of Directors, except as otherwise provided by state law, regulation, will be delivered by mail postmarked, electronic facsimile or e-mail transmission to each Director at least 72 hours before the time of the meeting.
 - a <u>Posting of Notice</u>: In addition, notice to the public of any meeting shall be posted at the administrative offices of the Corporation in a location convenient to the public at least 72 hours before the time of such meeting.
 - b) <u>Emergency Notice</u>: Emergency meetings as allowed under the Texas Open Meetings Act may be posted up to one hour before such meeting. At such an emergency meeting, the Board may only address the matter requiring the emergency action. The notice must identify the nature of the emergency and the urgent public necessity requiring emergency action.
 - c <u>Internet Posting</u>: Notice and the agenda of all meetings of the Board of Directors shall also be posted on the Corporation's Internet website for the charter schools, if any, concurrently with the notice posted at the administrative offices, or as otherwise required and authorized by the Texas Open Meetings Act.
 - d) <u>Closed Meetings</u>: The agenda shall clearly state whether the Board intends to convene in a closed meeting and shall identify separately each matter to be deliberated by the Board in the closed meeting and whether the Board may take action on any such matter upon returning to the open meeting. The Secretary shall note the times in the open meeting that the Board convenes to and adjourns from the closed meeting.
- 2.06 <u>Charter School Meeting Order of Business</u>. When conducting business related to the operations or affairs of the Corporation's open-enrollment charter schools, the following shall apply: At regular meetings of the Board, the order of business shall be established in an Agenda approved by the Chairman and as presented in the notice of the meetings. However, the Chairman may modify the order of business. The agenda shall identify all matters to be presented to and considered by the Board. Matters not disclosed in the agenda and meeting notice available to the public shall not be deliberated or be considered by the Board, except as permitted by the Texas Open Meetings Act.

CORPORATE BOARD MEETINGS NOT RELATING TO CHARTER SCHOOLS

2.07 Non-Charter Meetings. When conducting any other Corporate business not related, in any way, to the operations or affairs of the Corporation's open-enrollment charter schools, Board meetings shall be conducted in accordance with provisions of Chapter 22 of the Texas Business Organizations Code, the Certificate of Formation and these bylaws. The Secretary shall cause to be mailed at least forty-eight hours in advance or sent by electronic means at least twenty-four 24) hours in advance to every director at his/her address email address) of record with the Corporation, a notice stating the time and place of every meeting. Notice of such meetings shall state the reasons that such meeting has been called and the business to be transacted at such meeting.

2.08 <u>Board Action By Written Consent</u>. When conducting any Corporate business not related, in any way, to the operations or affairs of the Corporation's open-enrollment charter schools the Board may take any action required or permitted to be taken at a meeting of the Board of Directors or committee of the Corporation, without an actual meeting if a consent, in writing, setting forth the action to be taken, is signed by a majority of directors or committee members entitled to vote (written consent subject to all requirements of applicable law. The written consent for any such action by the Board or committee must state the date of each Director's or committee member's signature and memorialize the action to be taken. The written consent of each of the Directors or committee members must be delivered to the Corporation no later than the tenth 10 th) day after the earliest date of consent and must be delivered to the Chairman or Secretary of the Board. Delivery must be by hand delivery or by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested. Where required by law, including fundamental transactions as applicable, such action shall be by unanimous written consent.

MEETINGS RECORDS GENERALLY

2.09 <u>Corporate Records</u>. The Corporation will maintain at its principal office all financial books and records of account, all minutes of the Board meetings and committee meetings, the list of Directors, and copies of all other material Corporate records, books, documents and contracts as required by Texas law. All such records will be made available for inspection at any reasonable time during usual business hours for any lawful purpose to any officer, Director, or person authorized by law or the Board to inspect such records, and the Corporation's records will also be available to the extent required by the Texas Public Information Act where applicable for public inspection and copying as promptly as possible as required by such act. Upon leaving office, each Director, officer or agent of the Corporation will turn over to the Chairman in good order any Corporation monies, books, records, minutes, lists, documents, contracts or other property of the Corporation in his or her custody or control.

2.10 Quorum. The presence of a majority of the members shall constitute a quorum and shall be necessary to conduct the business of the Corporation except as otherwise

provided in Article 2.14 herein. Any Board vacancies shall not be counted in determining a majority called for by these Bylaws.

- 2.11 <u>Order of Business</u>. Board meetings shall generally proceed with the following order of business:
 - Roll Call and Establishment of a Quorum
 - Public Comments
 - Reading and Approval of Minutes of Preceding Meeting(s)
 - Reports of Committees
 - Reports of Officers
 - Old and Unfinished Business
 - New Business
 - Adjournments

The Board of Directors may, by majority vote, adopt a different agenda order.

- 2.12 <u>Record of Board Action</u>. All motions and resolutions of the Board will be written or recorded in the minutes of the Board and certified copies will be placed in a journal of proceedings of the Board. Such records shall be maintained in accordance with state law and Article 2.09 herein.
- 2.13 <u>Voting</u>. All matters at any meeting of the Board of Directors or any of its designated committees, except as otherwise provided in these Bylaws, the Certificate of Formation, or as permitted by law, will be decided by a vote of a majority of the Directors present at or lawfully participating in the meeting as permitted by the Texas Open Meetings Act. If a quorum of the Board is present or lawfully participating in the meeting, the affirmative vote of a majority of the Board of Directors will be the act of the body corporate, unless the vote of a greater number is required by statute, regulation, the Certificate of Formation, or these Bylaws. Any Director may request a roll call vote on any motion or resolution. Directors may not vote by proxy or secret ballot.
- 2.14 <u>Fundamental Actions</u>. In accordance with Section 22.164 of the Texas Business Organization Code, the following actions of the Board of Directors are fundamental actions that shall require the affirmative vote of the majority of directors then serving on the Board:
 - a Amendment of a certificate of formation [or articles of incorporation];
 - b) Voluntary winding up under Chapter 11;
 - c A revocation of a voluntary decision to wind up under Chapter 11;
 - d) A cancellation of an event requiring winding up under Chapter 11;
 - e A reinstatement under Section 11.202;
 - f A distribution plan under Section 22.305;
 - g) A plan of merger under Subchapter F;
 - h) A sale of all or substantially all of the assets of the Corporation;

- (i A plan of conversion under Subchapter F; or
- j A plan of exchange under Subchapter F
- 2.15 <u>Compensation</u>. Except as provided in this section, no Director will receive directly or indirectly any salary, compensation or gift from the Corporation, except as authorized by state law. The Directors of the Corporation will serve as such without salary. No Director will be entitled to any dividend or any part of the income or principal of the Corporation, or to share in the distribution of the assets upon dissolution of the Corporation. The Board of Directors may authorize the payment by the Corporation of the reasonable, documented and allowable expenses incurred by a Director in performance of his or her duties in accordance with state and federal law.
- 2.16 <u>Parliamentary Procedure</u>. For all matters of parliamentary procedures, the Board and any Committees established by the Board, shall be guided by *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised*, 11th ed. (Cambridge, Mass.: Perseus Publishing, 2011).

ARTICLE THREE DIRECTORS

- 3.01 MANAGEMENT: The activities, affairs, property and powers of the Corporation will be managed, directed, controlled or exercised by and vested in the Board of Directors.
- 3.02 NUMBER AND QUALIFICATIONS: The Board of Directors will consist of no fewer than three (3) persons.
- 3.03 REMOVAL: Any Director who fails to attend three (3 consecutive meetings may be asked to resign from office by resolution of the Board of Directors. The Secretary will notify Directors when they have missed three 3) regular consecutive meetings. Absences may be formally excused by vote of the Board. The Secretary will certify a Director's excessive absence to the Chairman. Any Director may also be removed with or without cause upon a two-thirds (2/3 majority vote of all the remaining directors for removal. However, the Chairman of the Board may only be removed upon a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of all the remaining directors for good cause.
- 3.04 TERM: The Directors shall serve for three-year terms, which may be renewed indefinitely by each respective Director, subject to Articles 3.03 and 3.06 herein. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the three founding directors will draw lots to determine which of the three directors will serve an initial five-year term, four-year term, and three-year term.
- 3.05 VACANCY: The Board of Directors will vote to appoint Directors to fill vacancies. Each Director appointed or designated to fill a vacancy on the Board of Directors will hold office for the remainder of the term of the Board of Directors. A vacancy occurring on any committee may be filled by the Board of Directors for the remainder of the term of the position.

- 3.06 RESIGNATION: Any director or officer may resign from the Corporation by delivering a written letter of resignation to the Chairman of the Board.
- 3.07 COMPENSATION: Except as provided in this section, no Director will receive directly or indirectly any salary, compensation or gift from the Corporation, except as authorized by state law. The Directors of the Corporation will serve as such without salary. No Director will be entitled to any dividend or any part of the income or principal of the Corporation or to share in the distribution of the assets upon dissolution of the Corporation. The Board of Directors may authorize the payment by the Corporation of the reasonable, documented and allowable expenses incurred by a Director in performance of his or her duties in accordance with state and federal law.
- 3.08 CONFLICT OF INTEREST AND INTERESTED DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS: The Board shall adopt (and periodically review) an Ethics and Conflicts of Interest Policy satisfying the requirements of federal and state law governing conflicts of interest and interested transactions among charter school and charter holder board members and officers, as described in Texas Education Code chapter 12 and 19 T.A.C. §§ 100.1131, 100.1132, 100.1133, 100.1134, and as required by Local Government Code chapter 171 and 176 and Government Code chapter 573.
- 3.09 POWERS: All corporate powers, except, such as are otherwise provided for in these Bylaws, the contract for charter and in the laws of the State of Texas, are hereby vested in and shall be exercised by the Board of Directors. Without limiting the Board's authority, the following powers and duties must generally be exercised by the Board, acting as a body corporate in meetings posted in compliance with Texas Government Code, Chapter 551:
 - a Final authority to hear or decide employee grievances, citizen complaints, or parental concerns;
 - b) Final authority to adopt or amend the budget of the charter holder or the charter school;
 - c Final authority to authorize the expenditure or obligation of state funds or the use of public property;
 - d) Final authority to direct the disposition or safekeeping of public records;
 - e Final authority to adopt policies governing charter school operations;
 - f Final authority to approve audit reports; and
 - g) Initial or final authority to select, employ, direct, evaluate, renew, nonrenew, terminate, or set compensation for the Chief Executive Officer.

ARTICLE FOUR OFFICERS

4.01 OFFICERS: The officers of the Corporation will consist of the Chairman of the Board, a Vice-Chairman of the Board, and a Secretary/Treasurer and any other officers that the Board may establish and designate by resolution adopted by a majority of vote of the whole Board.

- 4.02 ELECTION: The officers of the Corporation will be elected each year by the Board of Directors at its annual meeting.
- 4.03 CHAIRMAN: The Chairman of the Board will preside at all meetings of the Board of Directors. The Chairman will have other powers and duties not inconsistent with these Bylaws as may be assigned by the Board. The Vice-Chairman will have the powers and duties of the Chairman in his absence.
- 4.04 SECRETARY: A Secretary will act under the direction of the Chairman and in his absence, have the duties and powers of the Chairman. A Secretary will have other duties and powers as the Chairman of the Board of Directors may assign. The Secretary will have the general powers and duties usually vested in such office of a Corporation, including keeping all records, documents and the corporate seal at the principal office of the Corporation; affixing the corporate seal to any instrument requiring it and to attest the same by his or her signature when authorized by the Board of Directors or after the instrument has been signed by the Chairman, Vice-Chairman or other authorized officer or agent; keeping the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Directors, the Executive and other committees of the Board of Directors, the Executive and other committees of the Corporation to recorded in one or more books provided for that purpose, with the time and place, how they were called or authorized, the notice given, the names of those present, and the proceedings therein; and issuing proper notices in accordance with these Bylaws. The Secretary will have such other powers and duties not inconsistent with these Bylaws as may be assigned by the Board of Directors or the Chairman.
- 4.05 TREASURER: The Treasurer will be responsible for all funds and securities of the Corporation and will have the general powers and duties usually vested in such office of a Corporation, including receiving and documenting all monies due and payable to the Corporation; depositing all monies received in the name of the Corporation in a depository designed by the Board, disbursing monies of the Corporation under the direction or orders of the Board; entering regularly in the books kept by the Treasurer a complete and accurate account of all monies received and disbursed by the Corporation; rendering a statement of the financial accounts of the Corporation to the Board as requested; exhibiting the books of account in his custody to any Director upon request; and submitting a full financial report to the Board of Directors at the annual meetings. The Treasurer will have such other powers and duties not inconsistent with the Bylaws as may be assigned by the Board of Directors or the Chairman.
- 4.07 OTHER OFFICERS: The Board of Directors may create by resolution other offices as it deems necessary to serve the Corporation, who need not be directors, to serve as officers or agents of the Corporation.

ARTICLE FIVE COMMITTEES

5.01 COMMITTEES: Designated committees may be established by the Chairman of the Board or the Board to perform the duties and functions assigned in furtherance of Board objectives. Any committee may include one or more Directors from the Board. The Chairman of the Board or its designee will appoint the members, officers, or others to committee positions. The rules of procedure of any committee may be set by the Board. Any committee may be abolished, or any committee member removed for any reason and at any time by the Board of Directors.

5.02 NOTICE: Any committee meeting at which a quorum of the Board of Directors attends, or at which a deliberation as defined by the Open Meetings Act takes place, shall give written notice of the meeting and shall keep and deliver a copy of minutes of its proceedings to the Secretary of the Board, in accordance with the Texas Open Meetings Act. Committees that are advisory only without delegated authority or power may not fall under the Open Meetings Act. If, however, a committee has delegated authority or it has power to make final decisions, to adopt rules regarding school business, or if the Board of Directors usually approves its recommendations in full, then it must meet in accordance with the Open Meetings Act.

ARTICLE SIX DEPOSITS, CHECKS, LOANS AND CONTRACTS

- 6.01 DEPOSITORIES: All funds of the Corporation not otherwise employed will be deposited in banks or other depositories designated by the Board of Directors and in accordance with state law.
- 6.02 TRANSACTIONS: All checks, drafts, endorsements, notes and evidences of indebtedness of the Corporation will be signed by such officers or agents and all endorsements for deposits to the credit of the Corporation will be made as authorized by the Board of Directors.
- 6.03 LOAN OR GRANT AUTHORITY: No loans or advances will be contracted on behalf of the Corporation, and no note or other evidence of indebtedness will be issued in its name, except as authorized by the Board.

ARTICLE SEVEN CONTRACTS WITH DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS

7.01 INSIDER DEALING: Subject to any law, regulation, or contractual agreement of the Texas Business Organizations Code, no Director, officer or committee member will be interested directly or indirectly in any contract or program involving Corporation assets, relating to the operation conducted by it or in any contract for furnishing services or supplies to it, unless a) the contract is authorized by a majority of Directors present at a meeting in which there is a quorum and vote without the interested Director's

presence, (b) the facts and nature of the Director's interest is fully disclosed to the whole Board of Directors before the meeting in which the contract will be considered and c) the Corporation could not have obtained a more advantageous arrangement with reasonable effort under the circumstances. Furthermore, in accordance with Texas law and commissioner rule, a transaction with a current or former board member or officer of the charter school, who served within 5 years of the transaction, may require an independent appraisal, audit and prior notice to the TEA for TEA's review and approval prior to entering into such transaction.

7.02 INSIDER LOANS: No loans or grants will be made by the Corporation to its Directors, officers or committee members during their term of office. The Directors who vote for or assent to, and any officer who participates in, the making of a loan to a Director or officer will jointly and severally be liable to the Corporation for the amount of the loan until it is repaid.

ARTICLE EIGHT INDEMNIFICATION OF DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS

8.01 LIABILITY: A Director or committee member will not be required to furnish any bond or surety for his services as a Director or committee member and will not be liable for the act or omission of any other Director.

8.02 INDEMNIFICATION: Any person made or threatened to be made a party to any action in court or other proceeding because he is or was a Director or committee member will be indemnified by the Corporation against any and all liability and the reasonable expenses, including attorney's fees, incurred in connection with the defense or settlement of the action, except where it is adjudged that the Director or committee member is liable for gross negligence, bad faith or willful misconduct in performing his duties. The right of indemnification will not exclude any other right of the Director or committee member. INDEMNIFICATION UNDER THIS SECTION IS SUBJECT TO ANY AND ALL PROHIBITIONS, RESTRICTIONS AND LIMITATIONS IMPOSED BY LAW.

8.03 INSURANCE: The Board of Directors will have the power to purchase and maintain at the Corporation's expense insurance on behalf of the Corporation, the Board of Directors, and others.

ARTICLE NINE AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS

9.01 AMENDMENT: Except as otherwise provided in the Certificate of Formation, and subject to the power of the Board to amend or repeal these Bylaws, these Bylaws may be altered, amended or repealed and new Bylaws may be adopted by a majority vote, provided that written notice setting forth in detail the proposed Bylaws revisions with explanations for the change is given at least three days previously. In the case of an emergency, which must be explained in the notice, two hours notice of a proposed

BYLAWS RED BRICK ACADEMY, INC. amendment may be given to all Directors, and the Bylaws may be amended upon the unanimous vote of all Directors.

ARTICLE TEN MISCELLANOUS

10.01 FISCAL YEAR. The fiscal year of the Corporation will begin on July 1 of each year and will end on June 30 of the next year.

10.02 ANNUAL REPORT: The Treasurer shall obtain and will provide to the Board no later than 90 days after the close of the fiscal year a report containing the following information in appropriate detail.

- a The assets and liabilities of the Corporation as of the end of the fiscal year.
- b) The principal changes in assets and liabilities during the fiscal year;
- c The revenues and receipts, both restricted and unrestricted to particular purposes, for the fiscal year.
- d) The expenses or disbursements, for both general and restricted purposes, during the fiscal year;
- The substantial activities and projects begun, in progress, and completed during the Fiscal year.
- f Such other information as may be requested by the Board.

The report will be accompanied by a report of an independent accountant, or in lieu of such report, the certificate of an authorized officer of the Corporation that such statements were prepared without audit from the books and records of the Corporation.

10.03 FEDERAL TAX FILING: The officers of the Corporation will be responsible for ensuring timely annual filing of IRS Form 990 within the timeframes of IRS rules.

10.04 CONSTRUCTION: Whenever the context requires, the masculine will include the feminine and neuter, and the singular will include the plural, and vice versa. If any portion of these Bylaws is declared invalid or inoperative, then so far as is reasonable the remainder of these Bylaws will be considered valid and operative and effect will be given to the intent manifested by the portion held invalid or inoperative.

Article I

Purpose

The purpose of the conflict of interest policy is to protect Red Brick Academy, Inc. s the "Organization" interest when it is contemplating entering into a transaction or arrangement that might benefit the private interest of an officer or director of the Organization or might result in a possible excess benefit transaction. This policy is intended to supplement but not replace any applicable state and federal laws governing conflict of interest applicable to nonprofit and charitable organizations.

Article II

Definitions

Interested Person

Any director, principal officer, or member of a committee with governing board delegated powers, who has a direct or indirect financial interest, as defined below, is an interested person.

Financial Interest

A person has a financial interest if the person has, directly or indirectly, through business, investment, or family:

- **a.** An ownership or investment interest in any entity with which the Organization has a transaction or arrangement,
- **b.** A compensation arrangement with the Organization or with any entity or individual with which the Organization has a transaction or arrangement, or
- **c.** A potential ownership or investment interest in, or compensation arrangement with, any entity or individual with which the Organization is negotiating a transaction or arrangement.
- **d.** Compensation includes direct and indirect remuneration as well as gifts or favors that are not insubstantial. A financial interest is not necessarily a conflict of interest. Under Article III, Section 2, a person who has a financial interest may have a conflict of interest only if the appropriate governing board or committee decides that a conflict of interest exists.

Article III

Procedures

1. Duty to Disclose

In connection with any actual or possible conflict of interest, an interested person must disclose the existence of the financial interest and be given the opportunity to disclose all

material facts to the directors and members of committees with governing board delegated powers considering the proposed transaction or arrangement.

2. Determining Whether a Conflict of Interest Exists

After disclosure of the financial interest and all material facts, and after any discussion with the interested person, he/she shall leave the governing board or committee meeting while the determination of a conflict of interest is discussed and voted upon. The remaining board or committee members shall decide if a conflict of interest exists.

3. Procedures for Addressing the Conflict of Interest

- **a.** An interested person may make a presentation at the governing board or committee meeting, but after the presentation, he/she shall leave the meeting during the discussion of, and the vote on, the transaction or arrangement involving the possible conflict of interest.
- **b.** The chairperson of the governing board or committee shall, if appropriate, appoint a disinterested person or committee to investigate alternatives to the proposed transaction or arrangement.
- **c.** After exercising due diligence, the governing board or committee shall determine whether the Organization can obtain with reasonable efforts a more advantageous transaction or arrangement from a person or entity that would not give rise to a conflict of interest.
- **d.** If a more advantageous transaction or arrangement is not reasonably possible under circumstances not producing a conflict of interest, the governing board or committee shall determine by a majority vote of the disinterested directors whether the transaction or arrangement is in the Organization's best interest, for its own benefit, and whether it is fair and reasonable. In conformity with the above determination it shall make its decision as to whether to enter into the transaction or arrangement.

4. Violations of the Conflicts of Interest Policy

- **a.** If the governing board or committee has reasonable cause to believe a member has failed to disclose actual or possible conflicts of interest, it shall inform the member of the basis for such belief and afford the member an opportunity to explain the alleged failure to disclose.
- **b.** If, after hearing the member's response and after making further investigation as warranted by the circumstances, the governing board or committee determines the member has failed to disclose an actual or possible conflict of interest, it shall take appropriate disciplinary and corrective action.

Article IV

Records of Proceedings

The minutes of the governing board and all committees with board delegated powers shall contain:

- **a.** The names of the persons who disclosed or otherwise were found to have a financial interest in connection with an actual or possible conflict of interest, the nature of the financial interest, any action taken to determine whether a conflict of interest was present, and the governing board's or committee's decision as to whether a conflict of interest in fact existed.
- **b.** The names of the persons who were present for discussions and votes relating to the transaction or arrangement, the content of the discussion, including any alternatives to the proposed transaction or arrangement, and a record of any votes taken in connection with the proceedings.

Article V

Compensation

- **a.** A voting member of the governing board who receives compensation, directly or indirectly, from the Organization for services is precluded from voting on matters pertaining to that member's compensation.
- **b.** A voting member of any committee whose jurisdiction includes compensation matters and who receives compensation, directly or indirectly, from the Organization for services is precluded from voting on matters pertaining to that member's compensation.
- **c.** No voting member of the governing board or any committee whose jurisdiction includes compensation matters and who receives compensation, directly or indirectly, from the Organization, either individually or collectively, is prohibited from providing information to any committee regarding compensation.

Article VI

Annual Statements

Each director, principal officer and member of a committee with governing board delegated powers shall annually sign a statement which affirms such person:

- a. Has received a copy of the conflicts of interest policy,
- **b.** Has read and understands the policy,
- c. Has agreed to comply with the policy, and
- **d.** Understands the Organization is charitable and in order to maintain its federal tax exemption it must engage primarily in activities which accomplish one or more of its tax-exempt purposes.

Article VII

Periodic Reviews

To ensure the Organization operates in a manner consistent with charitable purposes and does not engage in activities that could jeopardize its tax-exempt status, periodic reviews shall be conducted. The periodic reviews shall, at a minimum, include the following subjects:

- **a.** Whether compensation arrangements and benefits are reasonable, based on competent survey information, and the result of arm's length bargaining.
- **b.** Whether partnerships, joint ventures, and arrangements with management organizations conform to the Organization's written policies, are properly recorded, reflect reasonable investment or payments for goods and services, further charitable purposes and do not result in inurement, impermissible private benefit or in an excess benefit transaction.

Article VIII

Use of Outside Experts

When conducting the periodic reviews as provided for in Article VII, the Organization may, but need not, use outside advisors. If outside experts are used, their use shall not relieve the governing board of its responsibility for ensuring periodic reviews are conducted.

REQUEST FOR EXPEDITED SERVICE

This is a request for expedited processing of Form 1023 for Red Brick Academy, Inc. I believe there is a compelling reason to expedite because the Corporation must meet a April 8, 2021 deadline set by the Texas Education Agency ("TEA") to have received and submitted a determination letter in connection with its State of Texas Generation 26 open enrollment charter application. This deadline must be met in order to receive federal and state grants necessary to open and operate a Texas Open-Enrollment Charter School in the fall of 2022. These federal and state grant funds for operations of the entity are dependent on a timely determination received from the IRS. Only qualified 501(c)(3) entities may receive a charter, and state law requires a determination letter from the IRS as stated above. The State of Texas has significant regulatory authority over charter schools and charter holders, unlike other states, and tightly oversees all aspects of their operations. If a determination letter is not received and expedite is not granted, Red Brick Academy, Inc. will lose out not only on state funding, but will lose the significant grants, described below, that are contingent on it being awarded a Generation 26 charter this application cycle.

The purpose of Red Brick Academy is to own and operate an open-enrollment charter school. As an Open-Enrollment Charter School, Red Brick Academy will be a public school of choice using innovative and focused efforts to improve student learning, increase the choice of learning opportunities within the community, create professional opportunities that will attract new teachers to the community, and encourage and facilitate development of different and innovative learning methods within the Texas Public School System. It is in the best interest of the public that Red Brick Academy receive an expedited determination.

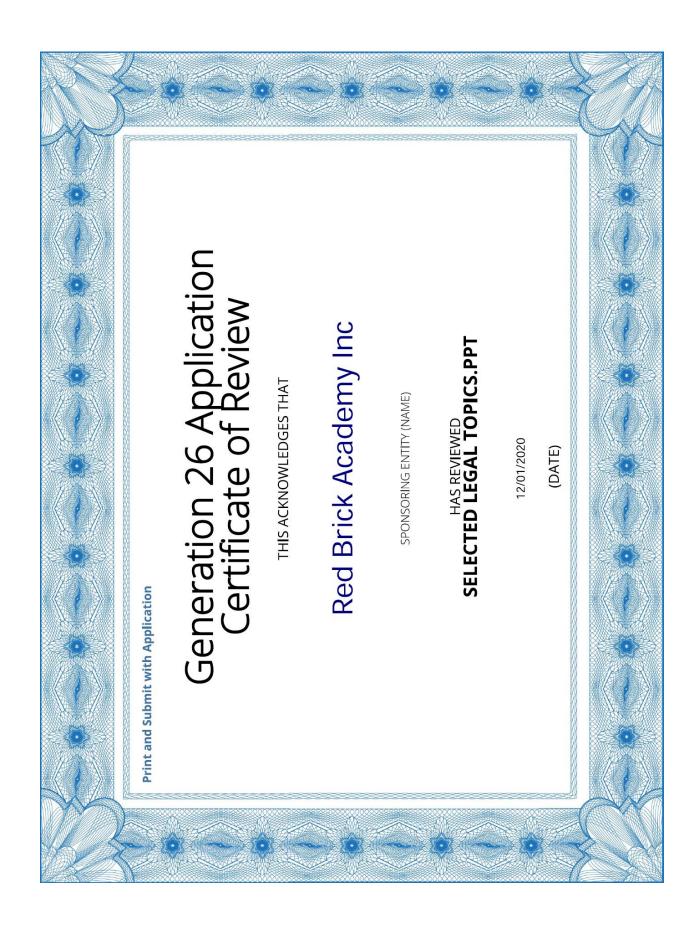

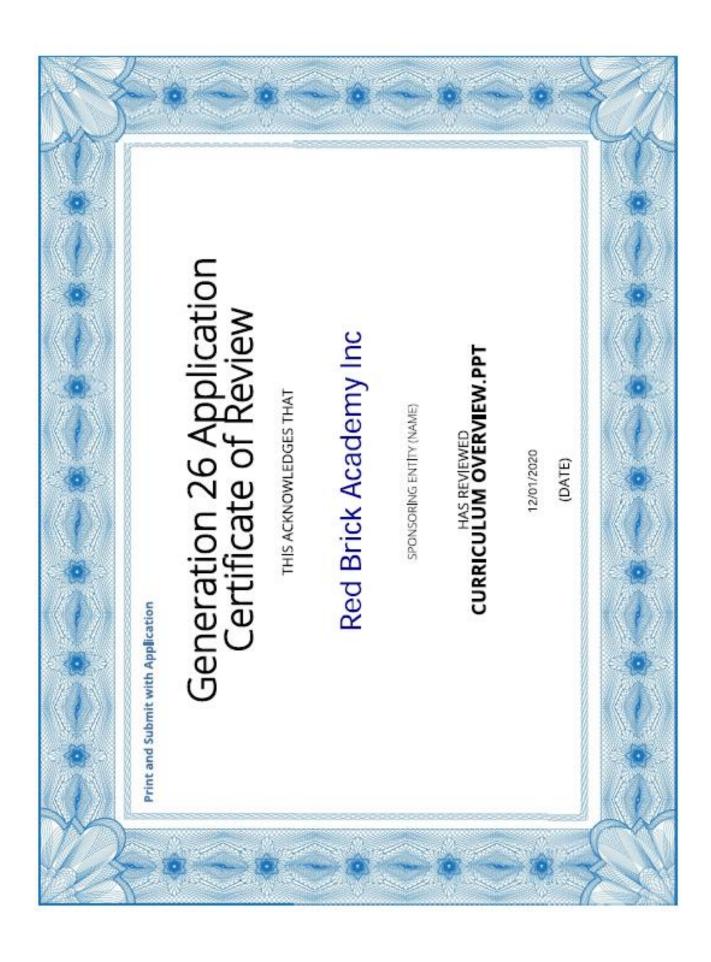

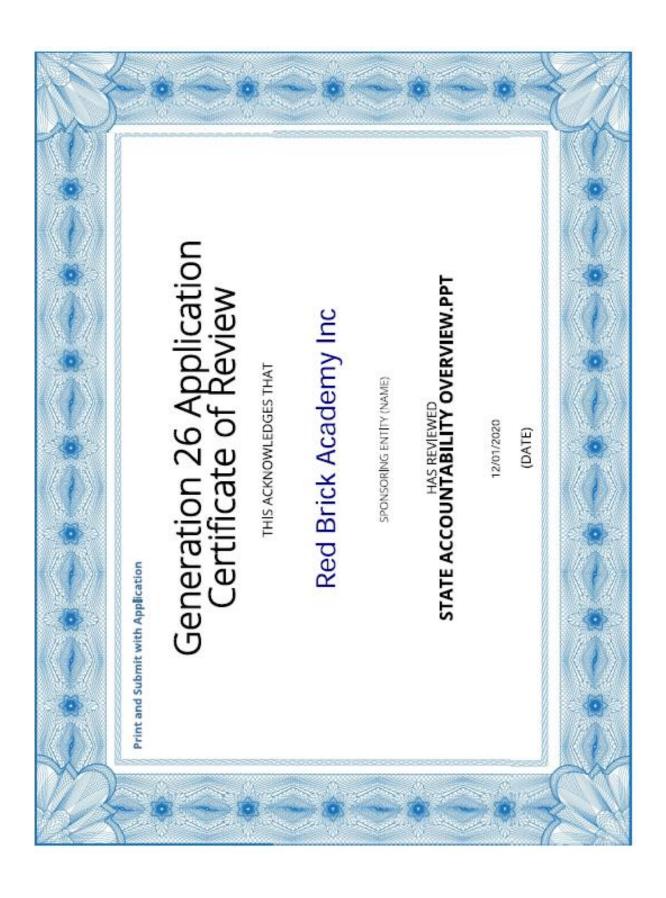

Community Engagement and Demand Summary

We have engaged with over 350 Houston stakeholders including organizational/business leaders, students, families, and educators to gain an understanding of the educational, political, and social dynamics in the North Houston community. From conversations with organizational leaders, we gathered that many children of color attend low-performing schools by design. Strategic zoning has left them with neighborhood schools that do not successfully prepare them for academic success. There are a few schools sprinkled throughout the neighborhood that are highly sought after, but there are not enough openings for every child whose family wants them to attend these schools. They also spoke about the need for schools to use resources in the community to help students and families. The families whom we connected with are most excited about a school that prepares their children to go to college. The majority were also in favor of key design elements such as: longer school days and school calendar, uniforms, and firm yet supportive discipline structures. Educators in our input meetings highlighted the importance of having intervention structures, especially given the challenges of COVID-19, for struggling learners, opportunities for students to build relationships across lines of difference, a supporting school administration, and strong professional development supports that ensure staff members have the skills to implement the school programs in high quality. We collected over 60 surveys from middle school students. The surveys highlighted that they think good teachers, a respectful community, and fun events make a great school. Sixty percent of students reported that they strongly believe that they learn more when their work is challenging. Surprisingly, more than half of the students were in favor of longer school days and school calendar because it gave them more time with their friends and opportunities for tutoring and clubs after school. However, the majority (61%) was strongly against uniforms even though parents/guardians where highly in favor of uniforms.

The information that we gathered from Houston stakeholders were incorporated into our school design including: adding additional time in the school day and school calendar, robust academic and socioemotional interventions for struggling students, intensive teacher development structures, regular joy events, a challenging curriculum, and strategic community partners to support our families and students.

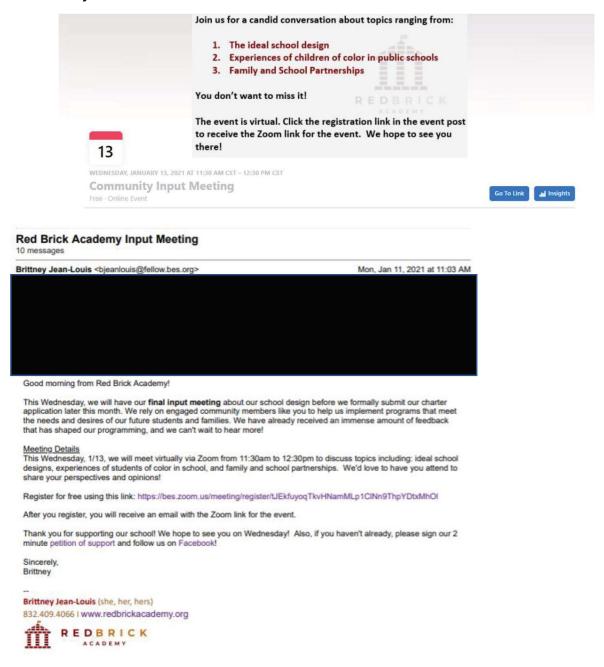

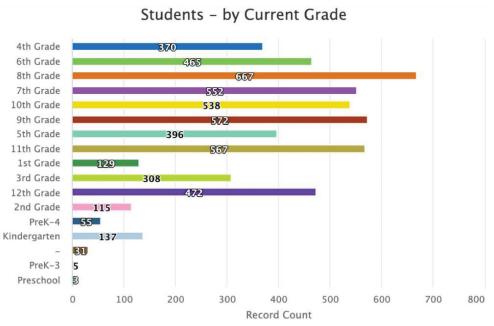

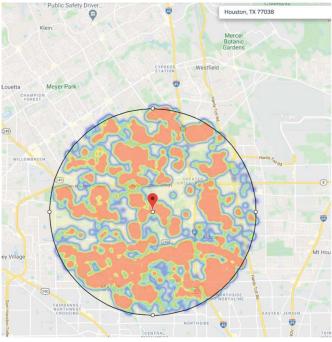

Attachment 8: Proposed Discipline Policy

Provide the school's proposed discipline policy.

Red Brick Academy Discipline Policy

(Adopted from Ascend Public Schools and KIPP Texas)

We expect that all members of the Red Brick Academy treat others with respect and dignity to preserve the emotional and physical safety of all students and staff.

Every student has the right to learn in a safe, structured environment. Any student that breaks our community values and takes away this right from themselves or others will be subject to disciplinary actions.

A disciplinary offense may occur while the student is: at school and/or on school grounds; participating in a school sponsored activity; walking to or from school or a school sponsored event; walking to or from, waiting for, or riding on school transportation or a yellow school bus; or walking to or from, waiting for, or riding public transportation to and from school or a school-sponsored activity conducted outside of school. School-related disciplinary offenses may also include misconduct outside of school, such as social media activities or other cyber activities that could reasonably affect the school or affect the learning environment.

School leaders and faculty will use their professional judgment to determine which disciplinary action(s) will be most effective in addressing student misconduct, taking into account the following factors and other relevant issues:

- The age and level of maturity of the student.
- The nature and seriousness of the violation and the circumstances that led to the violation.
- The student's previous disciplinary record
- The effectiveness of other forms of discipline.
- Information from parents or guardians, teachers and / or others, as appropriate.

When a student fails to meet behavioral expectations and a violation of the Discipline Policy, clear and consistent disciplinary action and other consequences will occur as described below. Progressively more serious disciplinary consequences will be imposed on any student who repeatedly commits one or more disciplinary infractions. The school reserves the right to consult with the police when appropriate

Conduct in the Classroom

When students exhibit misbehavior, teachers respond with interventions to redirect them using non-punitive logical consequences. Continued misbehavior has more serious consequences, including referral to the Director of SEL or Assistant Principal.

Withdrawal from the classroom

Atrocious behaviors, including continuous disruption, extreme disrespect for the teacher or others, or any physical altercation, result in removal from class and referral to the Director of SEL or Assistant Principal, followed by a phone call home and/or suspension.

Extra support after school

At the school's discretion, students may be assigned after-school support to reteach, practice, or research expected behaviors. After school support will take place after dismissal and will be assigned to students as a result of, but not limited to, the following:

- Excessive tardiness
- Incomplete or excessive missing homework
- Category I or II behavior violations

After-school support may be assigned the same day as the infraction, but the school will make every effort to notify parents before assigning this logical consequence whenever possible.

Disciplinary actions

The following list is not exhaustive but provides examples of violations of the Code that may have disciplinary consequences. The school may modify the list of behavior violations and consequences from time to time with notice to students and their families.

Category I Behavior Violations

The following behaviors may have consequences determined by the child's teacher or additional support after school. Repeated Category I offenses, based on severity, may be treated as Category II offenses. Category I behaviors can have consequences that may include suspension.

1.1. Non-compliance: Every student must obey all adults in the school, including administrators, teachers, educational assistants, secretaries, custodians, cafeteria workers, and security guards. It is unacceptable for students to respond to adults, be rude or disrespectful, or show non-verbal signs of defiance.

- 1.2. Behaving in a manner that disrupts the educational process: Classroom and school rules are established to protect the integrity of the learning environment, and students must follow them at all times. Students who cause a disruption by talking, making noises, throwing objects, inappropriate displays of affection, or distracting classmates or the teacher are disrupting the educational process.
- 1.3. Uniform Violation: Students must wear the school uniform every day.
- 1.4. School Dishonesty Students should not engage in academic cheating. Cheating includes, but is not limited to, giving or receiving any unauthorized assistance or giving or receiving an unfair advantage in any form of academic work. Students must not engage in plagiarism, which includes copying someone else's language, structures, ideas, and / or thoughts and representing it as one's original work. A student must not duplicate, reproduce, retain, or illegally use copyrighted material.
- 1.5. Electronic Media and Communication Devices: Students may not use electronic media and / or communication devices at school. If a student uses such a device at school, in addition to other consequences deemed appropriate by school personnel, the item may be confiscated and held until an adult picks it up.
- 1.6. Engaging in or causing disruptive behavior on the school bus: Students must obey the bus rules and not engage in disruptive behavior or language. Serious behavior offenses can be classified as Category II or III offenses and treated as such.
- 1.7. Not being in assigned place: Students should only be in classrooms and other areas of the school to which permission has been specifically granted.

Category II Behavior Violations

The following behaviors may result in suspension or other disciplinary consequences, depending on the circumstances. Repeated Category II offenses can be treated as Category III offenses. Students who repeatedly engage in Category II behaviors or have felony offenses in Category II behaviors may also be subject to long-term suspension or expulsion.

2.1 Truancy and class cuts: Any full or part-time absence from school that is not justified by a parent or legal guardian is considered truancy. Being absent from one or more classes during the school day without permission from school personnel is "cutting classes" and is not allowed.

- 2.2 Profanity or obscenity: Students must not say or write inappropriate words or make obscene gestures. Students must not draw or show sexually explicit images to anyone at school. Cursing or swearing is also strictly prohibited.
- 2.3 Play fighting and threatening: Students may not play fighting and / or threatening others as such behavior compromises the safety of the community.
- 2.4 Smoking: Smoking and possessing any type of tobacco is prohibited at school, on school grounds, or at any school-related activity.
- 2.5 Alcohol, drugs, and drug paraphernalia: Students are not to bring alcohol, drugs, or any drug paraphernalia to school. They must not manufacture, sell, manipulate, possess, use, deliver or be under any degree of influence of any alcoholic beverage, intoxicant, or drug (legal intoxication is not a requirement). Students must not inhale any substance for the purpose of becoming intoxicated or under the influence. Prescription medications must be delivered to the school by the parent or guardian with the written authorization of a physician. All prescription medications must be administered at school by the school nurse. As described below, possession of narcotics with the intent to sell or distribute is a Category III violation and can lead to immediate suspension, a recommendation for expulsion, and a police referral.
- 2.6 Pornographic material: Possession or creation of pornographic material is not tolerated.
- 2.7 Theft: students must not take without permission anything that does not belong to them or have in their possession what they have stolen.
- 2.8 Disorderly aggressive conduct: students shall not, by any type of conduct (including, but not limited to, violence, force, noise, coercion, threat, intimidation, fear, or passive resistance), cause the disruption, disruption, or obstruction of any school function, activity or event. Students may not urge other students to engage in such conduct for the purpose of causing such disruption or obstruction.
- 2.9 Gang Activity: Gang activity is defined as a gathering of individuals meeting on an ongoing basis, the purpose of which, in the school's reasonable belief, is to violate school policy. Students are not to wear or display clothing, jewelry, colors, or insignia that a teacher or administrator may reasonably perceive as evidence of gang membership or affiliation or that otherwise symbolizes support of a gang. Students should not use any word, phrase, written symbol, or gesture that intentionally identifies them as gang members or symbolizes gang support, or attempts to recruit others into gangs.

- 2.10 Defacement or destruction of property: Students must not mark, damage, break, or destroy school property or anything that belongs to another person. Students who destroy or vandalize school property must pay for loss or damage, in addition to other consequences that school personnel deem appropriate.
- 2.11 Sexual Misconduct or Inappropriate Contact Students are not to engage in sexual activities of any kind or touch themselves or others in an unacceptable manner. "Unacceptable" is defined using the "reasonable person" standard, for example, if a reasonable person in our community considers a certain action to be rude or offensive, then it is unacceptable.
- 2.12 Teasing: Students are not to tease, tease, or tease others in a playful or malicious manner.
- 2.13 Similar Weapons: Possession, manipulation or transmission of any object or instrument that is a "similar" weapon or instrument (eg a rubber knife or a toy gun) is strictly prohibited.
- 2.14 Abusive or Profane Language or Treatment: Students may not use abusive, threatening, vulgar, rude, or degrading language (including racial epithets or sexist or homophobic comments).
- 2.15 Engaging in inappropriate use of social media: Students may not engage in conduct or communication online that may harass or intimidate any member of the school community, or reasonably cause a disruption to the educational environment.

Category III behavior violations

Any student who engages in any of the behaviors in this category may be suspended or expelled from school.

- 3.1 Committing assault or assault and battery: Students may not commit assault, including sexual assault, or assault and battery on a student, school employee, or other person. Assault is an attempt or threat to physically harm another person; the assault does not require physical contact. Assault is any illegal touching by another person.
- 3.2 Bullying or "bullying" (including cyberbullying): Bullying is defined as a series of acts or a single negative act (depending on severity) that involves a real or perceived power imbalance, for example where there is a More powerful student (either real or perceived) harasses another less powerful or perceived less powerful student. Bullying can take many forms, including, but not limited to: (1) physical, for example hitting, kicking, spitting, pushing, and taking personal belongings; (2) verbal, eg name calling, malicious teasing,

insults, threats; and (3) psychological, for example, spreading rumors; manipulating social relationships; or participate in social exclusion, extortion or intimidation. Cyberbullying involves the use of information technology, including email, instant messaging, blogs, chat rooms, pagers, cell phones, and gaming systems in deliberate harassment, threat, or intimidation of the students. Examples include sending mean, vulgar, or threatening messages or images; post confidential and private information about another person (including "sexting") and impersonation.

- 3.3 Extortion: Students must not force a person, through intimidation, threat or force, to do something that person does not want to do. Students must not participate in the act of securing or attempting to secure money or other items of value from an unwilling person.
- 3.4 Harassment: Harassment of any kind, including humiliation and discriminatory harassment, is prohibited. Students must not make unwelcome sexual advances or requests for sexual favors; or engage in verbal or physical conduct related to a person's sex, race, color, national origin, sexual orientation, religion, height, weight, marital status, or disability (for example, comments sexual or racial threats, or insults, or unwelcome touching)) Students may not engage in harassment of students off school property in circumstances where such off-campus conduct: 1) affects the educational process; 2) really endangers the health and safety of our students; or 3) reasonably believed to pose a danger to the health and safety of our students. This includes written and / or verbal harassment, including cyberbullying, that materially and substantially disrupts school work and discipline and / or that school officials reasonably forecast is likely to materially and substantially disrupt academic work and learning, school culture.
- 3.5 Actions against staff members: Harassing (verbal or written abuse or disrespect), intimidating, threatening or physically abusing a staff member is not allowed.
- 3.6 Weapons: Students must not possess, handle, transmit or use as a weapon any instrument that can be used to injure another person. Weapons include, but are not limited to:
 - Firearms: any weapon (including a starter pistol) designed to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive or that can be easily converted into a projectile.
 - Explosives Any prepared chemical or substance that can explode or is capable of inflicting bodily injury or is reasonably likely to cause physical discomfort to another person, including fireworks and firecrackers.
 - Knives: any knife or blade of any size.
 - Chemicals such as mace, pepper spray or similar substances

- Electric gun; brass knuckles; or blackjack
- Dangerous Goods Prohibited items not designed as weapons that can be used or perceived as such, including, but not limited to, razors, box cutters, hammers, baseball bats, and metal combs of any length with a sharp handle
- 3.7 Possession of narcotics with the intent to distribute or sell: Possession of narcotics with the intent to distribute or sell may be cause for immediate suspension, a recommendation for expulsion to the school board of directors, and a referral to officials charged with making obey the law.
- 3.8 False fire alarms or bomb reports: Students are not to break or activate the fire alarm at any time unless there is an emergency, nor make bomb threats.
- 3.9 Starting a Fire: Starting a fire or conspiring to start a fire on school property is strictly prohibited.

Half day suspension

If a student needs to go home due to a behavior violation, a parent/guardian must come to school and remove the student from school. Students sent home for behavior infractions are not dismissed unless the parent, guardian, or authorized adult has personally arrived at the school or has given the school permission to dismiss the child to walk home or take public transportation.

<u>Procedures and due process for short-term suspensions</u>

A short-term suspension refers to the removal of a student from school for disciplinary reasons for a period of up to ten (10) days. This includes in-school suspension.

The Superintendent may impose a short-term suspension and must follow due process procedures consistent with applicable federal jurisprudence. Before imposing a short-term suspension, the Superintendent will orally notify the student of the charges against him or her. If the student denies the misconduct, the Superintendent must provide an explanation of the evidence against the student. The student will be given the opportunity to deny or explain the charges against him or her that led to the suspension.

The Superintendent shall immediately notify the parents or guardians in writing that the student may be suspended from school. Written notification will be provided by personal delivery or express mail delivery within 24 hours of the decision to impose suspension at the last known address (es) of the parent/guardian. Notification will also be provided by phone if the school has received a phone number for the purpose of contacting parents or guardians.

The notice shall provide a description of the incidents for which suspension is proposed and inform the parents or guardians of their right to request an immediate informal conference with the Superintendent. Both the notification and the informal conference will be conducted in the dominant language or mode of communication used by the parents / guardians if Red Brick staff knows it is not English. At the conference, the parent(s) or guardian(s) of the student and the student will have the opportunity to present the student's version of the incident and ask questions of the complaining witnesses in accordance with procedures established by the Superintendent. Notice and the opportunity for an informal conference will take place before the student is suspended unless the student's presence in school poses a continuing danger to persons or property or a continuing threat of disruption of the academic process, in which case the notice and opportunity for an informal conference will be held as soon as possible after the suspension, as is reasonably possible.

The decision of the Superintendent may be appealed to the Governing Board, which will make its decision based solely on the record before it. All appeals to the Board must be submitted in writing and sent to the Board within ten (10) calendar days of the date of the Superintendent 's decision, unless the parents or guardians can demonstrate that circumstances extraordinary events prevented them from doing so. The Board of Directors will issue a written decision within ten (10) working days after receiving the appeal. Final decisions of the Board may be appealed to the school's authorizer.

<u>Procedures and due process for long-term suspensions or expulsion</u>

A long-term suspension refers to the removal of a student from school for disciplinary reasons for a period of more than ten (10) days. Expulsion refers to the permanent removal of a student for disciplinary reasons. This is the final level of correction.

In determining that a student's action warrants possible long-term suspension or expulsion, the following procedure will be followed, consistent with applicable federal jurisprudence:

- If necessary, the student will be immediately removed from class and/or school.
- The Superintendent will verbally inform the student of the charges and the evidence of such charges; where appropriate, the student will have an opportunity to explain their side of events.
- The Superintendent will immediately notify the student's parents or guardians, in person or by phone.
- The Superintendent shall notify in writing that the school will begin a disciplinary hearing for the student and his / her parents or guardians by personal delivery or

express mail delivery as soon as possible to the last known address of the parent (s) or guardian (s).). Such notice will provide a description of the incident or incidents and state that a formal hearing will be held on the matter that may result in long-term suspension or expulsion. The notice provided must be in the dominant language used by the parent (s) or guardian (s) if Red Brick staff knows that it is not English. The notice will state that, at the formal hearing, the student will have the right to be represented by an attorney (at the family's expense), present and cross-examine witnesses, and present evidence.

- The school will set a date, time and place for the formal hearing, which will be set forth in the written notice described above.
- An audio transcript of the formal hearing will be created and made available to all parties upon request.

The Superintendent, or his/her designee, will serve as the hearing officer and preside over the hearing. The hearing officer's report will be advisory only and the Superintendent of schools may accept or reject all or part of it. A written decision will be issued within five (5) school days after the formal hearing for the student and his / her parents or guardians.

An appeal of the decision may be submitted in writing to the Board of Directors, which will make its decision based solely on the record before it. All appeals to the Board must be submitted in writing and sent to the Board within ten (10) calendar days of the date of the written decision, unless the parents or guardians can demonstrate that extraordinary circumstances prevented them. do what. The Board of Directors will issue a written decision within ten (10) working days after receiving the appeal. Final decisions of the Governing Board can be appealed to the school's authorizer.

Provision of instructions during removal

The school will ensure that alternative educational services are provided to a student who has been suspended or eliminated to help them progress in the general school curriculum. Alternative instruction for suspended students will be of sufficient duration to allow a student to cover all class material, take all tests and exams, keep up with other students, and progress to the next level.

All suspended students have the right to alternative instruction beginning 24 hours after the suspension or expulsion. The dates and times of alternative instruction are listed on the student's suspension letter. All students will receive a minimum of two hours per day of alternative instruction.

For a student who has been expelled, alternative instruction will be provided in the same manner as a suspended student until the student enrolls in another school or until the end of the school year, whichever occurs first.

Instruction will take place at a public contracted facility. One or more of the following persons will provide instruction: teacher, teacher aide, or a tutor hired for this purpose. Please note that whoever administers this instruction will meet all state law certification requirements.

Gang-Related Activity

A "gang" is defined as any group of two or more individuals whose purposes may include the commission of illegal acts. For purposes of this policy, a "gang" is a prohibited fraternity, or society as defined by the Texas Education Code, Section 37.121. Red Brick Academy prohibits the existence of gangs and gang activity. Students are prohibited from gang involvement or gang activities while at school, at any school facility, at any school-sponsored activity, or on a school bus. Gang activities and gang involvement are described as:

- Wearing, possessing, using, distributing, displaying, or selling any clothing, jewelry, emblems, badges, symbols, signs, graffiti/tagging, display of identified gang colors, or other affiliation in any gang.
- Committing any act or omission, or using any speech, either verbal or nonverbal
- (tagging, gestures, handshakes, etc.), showing membership or affiliation in a gang.
- Using any speech or committing any act or omission in furtherance of the interest of any gang or gang activity, including but not limited to:
 - Soliciting others for membership in any gangs.
 - Requesting any person to pay for protection or otherwise intimidating or threatening any person.
 - o Inciting other students to act with physical violence upon any other person.
 - Engaging in concert with others in intimidating, fighting, assaulting, or threatening to assault others.
 - o Committing any other illegal act or other violation of school district policies.
- Gang Law Violations: A person commits a Class C misdemeanor if the person:
 - o is a member of, pledges to become a member of, joins, or solicits another person to join or pledge to become a member of a public school fraternity, sorority, secret society, or gang; or
 - o is not enrolled in a public school and solicits or coerces another person to attend a meeting of a public school fraternity, sorority, secret society, or

gang or a meeting at which membership in one of those groups is encouraged.

• Students who violate this policy related to gang activity will be subject to disciplinary action that may include suspension or expulsion

Hazing

Red Brick Academy prohibits all forms of hazing. Texas Education Code §37.151 defines "hazing" as any intentional, knowing, or reckless act, occurring on or off campus, by one person alone or acting with others, directed against a student for the purpose of pledging, being initiated into, affiliating with, holding office in, or maintaining membership in an organization if the act:

- is any type of physical brutality, such as whipping, beating, striking, branding, electronic shocking, placing of a harmful substance on the body, or similar activity;
- any type of physical activity, such as sleep deprivation, exposure to the elements,
- confinement in a small space, calisthenics, or other activity that subjects the student to an unreasonable risk of harm or that adversely affects the mental or physical health or safety of the student;
- involves consumption of a food, liquid, alcoholic beverage, liquor, drug, or other substance that subjects the student to an unreasonable risk of harm or that adversely affects the mental or physical health or safety of the student;
- is any activity that induces, causes, or requires the student to perform a duty or task that involves a violation of the Texas Penal Code; or
- involves coercing, as defined by Section 1.07 of the Texas Penal Code, the student to consume a drug or alcoholic beverage or liquor in an amount that would lead a reasonable person to believe that the student is intoxicated, as defined by Section 49.01 of the Texas Penal Code.
- Any student engaging in hazing will be disciplined in accordance with the Discipline Policy. A person commits a criminal offense if the person:
- engages in hazing; solicits, encourages, directs, aids, or attempts to aid another in engaging in hazing;
- recklessly permits hazing to occur; or
- has firsthand knowledge of the planning of a specific hazing incident involving a student in an educational institution, or has firsthand knowledge that a specific hazing incident has occurred, and knowingly fails to report that knowledge in writing to the Assistant Principal or other appropriate official of the institution.

Discipline for students with disabilities.

All disciplinary actions regarding students with disabilities (504 or special education under the IDEA) shall be conducted in accordance with applicable federal and state laws.

Attachment 9: Evidence of Community Support

To date, we have engaged with engaged with community partners such as the 100 Black Men of Houston¹ who could provide mentoring for our male students and Cherish our Children² to work with our students who have incarcerated parents. We also plan to build relationships with partners who can facilitate sessions during our staff mental health trainings and family workshops (e.g. English language acquisition and literacy classes). Additionally, Houston has over 40 colleges and universities. We plan to partner with them to support with our staff recruitment efforts and college visits for students and families.

BYLAWS OF RED BRICK ACADEMY, INC.

WHEREAS, the initial Board of Directors of Red Brick Academy, Inc. (the "Corporation") caused to be filed with the Texas Secretary of State a Certificate of Formation for the organization of the Corporation NOW, THEREFORE:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the Corporation, that these Bylaws will govern its affairs in pursuit of its declared purposes.

PREAMBLE CORPORATE PURPOSE, OBJECTIVES AND DEDICATION OF ASSETS

The Corporation shall enrich, strengthen, enhance, and support the advancement of education and school choice in Texas by engaging in fundraising as it deems appropriate in furtherance of the purposes as provided in the Certificate of Formation. The Corporation shall also seek to own and operate an Open-Enrollment Charter School (the "School") as provided under the Texas Education Code for the benefit of students in Texas, providing educational opportunities, programs and such other functions as it deems appropriate in furtherance of the purposes as provided in the Certificate of Formation. This Corporation is formed for charitable purposes, and it will be nonprofit and nonpartisan. No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation will consist of the publication or dissemination of materials or statements with the purpose of attempting to influence legislation, and the Corporation will not participate or intervene in any political campaign on behalf of or in opposition to any candidate of public office. The Corporation will not engage in any activities or exercise any powers that are not in furtherance of the charitable purposes described in the Certificate of Formation.

The properties and assets of the Corporation are irrevocably dedicated to charitable and educational purposes. No part of the net earnings, properties or assets of this corporation, on dissolution or otherwise shall inure to the benefit of any private person, or any director or officer of this Corporation. On liquidation or dissolution, all properties, assets and obligations will be distributed or paid over to an organization dedicated to charitable and educational purposes that is tax-exempt pursuant to Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c 3 as amended or as otherwise required by state and federal law.

The Corporation, in all its activities and programs, shall not discriminate on the basis of sex, national origin, ethnicity, religion, disability or any other prohibited manner.

ARTICLE ONE NAME, OFFICE AND SEAL

1.01 NAME: The name of the Corporation is "Red Brick Academy, Inc."

1.02 OFFICE: The principal office of the Corporation will be located at 5702 Arabelle Lake Str., Houston, Texas 77007.

1.03 SEAL: The corporate seal of the Corporation, if any, will be inscribed with the Corporation name and year and place of its incorporation.

ARTICLE TWO MEETINGS & RECORDS

- 2.01 <u>Regular Meetings</u>, <u>Frequency and Place</u>. Regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held on at least a quarterly basis at such places and at such times as the Board may determine.
- 2.02 <u>Annual Meeting</u>. The Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors shall be held on the occasion of its First 1st) Quarterly meeting each and every fiscal year, or as otherwise determined by the Board.
- 2.03 <u>Special Meetings</u>. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called by the Chairman, Secretary, or by any one or more Board members with the consent of the Chairman or Secretary, which consent will not be unreasonably withheld, for any purpose not otherwise proscribed by law, grant or loan condition, or the Certificate of Formation, to transact any business described in the call for the special meetings.

MEETINGS RELATING TO CHARTER SCHOOLS

- 2.04 <u>Charter School Meetings</u>. When conducting business relating in any way to the operations or affairs of any of the Corporation's open-enrollment charter schools, meetings of the Board or any Board Committee shall be conducted in accordance with provisions of the Texas Education Code and Chapter 551 of the Texas Government Code, and the Board of Directors shall be subject to the requirements of the Texas Open Meetings Act, including the following provisions: At no time shall a quorum of the full Board meet to deliberate any issue or business of the Corporation without posting notice of a meeting as set forth below. Directors shall normally attend all meetings in person but may attend by alternate means only if circumstances warrant and expressly in accordance with the Texas Open Meetings Act.
- a <u>Closed Meetings</u>: The Board may meet in a meeting closed to the public to deliberate on those matters specified in the Texas Open Meetings Act as proper for closed meetings, including but not limited to consultation with attorney, real estate, prospective gifts or donations, personnel matters, security personnel or devices, discipline of a student and complaints against an employee unless the student or employee respectively requests an open meeting.

- (b) <u>Emergency Meetings</u>: In the event of an emergency as defined in the Texas Open Meetings Act, a meeting may be conducted by telephone conference call. If a meeting involves telephonic participation, the telephonic participation must be by conference call in which all persons participating can be heard by all other participants and the public.
- c <u>Video Conferencing</u>: Meetings may also be conducted by videoconference call if the presiding officer is present at one location open to the public and he notice of the meeting states the intent to have the presiding officer present. Audio and video must be simultaneously available to the public and the meeting shall be audio recorded. Each participant shall be clearly visible and audible to other participants and to members of the public in attendance. The meeting must meet all other prerequisites and requirements of the Texas Open Meetings Act.
- 2.05 <u>Notice for Charter School Meetings</u>. When conducting business related to the operations or affairs of the Corporation's open-enrollment charter schools, the following shall apply: Notice of all meetings of the Board of Directors, except as otherwise provided by state law, regulation, will be delivered by mail postmarked, electronic facsimile or e-mail transmission to each Director at least 72 hours before the time of the meeting.
- a <u>Posting of Notice</u>: In addition, notice to the public of any meeting shall be posted at the administrative offices of the Corporation in a location convenient to the public at least 72 hours before the time of such meeting.
- b) <u>Emergency Notice</u>: Emergency meetings as allowed under the Texas Open Meetings Act may be posted up to one hour before such meeting. At such an emergency meeting, the Board may only address the matter requiring the emergency action. The notice must identify the nature of the emergency and the urgent public necessity requiring emergency action.
- c <u>Internet Posting</u>: Notice and the agenda of all meetings of the Board of Directors shall also be posted on the Corporation's Internet website for the charter schools, if any, concurrently with the notice posted at the administrative offices, or as otherwise required and authorized by the Texas Open Meetings Act.
- d) <u>Closed Meetings</u>: The agenda shall clearly state whether the Board intends to convene in a closed meeting and shall identify separately each matter to be deliberated by the Board in the closed meeting and whether the Board may take action on any such matter upon returning to the open meeting. The Secretary shall note the times in the open meeting that the Board convenes to and adjourns from the closed meeting.
- 2.06 <u>Charter School Meeting Order of Business</u>. When conducting business related to the operations or affairs of the Corporation's open-enrollment charter schools, the following shall apply: At regular meetings of the Board, the order of business shall be established in an Agenda approved by the Chairman and as presented in the notice of the meetings. However, the Chairman may modify the order of business. The agenda shall identify all matters to be presented to and considered by the Board. Matters not disclosed in the agenda and meeting notice available to the public shall not be deliberated or be considered by the Board, except as permitted by the Texas Open Meetings Act.

CORPORATE BOARD MEETINGS NOT RELATING TO CHARTER SCHOOLS

2.07 <u>Non-Charter Meetings</u>. When conducting any other Corporate business not related, in any way, to the operations or affairs of the Corporation's open-enrollment charter schools, Board meetings shall be conducted in accordance with provisions of Chapter 22 of the Texas Business Organizations Code, the Certificate of Formation and these bylaws. The Secretary shall cause to be mailed at least forty-eight hours in advance or sent by electronic means at least twenty-four 24) hours in advance to every director at his/her address email address) of record with the Corporation, a notice stating the time and place of every meeting. Notice of such meetings shall state the reasons that such meeting has been called and the business to be transacted at such meeting.

2.08 Board Action By Written Consent. When conducting any Corporate business not related, in any way, to the operations or affairs of the Corporation's open-enrollment charter schools the Board may take any action required or permitted to be taken at a meeting of the Board of Directors or committee of the Corporation, without an actual meeting if a consent, in writing, setting forth the action to be taken, is signed by a majority of directors or committee members entitled to vote (written consent subject to all requirements of applicable law. The written consent for any such action by the Board or committee must state the date of each Director's or committee member's signature and memorialize the action to be taken. The written consent of each of the Directors or committee members must be delivered to the Corporation no later than the tenth 10 th day after the earliest date of consent and must be delivered to the Chairman or Secretary of the Board. Delivery must be by hand delivery or by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested. Where required by law, including fundamental transactions as applicable, such action shall be by unanimous written consent.

MEETINGS & RECORDS GENERALLY

2.09 Corporate Records. The Corporation will maintain at its principal office all financial books and records of account, all minutes of the Board meetings and committee meetings, the list of Directors, and copies of all other material Corporate records, books, documents and contracts as required by Texas law. All such records will be made available for inspection at any reasonable time during usual business hours for any lawful purpose to any officer, Director, or person authorized by law or the Board to inspect such records, and the Corporation's records will also be available to the extent required by the Texas Public Information Act where applicable for public inspection and copying as promptly as possible as required by such act. Upon leaving office, each Director, officer or agent of the Corporation will turn over to the Chairman in good order any Corporation monies, books, records, minutes, lists, documents, contracts or other property of the Corporation in his or her custody or control.

2.10 <u>Quorum</u>. The presence of a majority of the members shall constitute a quorum and shall be necessary to conduct the business of the Corporation except as otherwise provided in Article 2.14 herein. Any Board vacancies shall not be counted in determining a majority called for by these Bylaws.

- 2.11 Order of Business. Board meetings shall generally proceed with the following order of business:
 - Roll Call and Establishment of a Quorum
 - Public Comments
 - Reading and Approval of Minutes of Preceding Meeting(s)
 - Reports of Committees
 - Reports of Officers
 - Old and Unfinished Business
 - New Business
 - Adjournments

The Board of Directors may, by majority vote, adopt a different agenda order.

- 2.12 <u>Record of Board Action</u>. All motions and resolutions of the Board will be written or recorded in the minutes of the Board and certified copies will be placed in a journal of proceedings of the Board. Such records shall be maintained in accordance with state law and Article 2.09 herein.
- 2.13 <u>Voting</u>. All matters at any meeting of the Board of Directors or any of its designated committees, except as otherwise provided in these Bylaws, the Certificate of Formation, or as permitted by law, will be decided by a vote of a majority of the Directors present at or lawfully participating in the meeting as permitted by the Texas Open Meetings Act. If a quorum of the Board is present or lawfully participating in the meeting, the affirmative vote of a majority of the Board of Directors will be the act of the body corporate, unless the vote of a greater number is required by statute, regulation, the Certificate of Formation, or these Bylaws. Any Director may request a roll call vote on any motion or resolution. Directors may not vote by proxy or secret ballot.
- 2.14 <u>Fundamental Actions</u>. In accordance with Section 22.164 of the Texas Business Organization Code, the following actions of the Board of Directors are fundamental actions that shall require the affirmative vote of the majority of directors then serving on the Board:
- a Amendment of a certificate of formation [or articles of incorporation];
- b) Voluntary winding up under Chapter 11;
- c A revocation of a voluntary decision to wind up under Chapter 11;
- d) A cancellation of an event requiring winding up under Chapter 11;
- e A reinstatement under Section 11.202;
- f) A distribution plan under Section 22.305;
- g) A plan of merger under Subchapter F;
- h) A sale of all or substantially all of the assets of the Corporation;
- i A plan of conversion under Subchapter F; or
- i A plan of exchange under Subchapter F
- 2.15 <u>Compensation</u>. Except as provided in this section, no Director will receive directly or indirectly any salary, compensation or gift from the Corporation, except as authorized by state law. The Directors of the Corporation will serve as such without salary. No Director will be entitled to any dividend or any part of the income or principal of the Corporation, or to share in the

distribution of the assets upon dissolution of the Corporation. The Board of Directors may authorize the payment by the Corporation of the reasonable, documented and allowable expenses incurred by a Director in performance of his or her duties in accordance with state and federal law.

2.16 <u>Parliamentary Procedure</u>. For all matters of parliamentary procedures, the Board and any Committees established by the Board, shall be guided by *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised*, 11th ed. (Cambridge, Mass.: Perseus Publishing, 2011).

ARTICLE THREE DIRECTORS

- 3.01 MANAGEMENT: The activities, affairs, property and powers of the Corporation will be managed, directed, controlled or exercised by and vested in the Board of Directors.
- 3.02 NUMBER AND QUALIFICATIONS: The Board of Directors will consist of no fewer than three (3) persons.
- 3.03 REMOVAL: Any Director who fails to attend three (3 consecutive meetings may be asked to resign from office by resolution of the Board of Directors. The Secretary will notify Directors when they have missed three 3) regular consecutive meetings. Absences may be formally excused by vote of the Board. The Secretary will certify a Director's excessive absence to the Chairman. Any Director may also be removed with or without cause upon a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of all the remaining directors for removal. However, the Chairman of the Board may only be removed upon a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of all the remaining directors for good cause.
- 3.04 TERM: The Directors shall serve for three-year terms, which may be renewed indefinitely by each respective Director, subject to Articles 3.03 and 3.06 herein. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the three founding directors will draw lots to determine which of the three directors will serve an initial five-year term, four-year term, and three-year term.
- 3.05 VACANCY: The Board of Directors will vote to appoint Directors to fill vacancies. Each Director appointed or designated to fill a vacancy on the Board of Directors will hold office for the remainder of the term of the Board of Directors. A vacancy occurring on any committee may be filled by the Board of Directors for the remainder of the term of the position.

 3.06 RESIGNATION: Any director or officer may resign from the Corporation by delivering a written letter of resignation to the Chairman of the Board.
- 3.07 COMPENSATION: Except as provided in this section, no Director will receive directly or indirectly any salary, compensation or gift from the Corporation, except as authorized by state law. The Directors of the Corporation will serve as such without salary. No Director will be entitled to any dividend or any part of the income or principal of the Corporation or to share in the distribution of the assets upon dissolution of the Corporation. The Board of Directors may authorize the payment by the Corporation of the reasonable, documented and allowable expenses incurred by a Director in performance of his or her duties in accordance with state and federal law.

3.08 CONFLICT OF INTEREST AND INTERESTED DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS: The Board shall adopt and periodically review) an Ethics and Conflicts of Interest Policy satisfying the requirements of federal and state law governing conflicts of interest and interested transactions among charter school and charter holder board members and officers, as described in Texas Education Code chapter 12 and 19 T.A.C. §§ 100.1131, 100.1132, 100.1133, 100.1134, and as required by Local Government Code chapter 171 and 176 and Government Code chapter 573.

3.09 POWERS: All corporate powers, except, such as are otherwise provided for in these Bylaws, the contract for charter and in the laws of the State of Texas, are hereby vested in and shall be exercised by the Board of Directors. Without limiting the Board's authority, the following powers and duties must generally be exercised by the Board, acting as a body corporate in meetings posted in compliance with Texas Government Code, Chapter 551:

- a Final authority to hear or decide employee grievances, citizen complaints, or parental concerns;
- b) Final authority to adopt or amend the budget of the charter holder or the charter school;
- c Final authority to authorize the expenditure or obligation of state funds or the use of public property;
- d) Final authority to direct the disposition or safekeeping of public records;
- e Final authority to adopt policies governing charter school operations;
- f) Final authority to approve audit reports; and
- g) Initial or final authority to select, employ, direct, evaluate, renew, nonrenew, terminate, or set compensation for the Chief Executive Officer.

ARTICLE FOUR OFFICERS

4.01 OFFICERS: The officers of the Corporation will consist of the Chairman of the Board, a Vice-Chairman of the Board, and a Secretary/Treasurer and any other officers that the Board may establish and designate by resolution adopted by a majority of vote of the whole Board.

4.02 ELECTION: The officers of the Corporation will be elected each year by the Board of Directors at its annual meeting.

4.03 CHAIRMAN: The Chairman of the Board will preside at all meetings of the Board of Directors. The Chairman will have other powers and duties not inconsistent with these Bylaws as may be assigned by the Board. The Vice-Chairman will have the powers and duties of the Chairman in his absence.

4.04 SECRETARY: A Secretary will act under the direction of the Chairman and in his absence, have the duties and powers of the Chairman. A Secretary will have other duties and powers as the Chairman of the Board of Directors may assign. The Secretary will have the general powers and duties usually vested in such office of a Corporation, including keeping all records, documents and the corporate seal at the principal office of the Corporation; affixing the corporate seal to any instrument requiring it and to attest the same by his or her signature when authorized by the Board of Directors or after the instrument has been signed by the Chairman, Vice-Chairman or

other authorized officer or agent; keeping the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Directors, the Executive and other committees of the Board of Directors, the Executive and other committees of the Corporation to recorded in one or more books provided for that purpose, with the time and place, how they were called or authorized, the notice given, the names of those present, and the proceedings therein; and issuing proper notices in accordance with these Bylaws. The Secretary will have such other powers and duties not inconsistent with these Bylaws as may be assigned by the Board of Directors or the Chairman.

4.05 TREASURER: The Treasurer will be responsible for all funds and securities of the Corporation and will have the general powers and duties usually vested in such office of a Corporation, including receiving and documenting all monies due and payable to the Corporation; depositing all monies received in the name of the Corporation in a depository designed by the Board, disbursing monies of the Corporation under the direction or orders of the Board; entering regularly in the books kept by the Treasurer a complete and accurate account of all monies received and disbursed by the Corporation; rendering a statement of the financial accounts of the Corporation to the Board as requested; exhibiting the books of the financial accounts of the Corporation to the Board as requested; exhibiting the books of account in his custody to any Director upon request; and submitting a full financial report to the Board of Directors at the annual meetings. The Treasurer will have such other powers and duties not inconsistent with the Bylaws as may be assigned by the Board of Directors or the Chairman.

4.07 OTHER OFFICERS: The Board of Directors may create by resolution other offices as it deems necessary to serve the Corporation, who need not be directors, to serve as officers or agents of the Corporation.

ARTICLE FIVE COMMITTEES

5.01 COMMITTEES: Designated committees may be established by the Chairman of the Board or the Board to perform the duties and functions assigned in furtherance of Board objectives. Any committee may include one or more Directors from the Board. The Chairman of the Board or its designee will appoint the members, officers, or others to committee positions. The rules of procedure of any committee may be set by the Board. Any committee may be abolished, or any committee member removed for any reason and at any time by the Board of Directors.

5.02 NOTICE: Any committee meeting at which a quorum of the Board of Directors attends, or at which a deliberation as defined by the Open Meetings Act takes place, shall give written notice of the meeting and shall keep and deliver a copy of minutes of its proceedings to the Secretary of the Board, in accordance with the Texas Open Meetings Act. Committees that are advisory only without delegated authority or power may not fall under the Open Meetings Act. If, however, a committee has delegated authority or it has power to make final decisions, to adopt rules regarding school business, or if the Board of Directors usually approves its recommendations in full, then it must meet in accordance with the Open Meetings Act.

ARTICLE SIX DEPOSITS, CHECKS, LOANS AND CONTRACTS

6.01 DEPOSITORIES: All funds of the Corporation not otherwise employed will be deposited in banks or other depositories designated by the Board of Directors and in accordance with state law.

- 6.02 TRANSACTIONS: All checks, drafts, endorsements, notes and evidences of indebtedness of the Corporation will be signed by such officers or agents and all endorsements for deposits to the credit of the Corporation will be made as authorized by the Board of Directors.
- 6.03 LOAN OR GRANT AUTHORITY: No loans or advances will be contracted on behalf of the Corporation, and no note or other evidence of indebtedness will be issued in its name, except as authorized by the Board.

ARTICLE SEVEN CONTRACTS WITH DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS

7.01 INSIDER DEALING: Subject to any law, regulation, or contractual agreement of the Texas Business Organizations Code, no Director, officer or committee member will be interested directly or indirectly in any contract or program involving Corporation assets, relating to the operation conducted by it or in any contract for furnishing services or supplies to it, unless a the contract is authorized by a majority of Directors present at a meeting in which there is a quorum and vote without the interested Director's presence, (b) the facts and nature of the Director's interest is fully disclosed to the whole Board of Directors before the meeting in which the contract will be considered and (c) the Corporation could not have obtained a more advantageous arrangement with reasonable effort under the circumstances. Furthermore, in accordance with Texas law and commissioner rule, a transaction with a current or former board member or officer of the charter school, who served within 5 years of the transaction, may require an independent appraisal, audit and prior notice to the TEA for TEA's review and approval prior to entering into such transaction.

7.02 INSIDER LOANS: No loans or grants will be made by the Corporation to its Directors, officers or committee members during their term of office. The Directors who vote for or assent to, and any officer who participates in, the making of a loan to a Director or officer will jointly and severally be liable to the Corporation for the amount of the loan until it is repaid.

ARTICLE EIGHT INDEMNIFICATION OF DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS

- 8.01 LIABILITY: A Director or committee member will not be required to furnish any bond or surety for his services as a Director or committee member and will not be liable for the act or omission of any other Director.
- 8.02 INDEMNIFICATION: Any person made or threatened to be made a party to any action in court or other proceeding because he is or was a Director or committee member will be indemnified by the Corporation against any and all liability and the reasonable expenses, including attorney's fees, incurred in connection with the defense or settlement of the action, except where it is adjudged that the Director or committee member is liable for gross negligence, bad faith

or willful misconduct in performing his duties. The right of indemnification will not exclude any other right of the Director or committee member. INDEMNIFICATION UNDER THIS SECTION IS SUBJECT TO ANY AND ALL PROHIBITIONS, RESTRICTIONS AND LIMITATIONS IMPOSED BY LAW.

8.03 INSURANCE: The Board of Directors will have the power to purchase and maintain at the Corporation's expense insurance on behalf of the Corporation, the Board of Directors, and others.

ARTICLE NINE AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS

9.01 AMENDMENT: Except as otherwise provided in the Certificate of Formation, and subject to the power of the Board to amend or repeal these Bylaws, these Bylaws may be altered, amended or repealed and new Bylaws may be adopted by a majority vote, provided that written notice setting forth in detail the proposed Bylaws revisions with explanations for the change is given at least three days previously. In the case of an emergency, which must be explained in the notice, two hours notice of a proposed amendment may be given to all Directors, and the Bylaws may be amended upon the unanimous vote of all Directors.

ARTICLE TEN MISCELLANOUS

10.01 FISCAL YEAR. The fiscal year of the Corporation will begin on July 1 of each year and will end on June 30 of the next year.

10.02 ANNUAL REPORT: The Treasurer shall obtain and will provide to the Board no later than 90 days after the close of the fiscal year a report containing the following information in appropriate detail.

- a The assets and liabilities of the Corporation as of the end of the fiscal year.
- b) The principal changes in assets and liabilities during the fiscal year;
- c The revenues and receipts, both restricted and unrestricted to particular purposes, for the fiscal year.
- d) The expenses or disbursements, for both general and restricted purposes, during the fiscal year;
- e The substantial activities and projects begun, in progress, and completed during the Fiscal year.
- (f) Such other information as may be requested by the Board.

The report will be accompanied by a report of an independent accountant, or in lieu of such report, the certificate of an authorized officer of the Corporation that such statements were prepared without audit from the books and records of the Corporation.

10.03 FEDERAL TAX FILING: The officers of the Corporation will be responsible for ensuring timely annual filing of IRS Form 990 within the timeframes of IRS rules.

10.04 CONSTRUCTION: Whenever the context requires, the masculine will include the feminine and neuter, and the singular will include the plural, and vice versa. If any portion of these Bylaws is declared invalid or inoperative, then so far as is reasonable the remainder of these Bylaws will be considered valid and operative and effect will be given to the intent manifested by the portion held invalid or inoperative.

10.05 STATUTORY AND OTHER AUTHORITY: These Bylaws are subject to and governed by any applicable federal or state laws and regulations, including pertinent local ordinances and the Certificate of Formation.

RED BRICK ACADEMY, INC. CONFLICT OF INTEREST POLICY

Article I

Purpose

The purpose of the conflict of interest policy is to protect Red Brick Academy, Inc.'s (the "Organization") interest when it is contemplating entering into a transaction or arrangement that might benefit the private interest of an officer or director of the Organization or might result in a possible excess benefit transaction. This policy is intended to supplement but not replace any applicable state and federal laws governing conflict of interest applicable to nonprofit and charitable organizations.

Article II

Definitions

Interested Person

Any director, principal officer, or member of a committee with governing board delegated powers, who has a direct or indirect financial interest, as defined below, is an interested person.

Financial Interest

A person has a financial interest if the person has, directly or indirectly, through business, investment, or family:

- **a.** An ownership or investment interest in any entity with which the Organization has a transaction or arrangement,
- **b.** A compensation arrangement with the Organization or with any entity or individual with which the Organization has a transaction or arrangement, or

- **c.** A potential ownership or investment interest in, or compensation arrangement with, any entity or individual with which the Organization is negotiating a transaction or arrangement.
- **d.** Compensation includes direct and indirect remuneration as well as gifts or favors that are not insubstantial. A financial interest is not necessarily a conflict of interest. Under Article III, Section 2, a person who has a financial interest may have a conflict of interest only if the appropriate governing board or committee decides that a conflict of interest exists.

Article III

Procedures

1. Duty to Disclose

In connection with any actual or possible conflict of interest, an interested person must disclose the existence of the financial interest and be given the opportunity to disclose all material facts to the directors and members of committees with governing board delegated powers considering the proposed transaction or arrangement.

2. Determining Whether a Conflict of Interest Exists

After disclosure of the financial interest and all material facts, and after any discussion with the interested person, he/she shall leave the governing board or committee meeting while the determination of a conflict of interest is discussed and voted upon. The remaining board or committee members shall decide if a conflict of interest exists.

3. Procedures for Addressing the Conflict of Interest

- **a.** An interested person may make a presentation at the governing board or committee meeting, but after the presentation, he/she shall leave the meeting during the discussion of, and the vote on, the transaction or arrangement involving the possible conflict of interest.
- **b.** The chairperson of the governing board or committee shall, if appropriate, appoint a disinterested person or committee to investigate alternatives to the proposed transaction or arrangement.
- **c.** After exercising due diligence, the governing board or committee shall determine whether the Organization can obtain with reasonable efforts a more advantageous transaction or arrangement from a person or entity that would not give rise to a conflict of interest.
- **d.** If a more advantageous transaction or arrangement is not reasonably possible under circumstances not producing a conflict of interest, the governing board or committee shall determine by a majority vote of the disinterested directors whether the transaction or arrangement is in the Organization's best interest, for its own benefit, and whether it is fair and reasonable. In conformity with the above determination it shall make its decision as to whether to enter into the transaction or arrangement.

4. Violations of the Conflicts of Interest Policy

- **a.** If the governing board or committee has reasonable cause to believe a member has failed to disclose actual or possible conflicts of interest, it shall inform the member of the basis for such belief and afford the member an opportunity to explain the alleged failure to disclose.
- **b.** If, after hearing the member's response and after making further investigation as warranted by the circumstances, the governing board or committee determines the member has failed to disclose an actual or possible conflict of interest, it shall take appropriate disciplinary and corrective action.

Article IV

Records of Proceedings

The minutes of the governing board and all committees with board delegated powers shall contain:

- **a.** The names of the persons who disclosed or otherwise were found to have a financial interest in connection with an actual or possible conflict of interest, the nature of the financial interest, any action taken to determine whether a conflict of interest was present, and the governing board's or committee's decision as to whether a conflict of interest in fact existed.
- **b.** The names of the persons who were present for discussions and votes relating to the transaction or arrangement, the content of the discussion, including any alternatives to the proposed transaction or arrangement, and a record of any votes taken in connection with the proceedings.

Article V

Compensation

- **a.** A voting member of the governing board who receives compensation, directly or indirectly, from the Organization for services is precluded from voting on matters pertaining to that member's compensation.
- **b.** A voting member of any committee whose jurisdiction includes compensation matters and who receives compensation, directly or indirectly, from the Organization for services is precluded from voting on matters pertaining to that member's compensation.
- **c.** No voting member of the governing board or any committee whose jurisdiction includes compensation matters and who receives compensation, directly or indirectly, from the Organization, either individually or collectively, is prohibited from providing information to any committee regarding compensation.

Article VI

Annual Statements

Each director, principal officer and member of a committee with governing board delegated powers shall annually sign a statement which affirms such person:

a. Has received a copy of the conflicts of interest policy,

- **b.** Has read and understands the policy,
- c. Has agreed to comply with the policy, and
- **d.** Understands the Organization is charitable and in order to maintain its federal tax exemption it must engage primarily in activities which accomplish one or more of its tax-exempt purposes.

Article VII

Periodic Reviews

To ensure the Organization operates in a manner consistent with charitable purposes and does not engage in activities that could jeopardize its tax-exempt status, periodic reviews shall be conducted. The periodic reviews shall, at a minimum, include the following subjects:

- **a.** Whether compensation arrangements and benefits are reasonable, based on competent survey information, and the result of arm's length bargaining.
- **b.** Whether partnerships, joint ventures, and arrangements with management organizations conform to the Organization's written policies, are properly recorded, reflect reasonable investment or payments for goods and services, further charitable purposes and do not result in inurement, impermissible private benefit or in an excess benefit transaction.

Article VIII

Use of Outside Experts

When conducting the periodic reviews as provided for in Article VII, the Organization may, but need not, use outside advisors. If outside experts are used, their use shall not relieve the governing board of its responsibility for ensuring periodic reviews are conducted.

CODE OF ETHICS

Red Brick Academy

The Red Brick Academy Governing Board (the board) desires to operate in the most ethical and conscientious manner possible and to that end the board adopts this Code of Ethics and each member of the board agrees that he or she will:

Domain I: Governance Structure

- 1. Recognize that the authority of the board rests only with the board as a whole and not with individual members and act accordingly.
- 2. Support the delegation of authority for the day-to-day administration of the charter school to the school leader and act accordingly.
- 3. Honor the chain of command and refer problems or complaints consistent with the chain of command.
- 4. Recognize that the school leader should be present at all meetings of the board except when his or her contract, salary or performance is under consideration.
- 5. Not undermine the authority of the school leader or school administration.
- 6. Use reasonable efforts to keep the school leader informed of concerns or specific recommendations that any member of the board may bring to the board.

Domain II: Strategic Planning

- 1. Reflect through actions that his or her first and foremost concern is for educational welfare of children attending the charter school.
- 2. Participate in all planning activities to develop the vision and goals of the board.
- 3. Work with the board and the school leader to ensure prudent and accountable uses of the resources of Red Brick Academy.
- 4. Render all decisions based on available facts and his or her independent judgment and refuse to surrender his or her judgment to individuals or special interest groups.
- 5. Uphold and enforce all applicable laws, all rules and guidelines of the Texas Board of Education and the board.

Domain III: Board and Community Relations

- 1. Seek regular and systemic communications among the board and students, staff, and the community.
- 2. Communicate to the board and the school leader expressions of public reaction to board policies and charter school programs.

Domain IV: Policy Development

- 1. Work with other board members to establish effective policies for Red Brick Academy
- 2. Make decisions on policy matters only after full discussion at publicly held board meetings.
- 3. Periodically review and evaluate the effectiveness of policies on charter school programs and performance.

Domain V: Board Meetings

- 1. Attend and participate in regularly scheduled and called board meetings.
- 2. Be informed and prepared to discuss issues to be considered on the board agenda.
- 3. Work with other board members in a spirit of harmony and cooperation in spite of differences of opinion that may arise during the discussion and resolution of issues at board meetings.
- 4. Vote for a closed executive session of the board only when applicable law or board policy requires consideration of a matter in executive session.
- 5. Maintain the confidentiality of all discussions and other matters pertaining to the board and the charter school, during executive session of the board.
- 6. Make decisions in accordance with the interests of Red Brick Academy as a whole and not any particular agreement thereof.
- 7. Express opinions before votes are cast, but after the board vote, abide by and support all majority decisions of the board.

Domain VI: Personnel

- 1. Consider the employment of personnel only after receiving and considering the recommendation of the school leader.
- 2. Support the employment of persons best qualified to serve as employees of Red Brick Academy and insist on regular and impartial evaluations of charter school staff.
- 3. Comply with all applicable laws, rules, regulation, and all board policies regarding employment of family members.

Domain VII: Financial Governance

1. Refrain from using the position of board member for personal or partisan gain or to benefit any person or entity over the interest of Red Brick Academy

Conduct as a Board Member

- 1. Devote sufficient time, thought and study to the performance of the duties and responsibilities of a member of the board.
- 2. Become informed about current educational issues by individual study and through participation in programs providing needed education and training.
- 3. Communicate in a respectful professional manner with and about fellow board members.
- 4. Take no private action that will compromise the board or charter school administration.
- 5. Participate in all required training programs developed for board members by the board or the Texas Board of Education.
- 6. In the annual report, submitted to the Department, disclose the status of board member compliance with the Code of Ethics.

Conflicts of Interest

- 1. Announce potential conflicts of interest before board action is taken.
- 2. Comply with the conflicts of interest policy of the board, all applicable laws and Texas Board of Education Standard, rules and guidelines.

Upon a motion supported by a two-thirds (2/3) vote, the board may choose to conduct a hearing concerning a possible violation of this Code of Ethics by a member of the board. The board member

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accused of violating this Code of Ethics will have thirty (30) days' notice prior to a hearing on the matter. The accused board member may bring witnesses on his or her behalf to the hearing, and the board may elect to call witnesses to inquire into the matter. If found by a vote of two-thirds of all the members of the board that the accused board member has violated this Code of Ethics, the board shall determine an appropriate sanction. A board member subject to sanction may, within thirty (30) days of such sanction vote, appeal such decision to the Texas Board of Education in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Texas Board of Education. A record of the decision of the board to sanction a board member for a violation of this Code of Ethics shall be placed in the permanent minutes of the board.

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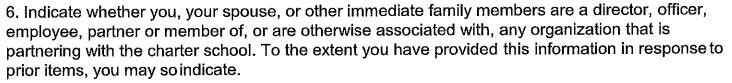

As a former special education teacher in the Rio Grande Valley and school administrator for Teach for America's Houston corps members, I was drawn to Red Brick Academy's commitment to preparing all students for college and beyond by providing an equitable education in an inclusive environment, and by partnering with families in order to enhance student success.

1. What was your motivation to serve on the board of the proposed charter school?

If Yes, state the name of the entity:

- My motivation to serve on the board of the proposed charter school has to do with the mission and pillars of Red Brick Academy (RBA). As a former low-income K-12 student knowing that RBA is committed to providing an equitable educational experience aligns with what I believe every student should be deserving of. Having majored in psychology in undergrad I strongly believe in the social and emotional skills development for students that will take precedence at RBA. Lastly, much of my career has been in supporting families and their children obtain educational goals. As such, having a pillar of and belief in strong family partnerships is a value that I believe is essential to a school's success.
- 2. What is your understanding of the appropriate role of a public charter school board member? Describe any previous experience you have that is relevant to serving on the charter school's board (e.g., other board service). If you have not had previous experience of this nature, explain why you have the capability to be an effective board member.
 - The role of a public charter school board member is to provide accountability in ensuring that
 the goals of the public charter school are set and met, ensuring that the public charter school
 is fiscally sound and in compliance of all laws as set fort by the TEA, and working with the

founding director to met the set goals. I have a moderate amount of experience with governance. In my previous role I would interact with and attend governance meetings for the Disaster Relief Fund that I was administering. I got to understand the differences between a board and a committee and got to see the internal workings of each while supporting the work of committee and board members in making the decisions they needed to keep the fund working to the original donors intent. In my current role – I support the work of our board and committee members by preparing information that will help them achieve their goals. I have sat in on approximately 10 types of meetings in the fall and will do the same with another 10 this spring – in all there are nearly 30 governance meetings and as staff our work is to support the operations, administration, and information gathering for the board to grant impactful gifts to organizations in the greater Houston area.

- 3. Describe the specific knowledge and experience that you would bring to the board.
 - In addition to the governance experience mentioned above I have operations, community engagement, and strategy/analytical experience that I would bring to the board of directors of Red Brick Academy. During my time at Families Empowered, a non-profit that had several partnerships with charter school districts. I was in the operations team - helping to ensure that our goals were being met and that staff had the tools that they needed to be successful. I ran a call center and was in charge of its operations including managing the \$75,000.00 annual budget, hiring of seasonal paid interns, and overseeing the call center software system. Prior to that I, worked with parents directly, both at Families Empowered and during my time in Head Start. I developed a knowledge of social services and organizations supporting families in a variety of ways. While working directly with families waned over the years professionally, my knowledge of community organizations increased exponentially working in philanthropy. This local knowledge and experience in community engagement will help Red Brick Academy connect with the community they find themselves in. In my past three professional experiences I have been the lead in managing, collecting, analyzing, and utilizing data in ways that support the goals and mission of the organization. I know that my understanding of how to use data to inform decision making will be very beneficial to the rest of the board as well as to the founding director and the school itself.

SCHOOL MISSION AND PROGRAM

- 1. What is your understanding of the school's mission and guiding beliefs?
 - Red Brick Academy believes that every child is deserving of the same educational expectations and should be prepared to attend a post-secondary institution regardless if they actually decide to pursue one in the long run.
- 2. What is your understanding of the school's proposed educational program?
 - Red Brick Academy believes that strong familial partnerships, a commitment to the students social and emotional growth, and a rigorous post-secondary preparation curriculum taught by stellar teachers will help the school achieve its mission.
- 3. What do you believe to be the characteristics of a successful school?
 - I believe that a successful school must have trust built with the families of students and the community. That is the foundation by which the school will be able to be sustainable. In addition to that I believe that the school must be able to clearly articulate their goals while monitoring their progress and adjusting their goals based on inputs of the data they are receiving. The creation and execution of goals has to come from strong leaders and professionals, both on the governance side as well as on the operations side. Red Brick Academy values strong family partnerships and high quality teachers so their beliefs are

consistent with my views on a successful school.

- 4. How will you know that the school is succeeding (or not) in its mission?
 - The school will have to demonstrate that their goals are being met through the data and inputs they are receiving. These data sets include but are not limited to student data by way of state assessments (STARR), teacher performance monitoring and evaluations, family input via surveys and forums, staff evaluations, and a system to monitor and see growth for the school's goals as a whole. The purpose of data is to inform decisions makers to perform their role to make decisions. Therefore, close monitoring of data and taking the appropriate interventions needed once the data shows that goals are not being met will help the school get to closer to succeeding on its mission.

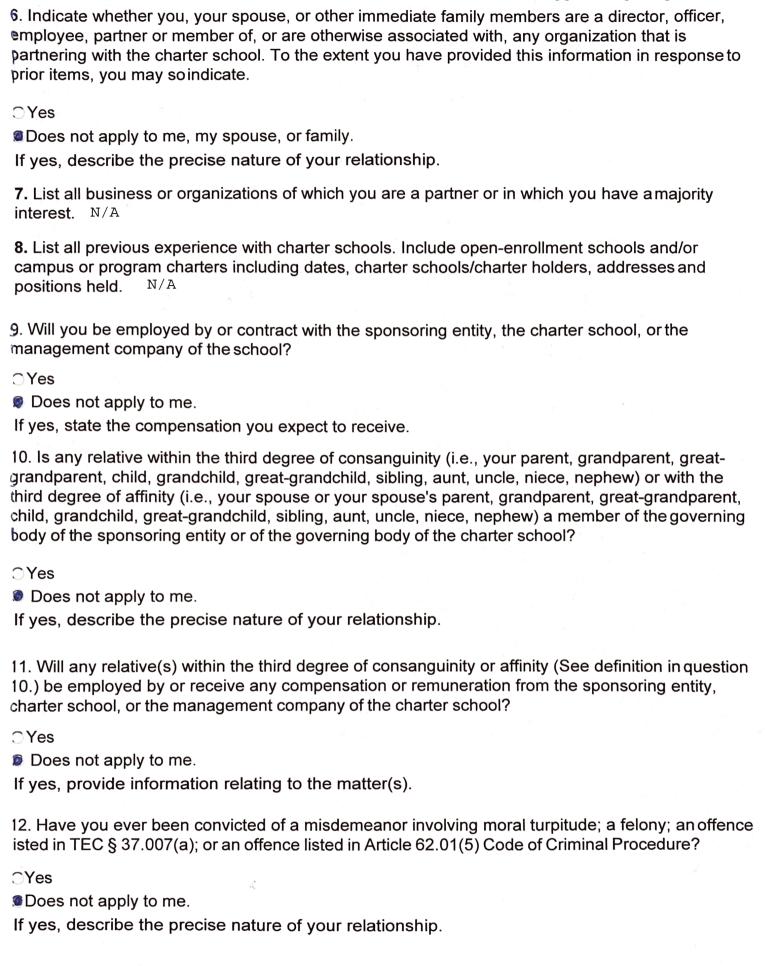
GOVERNANCE

- 1. Describe the role that the board will play in the school's operation.
 - The board plays a critical role: to ensure oversight of the school's goals. They honor the goals of the school and make decisions that will help the school be successful. They do this by holding the superintendent accountable though support and feedback, reviewing components of school operations (programs, community, finances, etc.) and by ensuring that the board is responsible for governance, not day to day operations.
- 2. How will you know if the school is successful at the end of the first year of operation?
 - I will know if a school is successful at the end of its first year of operations by comparing the
 outcomes with the initial goals set out for the first year. Right now that includes a student's
 performance in English, Math, Science, Social Studies, and Physical Education. In addition to
 that, staff performance metrics and evaluations will be considered as well as the external
 goals of the school that the board will be monitoring. Those include financial and operational
 goals as well as the evaluation of the school superintendent.
- 3. How will you know at the end of four years if the school is successful?
 - I will know if the school is successful after four years if the school has not only exceeded the
 original goals set out during its first year but has also exceeded them and is successfully
 working towards a new set of similarly ambitious goals. Ideally the school will be sustainable
 financially and would be in integrated component of the community, helping it to meet its
 enrollment goals and ensuring its longevity.
- **4.** What specific steps do you think the charter school board will need to take to ensure that the school is successful?
 - The board will need to understand what the goals are, meet regularly to discuss updates on progress and receive timely information to help inform their knowledge of the progress, utilize their specific skill set to ensure that the subgoals are being met and are being handled the best way that they can be, and they would need to have frequent communication with the superintendent in order to understand what support they may need from an operations and management level.
- 5. How would you handle a situation in which you believe one or more members of the school's board were acting unethically or not in the best interest of the school?
 - If it came to light that one or more members of the school board were acting unethically
 or in ways that were harmful to the school than I would ensure that the board chair and
 superintendent were informed so that necessary actions could occur to remove the
 board member from their duties. According to the by-laws a 2/3 majority vote would

allow the unethical board member to be relieved of their duties. At any moment when an adult's action towards the school isn't in the best interest of the students than personally I believe that is good reason to remove a board member or other working adult associated with the school.

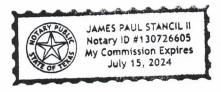

As a former special education teacher in the Rio Grande Valley and school administrator for Teach for America's Houston corps members, I was drawn to Red Brick Academy's commitment to preparing all students for college and beyond by providing an equitable education in an inclusive environment, and by partnering with families in order to enhance student success.

1. What was your motivation to serve on the board of the proposed charter school?

If Yes, state the name of the entity

- My motivation to serve on the board of the proposed charter school has to do with the mission and pillars of Red Brick Academy (RBA). As a former low-income K-12 student knowing that RBA is committed to providing an equitable educational experience aligns with what I believe every student should be deserving of. Having majored in psychology in undergrad I strongly believe in the social and emotional skills development for students that will take precedence at RBA. Lastly, much of my career has been in supporting families and their children obtain educational goals. As such, having a pillar of and belief in strong family partnerships is a value that I believe is essential to a school's success.
- 2. What is your understanding of the appropriate role of a public charter school board member? Describe any previous experience you have that is relevant to serving on the charter school's board (e.g., other board service). If you have not had previous experience of this nature, explain why you have the capability to be an effective board member.
 - The role of a public charter school board member is to provide accountability in ensuring that
 the goals of the public charter school are set and met, ensuring that the public charter school
 is fiscally sound and in compliance of all laws as set fort by the TEA, and working with the

founding director to met the set goals. I have a moderate amount of experience with governance. In my previous role I would interact with and attend governance meetings for the Disaster Relief Fund that I was administering. I got to understand the differences between a board and a committee and got to see the internal workings of each while supporting the work of committee and board members in making the decisions they needed to keep the fund working to the original donors intent. In my current role – I support the work of our board and committee members by preparing information that will help them achieve their goals. I have sat in on approximately 10 types of meetings in the fall and will do the same with another 10 this spring – in all there are nearly 30 governance meetings and as staff our work is to support the operations, administration, and information gathering for the board to grant impactful gifts to organizations in the greater Houston area.

- 3. Describe the specific knowledge and experience that you would bring to the board.
 - In addition to the governance experience mentioned above I have operations, community engagement, and strategy/analytical experience that I would bring to the board of directors of Red Brick Academy. During my time at Families Empowered, a non-profit that had several partnerships with charter school districts. I was in the operations team - helping to ensure that our goals were being met and that staff had the tools that they needed to be successful. I ran a call center and was in charge of its operations including managing the \$75,000.00 annual budget, hiring of seasonal paid interns, and overseeing the call center software system. Prior to that I, worked with parents directly, both at Families Empowered and during my time in Head Start. I developed a knowledge of social services and organizations supporting families in a variety of ways. While working directly with families waned over the years professionally, my knowledge of community organizations increased exponentially working in philanthropy. This local knowledge and experience in community engagement will help Red Brick Academy connect with the community they find themselves in. In my past three professional experiences I have been the lead in managing, collecting, analyzing, and utilizing data in ways that support the goals and mission of the organization. I know that my understanding of how to use data to inform decision making will be very beneficial to the rest of the board as well as to the founding director and the school itself.

SCHOOL MISSION AND PROGRAM

- 1. What is your understanding of the school's mission and guiding beliefs?
 - Red Brick Academy believes that every child is deserving of the same educational expectations and should be prepared to attend a post-secondary institution regardless if they actually decide to pursue one in the long run.
- 2. What is your understanding of the school's proposed educational program?
 - Red Brick Academy believes that strong familial partnerships, a commitment to the students social and emotional growth, and a rigorous post-secondary preparation curriculum taught by stellar teachers will help the school achieve its mission.
- 3. What do you believe to be the characteristics of a successful school?
 - I believe that a successful school must have trust built with the families of students and the community. That is the foundation by which the school will be able to be sustainable. In addition to that I believe that the school must be able to clearly articulate their goals while monitoring their progress and adjusting their goals based on inputs of the data they are receiving. The creation and execution of goals has to come from strong leaders and professionals, both on the governance side as well as on the operations side. Red Brick Academy values strong family partnerships and high quality teachers so their beliefs are

consistent with my views on a successful school.

- 4. How will you know that the school is succeeding (or not) in its mission?
 - The school will have to demonstrate that their goals are being met through the data and inputs they are receiving. These data sets include but are not limited to student data by way of state assessments (STARR), teacher performance monitoring and evaluations, family input via surveys and forums, staff evaluations, and a system to monitor and see growth for the school's goals as a whole. The purpose of data is to inform decisions makers to perform their role – to make decisions. Therefore, close monitoring of data and taking the appropriate interventions needed once the data shows that goals are not being met will help the school get to closer to succeeding on its mission.

GOVERNANCE

- 1. Describe the role that the board will play in the school's operation.
 - The board plays a critical role: to ensure oversight of the school's goals. They honor the goals of the school and make decisions that will help the school be successful. They do this by holding the superintendent accountable though support and feedback, reviewing components of school operations (programs, community, finances, etc.) and by ensuring that the board is responsible for governance, not day to day operations.
- 2. How will you know if the school is successful at the end of the first year of operation?
 - I will know if a school is successful at the end of its first year of operations by comparing the outcomes with the initial goals set out for the first year. Right now that includes a student's performance in English, Math, Science, Social Studies, and Physical Education. In addition to that, staff performance metrics and evaluations will be considered as well as the external goals of the school that the board will be monitoring. Those include financial and operational goals as well as the evaluation of the school superintendent.
- 3. How will you know at the end of four years if the school is successful?
 - I will know if the school is successful after four years if the school has not only exceeded the original goals set out during its first year but has also exceeded them and is successfully working towards a new set of similarly ambitious goals. Ideally the school will be sustainable financially and would be in integrated component of the community, helping it to meet its enrollment goals and ensuring its longevity.
- 4. What specific steps do you think the charter school board will need to take to ensure that the school is successful?
 - The board will need to understand what the goals are, meet regularly to discuss updates on progress and receive timely information to help inform their knowledge of the progress, utilize their specific skill set to ensure that the subgoals are being met and are being handled the best way that they can be, and they would need to have frequent communication with the superintendent in order to understand what support they may need from an operations and management level.

 - If it came to light that one or more members of the school board were acting unethically or in ways that were harmful to the school than I would ensure that the board chair and superintendent were informed so that necessary actions could occur to remove the board member from their duties. 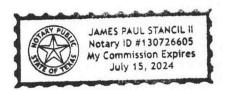

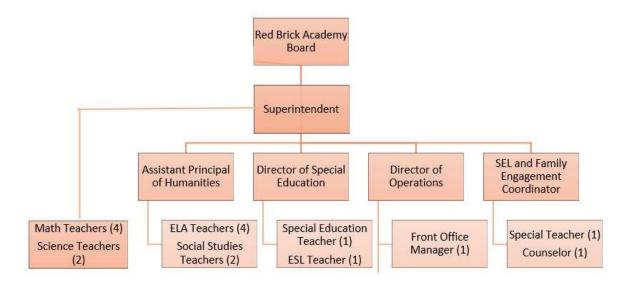

Assistant Principal EVALUATION TOOL OVERVIEW¹

Rationale and suggestions for implementation:

1. These rubrics are organized around five domains covering all aspects of a leader's job performance:

Part I: Teacher Performance/Student Performance

Part II: School Leadership Competencies (select competencies from the school director evaluation tool)

Part III: Staff Development - Coaching

Part IV: Staff Development – Professional development

The rubrics use a four-level rating scale with the following labels:

- 4 Highly Effective/Expert
- 3 Proficient
- 2 Working Toward Proficiency
- 1 Improvement Necessary
- 2. The rubrics are designed to give leaders an assessment of where they stand in all performance areas and detailed guidance for improvement. These rubrics are not checklists for school visits. To knowledgeably fill out the rubrics, a supervisor needs to have been in the presence of a leader's practice frequently throughout the year; it is irresponsible to fill out the rubrics based on few observations and without ongoing dialogue about shared understanding of performance.
- 3. The Proficient level describes solid, expected professional performance; any leadership team member should be pleased with scores at this level. The Highly Effective/Expert level is reserved for truly outstanding leadership as described by very demanding criteria; there will be relatively few scores at this level. Working Toward Proficiency indicates competencies that can be developed in order to achieve proficiency, and indicate the points in performance that hinder the achievement of desired student outcomes. Improvement Necessary indicates that performance has real deficiencies and must improve for employment renewal (although some novice leaders might start here).
- 4. To score, read across the four levels of performance for each criterion, find the level that best describes the leader's performance, and circle or highlight it. On each page, this will create a clear graphic display of overall performance, areas for commendation, and areas that need work. Write the overall score at the bottom of each page with brief comments, and then record all the scores and overall comments on the summary page.
- 5. Evaluation conferences are greatly enhanced if the supervisor and leader fill out the rubrics in advance and then meet and compare one page at a time. Of course, the supervisor has the final say, but the discussion should aim for consensus based on actual evidence of the most accurate score for each criterion. Supervisors should go into the evaluation process with humility since they cannot possibly know everything about a leader's complex world. Similarly, leaders should be open to feedback from someone with an outside perspective all revolving around whether the school is producing learning gains for all students.
- 6. Some supervisors sugar-coat criticism and give inflated scores to keep the peace and avoid hurting feelings. Doing so, does not help leaders improve or increase our ability to achieve organizational student outcomes. The kindest thing a supervisor can do for an underperforming leader is give candid, evidence-based feedback and robust follow-up support.

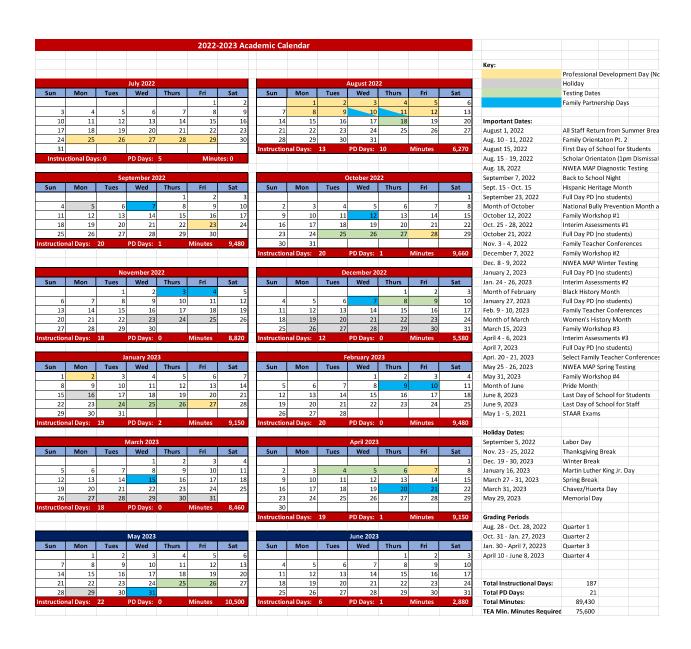

In accordance with state law, Red Brick Academy does not discriminate in its admissions policy on the basis of sex; national origin; ethnicity; religion; disability; academic, artistic, or athletic ability; or the district the child would otherwise attend.

Exclusion from Admission As authorized by the Red Brick Academy Charter and Texas Education Code § 12.111(a)(5)(A), students with a documented history of a criminal offense, a juvenile court adjudication, or other discipline problems under Texas Education Code Chapter 37, Subchapter A may be excluded from admission and enrollment in Red Brick Academy. However, the Red Brick Academy team will assess the severity and circumstances of the disciplinary history before denying a student access to enroll.

Submission of Applications and Admissions Lottery

The window for applications will be the first Monday of September and close the last Friday of the following March. On a Friday following the close of the application window there will be a lottery open to the public during which applications will be chosen at random by a disinterested third party. Red Brick Academy will post the results of the lottery on our website and send notifications to families who applied with an invitation to enroll or a notice of their waitlist status. If more families apply than there are available seats, the remaining families who do not receive an enrollment seat will be placed on a waitlist. If there are less families that apply than there are available seats, all applicants will be invited to enroll and the remaining spots will be given on a first come first served basis. After the lottery, applicants on the waitlist will be placed in order of when the application is received. All records of the lottery will be available to the public upon request. Each year, returning students and siblings of enrolled students will be exempt from the lottery and receive the first enrollment seats. Children of founders and staff will also be exempt from the lottery as long as the total number is not a larger proportion of enrollment per statute (TEC) §12.111 and (TEC) §12.117.

Families offered an enrollment seat will be sent a registration packet with instructions for registering. This notice will be sent no later than April 15. Families must complete and return the registration packet by the published deadline in order to secure enrollment. If an enrollment offer is declined or if a family does not complete the registration packet by the established deadline, the student's seat will be offered to the next potential student on the waiting list.

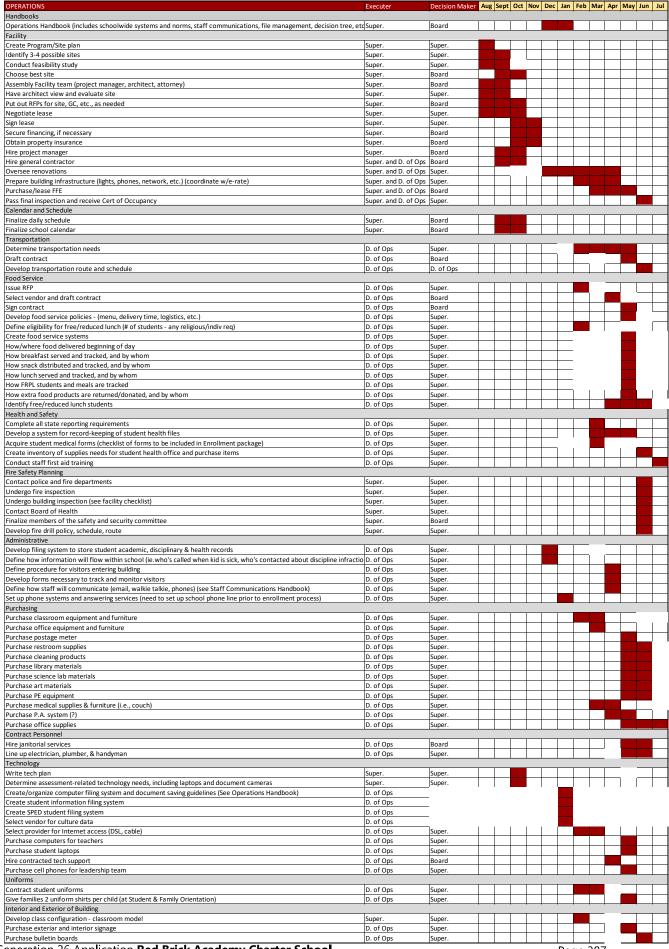

Contingency Plan

The start up plan is a robust guide to ensure that we meet all year 0 targets. However, we understand that there may be unforeseen challenges that we must proactively plan to mitigate. Our primary funding source is student enrollment. As such, we have built a contingency budget based on having 70% of the expected enrollment in Y1. To decrease our expenses, we made the following changes to the budget resulting in \$1,828,568 in total expenses and \$1,965,328 in total revenue and a net operating budget of \$136,760.

- Eliminated SEL coordinator role; the SpED coordinator will take on this role for Y1
- Created three cohorts of classes per grade instead of the original four. Doing so eliminates 1 math and 1 ELA teacher per grade resulting in a de
- Eliminated Family Engagement and External Partnership coordinator; the Counselor will take on this role in Y1
- · Changed the Office Manager role from 1 FTE to 0.5 FTE. The Director of Operations will take on the other half of the role
- Changed Chromebook to student ratio from 1:1 to 1:2
- Changed all enrollment based operating expenses to reflect the 70% student enrollment.

It is important to budget conservatively and to consider that charter schools often have lower than anticipated attendance rates in the first five years of operation. Therefore, a reasonable planning estimate of \$6,424 per student, which accounts for a daily attendance rate of 80%, should be used when planning and developing the budget.

Note: When using a school district as a baseline for supplemental HR forms, make sure the ISD used has the same or close to anticipated average daily attendance (ADA) that the proposed charter school is projecting.

Through a grant application process, federal funds may be available for up to 12 months of post-award planning and up to two years of implementation. However, start-up funds are available for no more than three years. Actual funding depends on the number of eligible charters, the award of a successful competitive charter application, and the continuation of funds from the United States Department of Education. **Pending applicant eligibility and availability of federal funds, the application provides for up to \$900,000 in federal CSP funding.** The applicant must include and budget with these funds when completing the Financial Workbook. In the notes section of each tab, please designate the allowable use of CSP funds in the appropriate row.

If awarded, funds will not be available to the sponsoring entity until the contract for the charter school has been executed, a county-district number has been assigned, and a grant has been negotiated.

After these steps are complete, federal funds may only be accessed after a request for reimbursement has been submitted. Generally, federal funds may not be received until after the charter holder has demonstrated that it has incurred an expenditure that represents an allowable cost pursuant to the requirements of the federal award.

Pending applicant eligibility and availability of federal funds, the application provides for up to \$900,000 in federal CSP funding. The applicant must include and budget with these funds when completing the budget narrative.

Applicants who would be unable to meet the definition of a charter school, as defined in ESSA, Section 4310(2) are ineligible to receive CSP funds through this application. Consequently, any applicant who would be ineligible should NOT budget the funds outlined above.

For purposes of this grant, the term charter school means a public school that:

- a. in accordance with TEC, Chapter 12, is exempt from significant State or local rules that inhibit the flexible operation and management of the school, but not from any rules relating to the other requirements of this section;
- b. is created by a developer as a public school, or is adapted by a developer from an existing public school, and is operated under public supervision and direction;
- c. operates in pursuit of a specific set of educational objectives determined by the school's developer and agreed to by the authorized public chartering agency;
- d. provides a program of elementary or secondary education, or both;
- e. is nonsectarian in its programs, admissions policies, employment practices, and all other operations, and is not affiliated with a sectarian school or religious institution;
- f. does not charge tuition
- g. complies with the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.), Section 444 of the General Education Provisions Act (20 U.S.C. 1232g) (commonly referred to as the "Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974"), and Part B of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act;

- h. is a school to which parents choose to send their children, and that admits students on the basis of a lottery, if more students apply for admission than can be accommodated;
- i. agrees to comply with the same Federal and State audit requirements as do other elementary schools and secondary schools in the State, unless such requirements are specifically waived for the purposes of this program;
- j. meets all applicable Federal, State, and local health and safety requirements;
- k. operates in accordance with State law; and
- I. has a written performance contract with the authorized public chartering agency in the State that includes a description of how student performance will be measured in charter schools pursuant to State assessments that are required of other schools and pursuant to any other assessments mutually agreeable to the authorized public charter agency and the charter school.

The Red Brick Academy team built the financial workbook to include a growing ending fund balance based on fiscally conservative assumptions (i.e. 1.5% increase in per pupil funding and ADA assumptions that grow with time but starts at 85% in year 1). The budget is in alignment with programming priorities ensuring sufficient funds are dedicated to instructional positions, staffing for special populations, counseling and SEL supports, and data tracking systems.

Revenues

- Assumes \$1,901,092 in per pupil state revenue in Year 1 that increases with enrollment with an additional 1.5% increase each year.
- Assumes \$900,000 for Charter School Program (CSP) Start-Up Grant dispersed across the first 3 years of operations; Year 1 (Y1) = \$350,000, Year 2 (Y2) = \$350,000, and Year 3 (Y3) = \$200,000
- Assumes all federal entitlements (excluding free or reduced lunch) at \$680 per pupil and \$225 per student with disabilities for IDEA that increases with enrollment beginning Y0 through Y5 with a 1.5% increase each year.
- Assumes \$75,000 in Year 0 for Walton Family Foundation Grant

 Superintendent salary for the full fiscal year; 1 Director of Operations at 0.5

FTE with an expected start date of January 1, 2022; 1 Assistant Principal of Humanities and 1 Director of Special Education for 2 months (0.167 FTE) of work in the months of May and June; Salaries will be paid by CSP grant.

 - 1 FTE for each of the following positions: Superintendent, Assistant Principal of Humanities, Director of Operations, and Director of Special Education, Front Office Manager
 - 0.5 FTE for an SEL Coordinator and 0.5 FTE for the Family Engagement and External Partnership Coordinator.
- Instructional Personnel Costs Assumes:
 - 1 FTE for each of the following positions: Counselor, ESL
 Teacher/Coordinator, Front Office Manager, and SpED Teacher
 - 13 FTE for General education teachers as follows: 4 Math, 4 ELA, 2
 Science, 2 Social Studies, and 1 Enrichment Teacher

Year 2

- Administrative Staff Costs Assumes:
 - 1 FTE for each of the following positions: Superintendent, Assistant Principal of Humanities, Assistant Principal of Math and Science, Director of Operations, and Director of Special Education
 - 0.5 FTE for an SEL Coordinator and 0.5 FTE for the Family Engagement and External Partnership Coordinator. Both positions will be completed by one staff member.
- Instructional Personnel Costs Assumes:
 - 1 FTE for each of the following positions: ESL Teacher/Coordinator and Front Office Manager
 - 2 FTEs for each of the following positions: Counselors and SpED Teachers
 - 19 FTEs for General education teachers as follows: 6 Math, 6 ELA, 3
 Science, 3 Social Studies, and 1 Enrichment Teacher

Year 3

- Administrative Staff Costs Assumes:
 - 1 FTE for each of the following positions: Superintendent, Assistant Principal of Humanities, Assistant Principal of Math and Science, Director of Operations, Director of Special Education, SEL Coordinator

- 0.5 FTE for an Operations Assistant and 0.5 FTE for the Family Engagement and External Partnership Coordinator. Both positions will be held by one staff member.
- Instructional Personnel Costs Assumes:
 - 1 FTE for each of the following positions: ESL Teacher/Coordinator and Front Office Manager
 - 2 FTEs for each of the following positions: Counselors and Special EducationTeachers
 - 26 FTEs for General education teachers as follows: 8 Math, 8 ELA, 4
 Science, 4 Social Studies, and 2 Enrichment Teacher

Payroll Taxes and Benefits: calculated by state mandated percentages of personnel expense. Red Brick Academy will contribute 2.4% of the mandated 7.7% that teachers contribute to retirement.

Contracted Services:

- Accounting/Audit expenses assumes \$5,000 in Y0 and \$10,000 in Y1 that increase
 by 10% until we reach full enrollment in Y3 with a 1% increase in fees in Y4 and Y5
- Legal expense assumes \$10,000 for legal fees in Y1 that increase with enrollment with a 1% increase in fees in Y4 and Y5
- Food Serves Expense assumes \$25,000 for food servers contracted part time with an hourly wage that increase with enrollment with a 1% increase in fees in Y4 and Y5
- Payroll Services expenses assumes back office provider contracted at \$2,000 in Y0 and \$60,000 in Y1 Y5 with a 1% increase in fees in Y2 and Y5
- Special Ed Service expense assumes contracted speech, occupational therapy, physical therapy, and bilingual services at \$100/hr for 40 weeks with an estimated 9 hours per week of services that increases with enrollment with a 1% increase in fees in Y4 and Y5

School Operations

- o Board Expense assumes \$3000 for board training, \$500 for the annual board retreat, and \$1,200 for Directors and Officers Insurance.
- Classroom/Teaching Supplies & Materials expense includes \$900 per classroom plus \$200 per teacher. The expense increases with enrollment with a 1% increase in fees in Y4 and Y5.

- Special Education Supplies and Materials assumes \$300 per student with disabilities that increases with enrollment with a 1% increase in fees in Y4 and Y5.
- Textbooks/Workbooks assumes \$100/student that increases with enrollment with a 1% increase in fees in Y4 and Y5.
- Supplies and Materials assumes \$50 per student for spare uniforms and student supplies. The expense increases with enrollment with a 1% increase in fees in Y4 and Y5.
- Equipment and Furniture Expense includes \$3,000 per classroom for desks, chairs, and tables. Y0 expense is for 2 grade levels of furniture. Y1 expense is for an additional 2 grade levels of furniture. Furniture needed at full enrollment will be purchased by the end of Y1. In Y2 Y5, we allocated 2% of the total furniture costs at full enrollment for wear and tear replacement.
- Telephone Expense is covered by CSP grant and assumes initial landline installation in YO at \$3,500 and \$200/month for school phones thereafter which increases by enrollment with a 1% increase in fees in Y4 and Y5.
- Technology Expense assumes 1:1 ratio for student Chromebooks @\$200; projector and document camera @\$750 per classroom; SchoolRunner (data and parent communication application) for \$34.20 per student; \$1500 per staff member for staff laptops. We will use CSP funds to purchase all technology needed at full capacity by the end of year 2.
- Student Testing and Assessment assumes \$25 per student plus \$1000 for a third
 of students with disabilities for triannual reviews. CSP funds will be used. The
 expense increases with enrollment with a 1% increase in fees in Y4 and Y5.
- Field Trip Expense assumes \$1000 per trip for two grade levels with 6 total trips each year. The expense increases with enrollment with a 1% increase in fees in Y4 and Y5.
- Transportation expense assumes \$10,000 for busses for students with transportation in their IEPS. The expense increases with enrollment with a 1% increase in fees in Y4 and Y5.
- Staff Development Expense assumes \$300 per staff and PEIMS training for the Director of Operations. The expense increases proportionally to staffing increases with a 1% increase in fees in Y4 and Y5. We will use CSP funds for this expense.
- Staff Recruitment assumes \$500 for social media ads and online postings to recruit each new staff. We will use CSP funds for this expense.
- School Meals assumes \$3.50 per meal for the 187 days of school for the 11% of student who we project will not have free or reduced lunch.

Banking fees assumes \$2,000 annually which stays constant overtime with a 1% increase in fees each year.

Facility Operation and Maintenance

- Insurance expense assumes all required insurance for the school with a 1% increase in fees each year.
- Janitorial Services expense assumes \$0.18 per sq ft which increase with enrollment with a 1% increase in fees each year.
- Building and Land Rent/Lease assumes that we lease a facility that allows payment for only the portion of the facility used according to enrollment. It assumes \$11/sq ft in rent at 80 sq ft per student. Y0 expense assumes starting the lease 2 months before school opens for building readiness activities. Y1 – Y3 increases with student enrollment with a 1% in fees in Y4 and Y5. The first month of rent in Y1 will be covered by CSP.
- Repairs and Maintenance assumes \$50,000 for the initial building renovations to bring the building to code in Y0 and \$20,000 in Y1 – Y5 for reoccurring repairs and maintenance expenses.
- Security expense assumes \$800 per month for a high security alarm system with a 1% increase in fees each year.
- Utilities expense assumes \$1.25 per sq ft annually. This expense increases with enrollment with a 1% increase in fees in Y4 and Y5.
- Internet expense assumes high speed fiber optic system at \$500/month with a
 1% increase in fees each year.

Funding and Fundraising

We have a firm commitment of donation from the Walton Foundation in the amount of \$75,000. The letter of assurance is included in **Attachment 33**. We anticipate funding from CSP and have incorporated the \$900,000 start-up funds into our Y0-Y5 budget. The board will set fundraising goals and oversee fundraising efforts seeking applicable grants and high net worth individuals to donate to our school. Fundraising activities including, but not limited to, creating virtual fundraising events, time-bound donation campaigns, establish monthly giving programs, and incorporating donation drives for specific causes.

Contingency Plan

The start up plan is a robust guide to ensure that we meet all year 0 targets. However, we understand that there may be unforeseen challenges that we must proactively plan to

mitigate. Our primary funding source is student enrollment. As such, we have built a contingency budget based on having 70% of the expected enrollment in Y1. To decrease our expenses, we made the following changes to the budget resulting in \$1,828,568 in total expenses and \$1,965,328 in total revenue and a net operating budget of \$136,760.

- Eliminated SEL coordinator role; the Director of Special Education will take on this role for Y1
- Created three cohorts of classes per grade instead of the original four. Doing so eliminates 1 math and 1 ELA teacher per grade resulting in a decrease of 4 teacher positions in Y1
- Eliminated Family Engagement and External Partnership coordinator; the Counselor will take on this role in Y1
- Changed the Office Manager role from 1 FTE to 0.5 FTE. The Director of Operations will take on the other half of the role
- Changed Chromebook to student ratio from 1:1 to 1:2
- Changed all enrollment based operating expenses to reflect the 70% student enrollment.

Open Meetings Requirements

The proposed charter holder assures that all meetings in which charter school business is discussed will be posted to provide public notice, held in an open public forum, and any action items voted upon will be held in a public forum as required by the Open Meetings Act in Government Code, Chapter 551.

The proposed charter holder assures that volunteer hours, or payment in lieu of volunteer hours, will not be required of the parent or guardian as a requirement for student admission or enrollment.

The proposed charter holder assures that there will be no specified days designated for enrollment and/or admission. If space is available, a student will be enrolled and admitted on any day at any time of day and must be counted as and considered a charter student immediately. State law does not allow for a trial enrollment period at a public school.

The proposed charter holder assures that no student auditions will be required prior to enrollment and admission at the charter school unless the charter is originally approved by the commissioner of education as a performing arts school with an audition component or the charter is amended by the commissioner of education to designate the school a performing arts school with an audition component.

The proposed charter holder understands that a student may be ineligible for enrollment at a charter school based on a history of a criminal offense, a juvenile court adjudication, or discipline problems under Texas Education Code (TEC), Chapter 37, Subchapter A, only if the enrollment prohibition is specifically approved by the commissioner of education when the charter is awarded, or if the charter is amended by the commissioner of education to allow this enrollment prohibition. It must be noted that the enrollment prohibition is not allowed for any prior discipline problems, but only those specified in TEC, Chapter 37, Subchapter A.

Public Meeting(s)

The proposed charter holder assures that a public meeting will be held, in accordance with the requirements outlined in Attachment E5 of this application, for each approved campus opened after Year 1, at least 6 months prior to opening that campus. The proposed charter holder further assures that such meetings will be held within the city of the proposed campus address.

Withdrawal and Expulsion

The proposed charter holder assures that it understands that only the parent or guardian may withdraw a student from the charter school, and the only time charter administrators may withdraw a student and use administrative withdrawal as the leaver code is in the rare instances when:

- a student is withdrawn by the charter school because the charter school discovers, when verifying enrollment information, that the student was not a resident of the district at the time of enrollment;
- the charter school discovers that the student has falsified enrollment information; proof of identification is not provided;
- or immunization records are not provided within 30 days of enrollment.

The proposed charter holder understands that a student who fails to comply with the charter school's student code of conduct may not be administratively withdrawn. If a student commits an expellable offense, as outlined in the student code of conduct, the charter holder further understands that charter administrators may expel the student only after due process has been afforded the student, and the charter holder board has determined that expulsion is the appropriate consequence.

The proposed charter holder understands that it has an obligation to notify the school district in which the student resides within three business days of any action expelling or withdrawing a student from the charter school. See 19 TAC §100.1211 (c).

The proposed charter holder assures that each campus granted through the initial charter contract <u>and</u> all subsequent renewal, expansion, and re-designations shall establish and maintain gun-free campus policies. The charter shall also expel a student who brings a firearm, as defined by 18 U.S.C. Section 921, to school. See TEC §37.007(e).

- f. does not charge tuition

- g. complies with the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.), Section 444 of the General Education Provisions Act (20 U.S.C. 1232g) (commonly referred to as the "Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974"), and Part B of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act;
- h. is a school to which parents choose to send their children, and that admits students on the basis of a lottery, if more students apply for admission than can be accommodated;
- agrees to comply with the same Federal and State audit requirements as do other elementary schools and secondary schools in the State, unless such requirements are specifically waived for the purposes of this program;
- j. meets all applicable Federal, State, and local health and safety requirements;
- k. operates in accordance with State law; and
- I. has a written performance contract with the authorized public chartering agency in the State that includes a description of how student performance will be measured in charter schools pursuant to State assessments that are required of other schools and pursuant to any other assessments mutually agreeable to the authorized public charter agency and the charter school.
